GENERAL NEWS.

Nan Patterson has signed a contract to go on the stage in vaudeville at \$2000 per week. She was strongly averse to returning to the stage, but her only qualifications for earning money lie in that direction.

M. A. and P. N. Newman, brothers, shot and killed Henry Blackshire, a prominent business man of Yakum, Texas. Mason is accused by the Newmans of seducing their sister and afterward being responsible for her death.

At Brookville, W. Va., masked men shot and killed Henry Blackshire. Robert McCloskey and Louis Hendricks are under arrest, charged with the murder, and Blackshire's wife is under arrest charged with instigating it to get her husband's life insurance.

At Topeka, Kan., suits have been begun by the United States against the Missouri Pacific and the Iron Mountain roads, charging them with neglecting and refusing to use safety appliances, and against the St. Louis & San Francisco for neglect of livestock in transit.

Miss Elsie Kindell was riding a pony through the streets of New Orleans, when the animal slipped and fell. Miss Kindell was badly hurt. The horse scrambled to its feet and ran away, and before the girl could be either rescued or the car stopped, a trolley car ran over the prostrate girl, who was dead when picked up.

Governor Deneen, of Illinois, has signed the anti-mob law bill, introduced by Edward D. Green, colored member from the first district, Cook county. It provides for vacation by proclamation of the sheriff's office when that official allows a prisoner to be taken from him and lynched, and also provides for a fine of \$1000 for participation in a lynching mob.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Pool jokers placed powder in a stove at Puyallup. Floyd Potts lighted a fire in the stove last night and the explosion destroyed the sight of his eyes and set fire to his clothing, burning him severely.

While helping unload a car of sawlogs at the mill at Ellensburg, Wash., Frank Young had his life instantly crushed out by three logs rolling over him. He was about 26 years old and recently arrived here from Boulder, Col.

A. D. Finch, a Great Northern conductor living at Spokane, has been committed to an insane asylum. A year ago he was slightly poisoned, and excessive vomiting developed cerebral hemorrhage, resulting in brain trouble.

Spokane will hold an interstate fair this fall. It was thought that the joint meeting of the directors and the business men might conclude not to undertake a fair this year, but on the contrary the enthusiasm and confidence waxed high and only one side of the question was entertained.

Cattle are being driven out of the Medicine country, Montana, by the encroachments of the sheep. Fourteen thousand steers and cows were driven from Havre over the line into Canada today. Cattlemen of the Medicine country have purchased a range across the line that will accommodate 250,000 cattle.

An attempt by F. B. Hawes, of Everett, to compel by mandamus the sheriff of Snohomish county and the city marshal of Everett to enforce the Sunday closing and gambling laws has failed in the supreme court of Washington. The court holds that a writ of mandate will not lie in an action to compel the continuous performance of duty on the part of a public officer.

LONG MOTOR RACE

RUNABOUTS COMING

ACROSS THE CONTINENT.

J. H. Abbott, Head of the Government Good Roads Bureau, Organized an Automobile Race With Lewis and Clark Fair as the Objective Point—First Man to Reach Hotel Portland Will Receive a Prize of \$1000.

Judge J. H. Scott, of Marion county, president of the Oregon Good Roads association, has just received the following letter from J. H. Abbott, government good roads expert, who is now on his way to Oregon to attend the national good roads convention, to be held in Portland on June 22, 23, and 24:

En Route, May 12.
Judge J. H. Scott, Salem, Ore.,
President Oregon Good Roads Association:

Dear Sir:—I have just received a letter from Oregon's million candle-power searchlight, Tom Richardson, informing me that a good roads convention had been called for May 15, at Pendleton.

I have but a moment in which to send greetings.

I am headed for Oregon myself, and hope to reach there by the opening of the national convention.

In order to stir up interest in this convention and as one means of riveting attention on the Lewis and Clark exposition, I have arranged a motor car transcontinental race, with that convention as the objective point.

Two Olds' runabouts, the simplest and lowest priced automobiles made, were selected for this trip, and started from the Waldorf-Astoria at 9:20 a. m., last Monday, May 8, on a race for \$1000, the prize to be won by the first man to reach Hotel Portland, in Portland, Oregon.

This race should call the attention of the people of the United States to many things, among others that the roads of Oregon which these cars will travel, will average better than the roads over which they will travel from New York to Chicago.

Oregon won't seem a very far country if it can be reached with such simple and inexpensive cars and soon you may reasonably expect that others will take courage to follow, where motorists are now leading and the great attractions of the north-west will be opened to the most valuable tourists you can induce to come. He will learn much that will astonish him and much about Oregon roads that will gratify as well as astonish him.

SHEEP SUPERSIDE CATTLE.

Big Wyoming Firm Sells Out Cattle Interests.

A Laramie, Wyo., dispatch to the Denver Times says: The long existing and bitter warfare which has prevailed in Wyoming and all other range states between the big cattle owners and the settlers, between the sheepmen and the cattle men, reached a new and perhaps final stage in a controversy, which was argued before the board of county commissioners here.

The situation was a decidedly peculiar one. The Swan Land and Cattle company, the last of the big cattle companies to operate in South-eastern Wyoming and perhaps in the state, is petitioning the board for a sheep trail through the foothills and is opposed by a number of small ranchmen, led by State Senator John McGill, who, although a large stock owner himself, finds that his interests are identical with his neighbors as opposed to the Swan company.

That the Swan company, which for years has been the foe of the sheepmen, should ask for a sheep trail, marks a new condition. The big cattle company is becoming a big sheep company and is alleged to be threatening the settlers within its territory with extinction from sheep in the same manner that it formerly threatened them with cattle.
