GENERAL NEWS.

It is claimed that the health of Maxim Gorky, the famous Russian author, is so much impaired that he can only live a few months.

In 1895 the whole number of horses killed in Berlin for meat was 7267. In 1900 the number had increased to 10,815, and in 1904 to about 15,000.

There is marked activity in the volcano of Kilauea, Hawaii. The flow of lava is increasing and a rising in the crater gives indications that there may be an overflow.

New York capitalists are negotiating for the purchase of the Portland street railway system.

The Salem high school baseball team now holds the undisputed high school baseball championship of the state.

J. C. Eden, assistant traffic manager of the Great Northern, has resigned. Harry B. Adams, of Portland, succeeds him.

Application has been made by Montana farmers to have the smelters at Anaconda closed because their poisonous fumes damage crops.

Sixty-two veterans of the civil war are buried at Walla Walla. A monument to the G. A. R. will be dedicated in that place with great ceremony.

Low water having stalled log driving, has caused many northwestern mills to close down of late that would otherwise be run full and overtime.

Miss Maude Babcock attempted suicide at Pullman, Wash., by taking morphine. She is said to have been insanely jealous of the attentions her sweetheart paid her younger sister.

In Thurston county, Washington, there are now 128 dairies and creameries producing over 375,000 pounds of butter. In 1890 there were but 15 dairies producing 79,667 pounds of butter.

The Montana state anti-trust law has been held unconstitutional and the beef trust cases that have been occupying the attention of the Montana courts for some months, will be appealed.

WON BY BAKER CITY

LED PENDLETON AT FIELD MEET BY ELEVEN POINTS.

Of Pendleton's 59 Points, 18 Were Won by Jay, Who Won Three Firsts—Union Team Scored a Total of 18 Only, While La Grande Was Badly Distanced—Miss Effie Smith Saved Pendleton From a Complete White-wash by Winning the Oratorical Contest.

By winning first place in the oratorical contest at Baker City Saturday Miss Effie Smith of the Pendleton high school, offset the defeat suffered by the track team in the afternoon.

The oratorical contest, which was the fourth annual affair of its kind, was held in Baker City opera house Saturday evening, and was witnessed by a large audience. Many of those in attendance were students from the various schools, and each contestant was loudly cheered in turn by his or her respective delegation.

Miss Smith's oration, "Sagejaws," came first upon the program, and the other orators with their subjects were as follows: Walter Rauter, Union, "The Moral Courage, or the Right as We See It"; Roger Tallmadge, Baker City, "The Promise of the Twentieth Century"; Earl Kilpatrick, La Grande, "Remember to Forget."

The judges of the contest were D. M. Hill, Jim Hill and Carl Helm, all of Walla Walla, and it was their decision that Miss Smith was the winner.

Baker City Won Field Meet.

The field meet was won by Baker City, 59 points; while Pendleton was second with 39; Union third, with 18, and La Grande fourth, with only 6. The meet was held at the fair grounds and was not completed until nearly 7 o'clock. The day was a cold, blustery one in Baker, and the meet was greatly retarded by the prevailing wind and hail. Especially was the weather hard upon the visiting athletes, none of whom were used to training under such climatic conditions.

The star of the meet was Jay of Pendleton, who took a total of 18 points for his school, and won three firsts. Five firsts in all were won by Pendleton, and seven by Baker City.

WILL HOLD ITS LAND.

Southern Pacific Will Wait for an Advance in Value Before Selling.

All reports to the contrary, there is no definite time as to when the railroad lands in Southern Oregon will be placed on the market, and it is more than likely that none will be sold before next year, as it is evident that the railroad company is in no hurry to dispose of its land and doubtless is waiting to see what effect on land values in Oregon that the expected boom the Lewis and Clark fair is to bring, says the Jacksonville Times.

If there is a big demand for land the company will be quite sure to re-rate its land with increased valuations on all of its lands. In a personal letter to the Times Charles W. Eberlein of San Francisco, acting land agent for the Oregon & California Railroad company, the owner of these lands, states that no date has been fixed for placing them on the market.

But Mr. Eberlein gives the intimation that the company is planning to resume sales, as he states that a new map showing their lands in Southern Oregon is in course of preparation, but will not be completed and for distribution until the lands are offered for sale.

Boston Corbett, the man who is credited with having shot Wilkes Booth, the assassin of Lincoln, owns a farm in Cloud county Kansas, but resides in Texas and refuses to enter the former state. At one time he was confined there in an asylum for the insane, but escaped, and now refuses to return, fearing to be put under restraint again.

GROW MORE CROPS.

Employ Saneer Methods of Farming and Grow More Crops.

The estimated average annual wheat yield of the United States is 540,000,000 bushels. The per capita consumption by the American people, the largest wheat eaters of the world, is 6.7 bushels, making the total estimated consumption approximately 526,000,000 bushels. It is asserted, however, that while the population is increasing the wheat yield is growing less. For this condition Secretary of Agriculture Wilson claims there is no excuse, and that extravagant methods of farming are wholly to blame. It is the old story of growing the same crops year after year and impoverishing the soil. It is Mr. Wilson's estimate that we could grow four times the present crops by saneer methods of farming.

Improve State Fair Grounds.

There is to be no state fair this year and the state fair board will expend \$15,000 in improving the grounds and buildings of that great state institution, says the Salem Journal. The mortgage has been lifted, the property is clear, and a handsome bunch of money is on hand for putting the institution in first-class shape. It is understood that some grading will be done inside, and that the sewer will be perfected in order to bring about better sanitary conditions. Some new buildings will be put up and all the others will be improved, painted and a general clean-up is on the program.

Gov. Chamberlain Appoints.

Governor Chamberlain on Saturday appointed Herman Bar of Salem; Dr. C. W. Lowe of Eugene, and E. O. Materns, of Portland, as members of the state board of optometry. He also appointed W. B. Ayer, of Portland, as a member of the state library commission.
