Will Not Refund License.
At the last council meeting it was voted to refund \$169, which was the amount figured to be coming on the unused portion of A. L. Morris' liquor license. The warrant was filed out by the recorder, but Mayor Slater refused to sign it. It has not been the custom to refund money paid in on liquor licenses. It has not been the custom of the councilmen to expect any refund, but in this case Councilman Bohnencamp is reported to hold an order from Mr. Morris for the warrant, with instructions to pay \$30 of it to Councilman Fowler.

The precedent is strongly against paying back any portion of money received for liquor licenses. The former proprietor of the O. K. saloon, a scrip, applied to the council a few months ago for a refund of a small portion of his license; he was denied. Mr. Kilen, who succeeded J. D. Kerr as proprietor of the Hickory saloon, sought to have applied \$60 or \$70 of the unexpired license on his six months' permit, but was turned down. —La Grande Chronicle.

Berry Shippers' Union.
For the past few years considerable dissatisfaction has been experienced by many berry farmers who shipped either through the Fruitgrowers' union, or through Davidson & Co. of Hood River. As a consequence many were shipping independent. This is not always satisfactory. This year the shippers have gotten together and have organized a union and adopted by-laws. This union will mean much to the farmers of the White Salmon valley, and should receive the support of every one who desires to sell his berries at the highest prices.—Hood River Glacier.

Alleged Horse Thief Captured.
It will be remembered that a little over a year ago, a man giving his name as William Spencer hired a horse out of Jackson's barn, saying he wanted to go over in the Heppner country to buy cattle. The horse was not returned and all efforts to locate either the man or horse proved futile until last week, when a man giving his name as F. H. Bernard was recognized at Heppner as being the one wanted here for the theft of the horse. He was arrested and brought to Arlington Saturday and will be tried here as soon as he can secure

some witnesses by whom he says he can prove his innocence.—Arlington Record.

Fight Frost With Fire.
E. Z. Carbine of Fruitdale, has saved his crop of sweet cherries by burning straw among the trees during the frost periods. Two nights last week he got up at about 2 o'clock and kindled fires and kept the temperature of the cherry orchard below the frost point. Not a blossom shows the effect of cold, and Mr. Carbine thinks he has saved the crop entire. He figures that the net output will be about \$400 in value, and this will more than repay him for his trouble. —La Grande Chronicle.

Burglar's Cache Found.
Cached on the beach near the dog pound this morning, Marshal Wood found a valise containing men's underwear and a five-gallon keg of gin. His theory concerning the find is that they were stolen from a train and hid there. Mr. Wood had them brought to the recorder's office and if any one knows anything about the goods he would be glad of information.—The Dalles Chronicle.
