HORSES WANTED FOR ALASKA.

Government Will Use Light Animals for Packing.

B. W. Witherspoon, a member of the United States geological survey, is here for the purpose of purchasing a carload of light horses to be used in government work in Alaska. The animals are wanted for packing purposes, and should weigh in the neighborhood of 1100 pounds. Mr. Witherspoon says he wishes about 25 such horses, and that he will pay from \$40 to \$55 per head for them. They are to be delivered here on May 28.

Mr. Witherspoon is from Murfreesboro, Tenn., and will go to Alaska with a party during the coming summer. The party will be made up from various parts of the country, and will make extensive surveys in the north.
