GENERAL NEWS.

The Panama canal commission has set aside \$656,444 especially to fight yellow fever with.

Fifteen inches of snow fell at the Gold Coin mine near Anaconda, Mont., May 10.

There are 198 resident millionaires in Colorado, of whom David Moffatt is the richest. He is worth from \$25,000,000 to \$30,000,000.

The Beneficial Life Insurance company has been organized with headquarters at Salt Lake. It is capitalized at \$100,000.

W. J. Hemphill's chickens trespassed upon John B. Laughlin's garden at Lebanon, Pa. A quarrel ensued and Laughlin shot and killed Hemphill.

George H. Wright has been arrested at Huntington, W. Va., charged with the murder of the three Provoys of Utah county, Utah, in February, 1895.

Justice Harlan denies all intention of resigning from the supreme court of the United States to engage in building funds to build a Presbyterian cathedral.

Private speculation by officers and directors is responsible for the great majority of bank failures, according to Comptroller of the Currency William Barrett Ridgely.

Mrs. James E. McGuire, aged 16 years, walked 150 miles to intercede with Governor Folk, of Missouri, for the pardon of her husband, who is in the penitentiary on a charge of horse-stealing.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

For burglary and the theft of a suit of clothes, William Rigan has been sentenced to three years in the penitentiary from McMinnville.

Work has begun on cutting out bars and other obstructions to navigation on the upper Willamette, on a \$10,000 appropriation by the federal government.

J. J. Gibson and his twin daughters, aged 4 years, were thrown from a buggy by a runaway horse at Hanksburg, near Oregon City, and all were very seriously injured.

Oregon county saloons refuse to obey the order of the court, and are wide open in all localities except at Myrtle Point, which recently reinforced the local option law by going dry in the city election.

A petition has been filed with Governor Chamberlain for the pardon of Woodson Gray, who has done the constructive time one year on a five-year sentence for killing A. M. Hagarth, near Elgin.

George D. Barrett, "bunco" man, political boss and saloonkeeper, who killed George Williams in Portland about eight years ago in a saloon on Alder street, between Third and Fourth streets, died Monday at Reno, Nev., from brain trouble.

The armory at North Yakima has burned, entailing a loss of nearly \$20,000. The loss on the building is \$7000, with \$6000 insurance. The loss to the state is about \$10,000. The fire started in the rear of the building from a defective flue.

The various news bureaus were in error in stating that the Klamath Canal company had agreed to relinquish its holdings and rights to the government for \$150,000. On the contrary, the company holds out for \$250,000. The former figure is said to be a liberal estimate by disinterested outsiders.

FOR BETTER MORALS

CALDWELL NEWS INDORSES PENDLETON MOVEMENT.

Comments the East Oregonian for the Stand It Is Taking for Clean Town—Moral Crusades Are Being Waged Everywhere in the Northwest—Pendleton Is Not the Only Town That Is Fighting the Gamblers and Thieves.

The following emphatic indorsement of the course of the East Oregonian and other law-abiding people of Pendleton, in causing the suppression of gambling, is from the Caldwell News, a paper that has elected a reform city ticket in Caldwell and helped make a decent town of that place:

The News says editorially: There seems to be a more determined effort than ever before among law-abiding and respectable communities, for the enforcement of the laws pertaining to the moral status of the cities.

There are crusades being waged in more than a dozen large cities of the northwest, including Portland, Pocatello, and in scores of smaller towns, which all goes to show the trend of the times, and the growing sentiment in favor of right living and right thinking.

A letter from one of the most prominent and influential men of the Oregon metropolis, Hon. J. P. Newell, states among other things:

"In the coming city election, politics are at a boiling point and the temperance people are making a splendid stand for decency and are receiving the highest respect and support from the large majority of the public, and expect to elect the mayor, in the coming election. This from a town that supports 250 saloons and gambling joints would indicate people are waking up to the realization of the fact that the saloon business is a detriment and a drawback, both morally and financially, to any town or community outside of the dealer himself."

We are also in receipt of a letter from a prominent business man in Pendleton, Or., where under the leadership of the East Oregonian the citizens have organized a Law Enforcement League, which the writer says now has over 200 members, who are not trying to make new laws, but simply are for the enforcing of those now on the statute books. This law enforcement league caused the saloons to remain closed on Sundays and closed gambling entirely, forcing the tin horns to retire or earn an honest living, as other people do.

Of course as could be expected, the persons who have lived off of the toil and sweat of others feel very indignant and have instituted boycott on the East Oregonian.

We want to compliment this paper for the fearless way it is telling the truth in regard to the matter, and for being a friend to the honest many instead of a hireling to the corrupt and pusillanimous few.

MARIE WARE MARRIED.

Two Prominent Land Thieves Are Now One.

H. G. McKinley and Marie L. Ware were married at the Saratoga hotel, Chicago, May 2. They will return to Oregon June 1.

Miss Marie L. Ware, who became the wife of Horace G. McKinley, is the daughter of the late Joel Ware, of Eugene. She was born in Eugene about 28 years ago, and, upon the death of her father, who was a well-known Oregon pioneer, about three years ago, succeeded him as United States commissioner at Eugene.

She has been a prominent figure in the Oregon land fraud cases, but was acquitted in the federal court at the time of the famous trial of the conspirators last fall. She is petite, graceful and of rather striking appearance.

Horace G. McKinley is a member of a prominent Wisconsin family, and came to Oregon for the purpose of speculating in timber lands, some six or seven years ago. He is about 35 years of age, and has been married once before, having been divorced from his first wife.

He is a handsome man, of good address and agreeable personality. He was convicted of complicity in the land frauds last fall, and is now under bonds of \$4000, pending sentence. His marriage to Miss Ware will have an important bearing on subsequent trials for the land frauds, as the testimony of his present wife is an important factor in the future prosecution.

OPEN STURGIS DITCH

O. D. TEEL POKES PENDLETON CAPITAL.

According to Estimates of Mr. Whistler Umatilla River Affords Sufficient Water to Irrigate 75,000—Only 50,000 Acres Now Under Proposed Ditches, Leaving Enough Water to Irrigate 25,000 Acres Under Sturgis Ditch.

"Since Mr. Whistler estimates that the Umatilla river affords sufficient water to irrigate 75,000 acres of land, this leaves 25,000 acres available under the Sturgis ditch, as the Butter creek and Echo district has but 50,000 under actual and proposed ditches," said O. D. Teel, to the East Oregonian today.

"This gives Pendleton capital a chance to open up this valuable ditch and reclaim 25,000 acres directly tributary to that city. It seems that some one would undertake this work. The land is available and according to the government engineer sufficient water, over and above that now claimed, remains in the river to cover 25,000 acres."

"The land that could be opened under the Sturgis ditch will be directly tributary to Pendleton. Its settlement will not build up any outside point, but will swell the actual population and business volume of Pendleton, and I am surprised that some enterprising capitalists has not long ago begun the construction of this irrigation project."

Adulterating Food.
San Francisco, May 12.—Several manufacturers of catsup appeared at the health office yesterday regarding the analysis made by City Chemist Gibbs that the catsups contained preservatives and coloring matter. They pointed to a report of former City Chemist Wenzell, who recommended that eight ounces of salicylic acid be allowed in 50 gallons of catsup. The health board of 1896-97 adopted the recommendation, but no ordinance was ever passed on the subject giving the necessary permission. Health Officer Ragan held that the preservative could not be used under any circumstance and the permission certainly did not allow the use of coal tar or benzoic acid in the condiment.
