GENERAL NEWS.

The profits of the government railroads of Japan for 1904, were \$5,750,000, exceeding estimates by \$1,000,000.

There are 879 golf clubs in England, 760 in America, 632 in Scotland and 134 in Ireland, numbering altogether 600,000 players.

It is believed in Washington political and bar circles that Senator Clark, of Wyoming, will be the next chairman of the senate judiciary committee.

At Montreal, Hackenschmidt, a new world's wrestling wonder, threw Manpas, the Canadian champion, three times in 25 minutes. He wrenched he could do it in one hour.

The school census for 1905 for the city of Los Angeles has just been completed, and shows a population of 201,348. This is a gain in population of 31,716 since the census of May, 1904.

The Grand Army of the Republic reached its maximum membership in 1890, with 409,459 members; in 1904 it was reduced to 246,261. In 1905 the death rate per 10,000 was 93; now it is 552.

Recent travelers in Tibet have noted that while effects of the rarefied air are severely felt at altitudes of between 14,000 and 16,000 feet, on going yet higher all disagreeable sensations pass off.

The Order of Railroad Telegraphers is in session at Buffalo, N. Y., with 300 delegates representing 45,000 members. It is proposed to amalgamate this order with that of the Commercial Telegraphers' Union, which has 15,000 members.

And now it is claimed by no less authority than M. Bunau Varilla, former Panamanian minister to the United States, that a lock canal can be built across the Isthmus in four years, of all the full proposed dimensions except depth; or more properly speaking, of height of banks. The actual depth of water would be the same as in an ocean level ditch.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Mrs. Lillie Waring, of Chehalis, Wash., is suing the Northern Pacific for damages for the death of her husband, who was run over and killed.

A. E. English, a passenger brakeman, attempted to put a tramp off his train at Ashland, and was stabbed in the chest. He will probably die. The tramp was jailed.

The first lumber to be sent directly from the American northwest to England is being loaded now at Portland, onto the La Fontaine. The cargo will consist of 1,000,000 feet.

The dead body of John M. Beaton was found in a cabin near Columbia Falls, Mont., with the throat cut from ear to ear. There was a razor lying near the body, and every indication of suicide.

John C. Bain was convicted of fencing for private use, government land in Valley county, Montana. His sentence, imposed by Judge Hunt, of the federal court, was a fine of \$100 and three hours in jail.

It is probable that Tom Brown, of Chehalis, Wash., whom a jury refused to convict of murder because he shot and killed his father, will not even be sent to the insane asylum. Public opinion, generally speaking, seems to demand that he have his freedom.

The commissioners of Thurston county, Washington, have agreed to increase the appropriation for the county exhibit at the Lewis and Clark centennial from \$100 to \$500. The amount now appropriated will place the exhibit and employ an attendant.

"FATHER" COFFIN

PATRON SAINT OF ALL RAILROAD MEN.

Venerable Temperance Worker Who Has Spent His Long and Active Life in Reducing Drunkenness Among Railroad Men—Is a Peacemaker, Advisor and Confidential Friend Everywhere He Goes.

The most venerable and lovable figure attending the grand lodge of the Conductors now in session in Portland, is "Father" Coffin, superintendent of the Railroad Men's Home at Highland Park, Ill., and founder of the "White Ribbon League" among railroad men. "Father" Coffin has spent his long and active life among railroad men, beginning as a minister years ago, and developing into a temperance worker, his labors being confined exclusively to railroad men.

Knowing the dangers that ever beset railroad men, and realizing the awful results of drunkenness among these men, he decided to devote his life to this work. So he formed a railroad men's temperance society, known as the "White Ribbon League," and has been the means of reducing drunkenness among railroad men more decidedly than any other force.

So great is his influence that he is advisor and confidential friend of all the railway orders and never misses a grand lodge session of any of the five great orders—the Conductors, Engineers, Firemen, Brakemen and Telegraphers.

When the five orders joined hands and founded the Railway Men's home at Highland Park, "Father" Coffin was the only logical superintendent and he was unanimously chosen for the position.

This home is maintained by voluntary subscriptions from all the orders, and is a home for all disabled and aged railway men belonging to any of the orders.

"Father" Coffin never stops talking temperance. He visits homes of drunkards, relieves their families, pleads with them, and finally takes legal means if no other will answer, to prevent habitual drunkards from securing liquor. He is the patron saint of railroad men and can bring tears to any convention by relating incidents of his beneficent work. At Portland he is the leading spirit. All the boys listen to him. He never fails to bring order to the most riotous session of a lodge and has prevented disruption in many past grand lodge sessions, when all other mediation had been tried in vain.

At a meeting of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen at Des Moines in 1900, at which the editor of the East Oregonian was a delegate, a serious division arose and trouble was threatened, when the venerable form of "Father" Coffin arose on the speakers' platform, his hands raised, his face upturned, and tears in his dim eyes. Before he had spoken a dozen words the difficulty was settled, and strong arms grasped the old man and carried him round and round the hall in triumph. His presence is an assurance of peace everywhere.

New York, May 10.—A gigantic combination of retail dealers in anthracite coal, embracing the United States and Canada, will probably result from a conference held here today. The ostensible purpose of the movement is to devise methods for the quicker delivery of coal by the operators and its better preparation for shipment, but at the same time it is believed that the regulation of prices will be one of the chief objects of the proposed combination.

MANY COTTON MAKERS MEET.

National Body of Manufacturers Is at Knoxville, Tenn.

Knoxville, Tenn., May 10.—It was a distinguished gathering that faced President R. S. Reinhardt, of North Carolina, when he called to order at 10 o'clock this morning the ninth annual convention of the American Cotton Manufacturers' association. The attendance numbered several hundred and included representative cotton manufacturers of the New England section as well as those of the Carolinas, Georgia and other southern states. The English cotton trade was represented by J. W. Nasmith, of Manchester, who will address the convention at the special invitation of the American association.

The forenoon was devoted to the formalities attending the opening. After prayer had been delivered by Rev. E. B. Olmstead, the visitors were welcomed by Governor Cox, Mayor Gass and William B. Lockett, chairman of the chamber of commerce. The response was embodied in the annual address of President Reinhardt, who spoke at considerable length on the outlook of the cotton industry, and the various problems confronting the manufacturers. The same subjects were treated this afternoon in papers presented by leading members of the association.

The convention expects to conclude its business tomorrow morning. The large and representative attendance and the interesting programme combine to give promise of the most important gathering ever held by the association.
