GENERAL NEWS.

Two thousand starchers employed in the Troy, N. Y., laundries, have struck for higher wages.

At Wapella, Ill., Truman Mason, aged 65, shot and killed Dr. V. Davis, and then shot and killed himself.

Commander Eva Booth, of the Salvation Army, has so far recovered that she has left Kansas City for Portland, Ore.

The United States courts have given N. G. Jung, a Chinaman sentenced to a term in the Missouri penitentiary, permission to wear his cue while in prison.

Major Carrington, of the first United States infantry, now in the Philippines, has been dismissed from the service for converting public funds to his own use.

The first missionary session of the Presbyterian general assembly at Wagona, Ind., was addressed by William J. Bryan and Justice Harlan, of the United States supreme court.

At Lincoln, Neb., Peter Kathelner, a millwright, shot and killed Miss Grace Townsley, a lieutenant in the Volunteers of America, and then shot and killed himself. Unrequited love.

The record time climbing the Eiffel tower at Paris (1000 feet) on foot, was recently made by Wild Bear, an Indian in Buffalo Bill's company. He made the ascent in just an hour and a half.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

At Prosser, Wash., Will Hayes, a gambler, and Bob Wilson, a bartender, between them took nine pistol shots at each other. Hayes was unhurt, while Wilson was shot twice in the arm.

An ancient error in surveys is responsible for the discovery that a large part of the business portion of Lewiston is out of alignment with the streets, the variation running from six inches to five feet.

Among the officers elected by the K. of P. grand lodge at Bellingham, are R. G. Parks, of Walla Walla, keeper of record and seals; inner guard, C. F. Dulin, of North Yakima; outer guard, R. W. Thatcher, of Pullman.

In Lane county John Fletcher is suing John Branton for \$10,000 damages for the loss of an eye and the breaking of his nose by a pistol shot fired at the latter last March. Branton will soon be tried for attempt to murder.

OPEN THE PORTAGE

MAY 30 WILL SEE THE LAST SPIKE DRIVEN.

Elaborate Preparations for Exercises at Big Eddy on That Date—Prominent Officials and Citizens Will Be Present to Witness the First Trainload of Freight Hauled—Mountain Gem Steamer Will Bring Large Delegation From Lewiston.

At a joint meeting of the officials and contractors, held in Portland yesterday, the date for the opening of the Cello portage road was fixed for May 30. Unless something at present unforeseen occurs, the road will be opened for business on that date.

This event will mark an important occasion for Oregon, connecting as it will the interior by closer relations with Portland and the western part of the state. It promises much for trade development and better marketing facilities for the produce of the sections beyond the Cascades.

Large representations from different parts of the state will attend the opening exercises, which promise to be impressive. The steamer Mountain Gem will come down from Lewiston, bringing a large delegation from that city, and another steamer will leave up the river from Portland, carrying prominent Portland citizens and representatives of the commercial organizations.

Addresses by leading officials of the state will mark the opening exercises, and the annual meeting of the Open River association, will occur on the steamer from Portland, which will go up the river as far as the Big Eddy. If the present arrangements can be carried out, the last spike in the road will be driven on the morning of May 30.

Arrangements in regard to the opening exercises will be made at Portland by President W. D. Wheelwright, of the Chamber of Commerce, while the Open River association will have charge of the exercises at Cello.

Robert McClelland, the engineer in charge of the work of building the road, has been made its manager. He is well known as a railroad man, having formerly been in the employ of the Oregon Railway & Navigation company, when Mr. Kennedy was head of the engineering department.

RAILROAD ACTIVITIES.

The Electric, N. P. and O. R. & N. Operations at Lewiston.

Lewiston, May 18.—The interest in the railway situation was unabated yesterday and many people visited the southern part of the city and the Tammany country, where the first work is being performed. The Lewiston & Southeastern electric road continued work at the mouth of Tammany and had a force of men employed on the old grade between the southern limits of Lewiston, and the construction camp. Additional men were added to the work as fast as secured, and it is the purpose of the company to commence work at various points on the line during the week.

The Northern Pacific surveying crew in the city commenced work yesterday on South Snake River avenue, where their line is already extended, and the survey was continued to the southern part of the city.

A report from the Golden Rule mill on Lapwai creek last night stated that the crew under Engineer Ray had been at work near the mill yesterday and are working toward Culesac. This party commenced work near the mill at the section corner on the Ben Palmer place and expect to extend the line into Culesac.

The men under Engineer Pritchard were working yesterday in the Dublin section and extended the line toward Big canyon at a point almost due north of Dublin. The survey was commenced on the township line west of Dublin and extended north and into a small canyon leading through the Mrs. A. Meek place and to Big canyon.

The O. R. & N. company has not yet showed its hand in the railroad game now being enacted, but developments may be expected today. The special trip of the steamer Spokane to Riparia is supposed to have been made to bring engineers to the Lewiston country, but a change in the plans of the company was made after the engineers had been dispatched to Riparia to meet the steamer.
