GOOD SHOES FORCED ON THE MARKET.

MILLIONS IN WATER

POSSIBILITIES OF THE

RECLAMATION ACT.

Over \$300,000,000 in Wealth Will Be Added to the Nation by the Increase of Values From National Irrigation—More Benefits Will Come From It Than From the Homestead Law, Because the Urgency Is Greater Now—People Were Not Taxed to Start the Reclamation of the Desert—Land Sales the Only Source of Revenue.

"No other industrial movement ever made in the United States will compare in results to the reclamation act, or national irrigation laws," said a prominent student of irrigation, to the East Oregonian today.

"The \$25,000,000 reclamation fund now in the hands of the government, and which has been collected from land sales since the adoption of the law on June 17, 1902, is now entirely provided for, in the reclamation projects now under way and contemplated.

"According to the common increase in values of irrigated land, this sum of \$25,000,000 invested in government irrigation works will have increased three-fold, in 10 years, or in other words, this desert land on which \$25,000,000 will have been expended will be worth \$75,000,000 in 1912, or 10 years from the date of the beginning of government irrigation.

"At the same rate of accumulation by which the present reclamation fund has been collected, the sum of \$83,300,000 will have collected and expended in reclamation works within the next 10 years, and this, too, will have increased in value three-fold, making a total of \$249,900,000 in land values alone, added to the wealth of the government as a result of the reclamation law, to say nothing of the enormous values of livestock, improvements, homes, railroads, and personal property which must accompany the settlement of the reclaimed lands. And the beauty of the subject is that the people were

not taxed to raise the funds. The desert is to be its own savior.

"The results of reclamation are too immense to be estimated in a sober business manner, but their every phase hints of the fabulous and the romantic.

"I candidly believe the results of the reclamation law will be more far-reaching for good than even the homestead law, which was considered the most magnificent enactment that ever emanated from a congress of legislators. When the homestead law was enacted land was plentiful, and men could secure homes by squatter's rights and other means, and the emergency was not so great as now, when the vacant land available for homes is about exhausted.

"The reclamation act comes as a boon to millions of crowded people sweltering in the congested cities and hungry for a cooling spot of green where they may expand and grow into normal human beings. The need of homes is now greater than when the homestead act was passed, and therefore the benefits of the reclamation act will be more far-reaching, because of the greater urgency met by its beneficial provisions.

"Before we know it, the Columbia will be lifted from its bed and made to reclaim the adjacent deserts. This problem seems too gigantic for consideration at present, but it is sure to come. Ten years ago, it was said to be impossible to divert water over the desert by means of a dam on Salt river. Now the project is under way. Only a few years ago Southern Idaho, parts of Utah, Wyoming and Colorado were looked upon as hopeless desert wastes. Today they are perfumed with orchards and verdant with the perennial alfalfa.

"The same condition will soon prevail on other equally as forbidding stretches of wilderness in the West."

MINISTER TO KOREA

SELECTION OF E. V.

MORGAN HIGHLY INDORSED

Need of Active, Vigorous Men in That Land of Stagnation—Morgan Said to Be Levelheaded and Conservative, Just Such a Man as is Needed to Further Christian Civilization There.

New York, May 8.—Just before his departure for Korea, Edwin V. Morgan, newly appointed United States minister to that country, was tendered a dinner at the University club in this city by William Dulles, Jr., a personal friend.

A number of the guests were officials of the Presbyterian board of foreign missions, which is the only American missionary organization with work in Korea, and addresses were made by the Rev. George Alexander, president of the board, and Robert E. Speer and the Rev. Arthur J. Brown, two of the board's secretaries.

Mr. Speer said that Mr. Morgan was one of a type of men whom it is good to see go out into the East. Some men, said Mr. Speer, subside there, worn down by the conditions they find; other men become stimulated, nerving themselves to greater effort because of the conditions. Mr. Morgan will go out and embody to the Eastern people the standards of the Western world.

The Rev. Alexander said that the diplomacy of our country is becoming altruistic and is, therefore, becoming also Christian in a very large sense. He told the new minister to Korea that if any of the American missionaries flourish the "big stick" or try to hoist the American flag higher than it should go calling upon the United States minister to help them, he was to know that the Presbyterian board does not countenance unnecessary appeals to government authority and will not support such actions.

The men and women are sent out as missionaries of the Prince of Peace. The Rev. Brown told of a recent trip to Korea, when he was entertained at dinner by the Korean king. He said that the missionaries and the diplomatic representatives of this country are of necessity in close relation in Korea, as besides the missionaries and the people of the legation there are not more than 20 Americans in the whole of Korea.

Minister Morgan, who was for several years secretary of the legation in Korea, paid a high tribute to Minister Allen, under whom he served and whom he succeeds. The former minister went to Korea as a Presbyterian medical missionary, and has been highly honored by the king and other officials. He has been minister for eight years. The new minister starts for his post in a few days, going by the way of San Francisco.
