GENERAL NEWS.

Edward Johnson, aged 28, fell dead while running bases in a ball game at Chicago. Heart failure.

President Roosevelt reiterates his intention of calling an extra session of congress for October 15 next.

An accident to a bridge at Saybrook, Conn., tied up 2500 freight cars on the N. Y., N. H. & H. railway for one day.

The Baptist church was the first to send a colporteur to the isthmus of Panama and distribute religious literature thereon.

Acting Governor Gorgas, of the Panama canal zone, declares that on May 22 there was not a case of yellow fever on the isthmus.

During 1934 12,000,000 eggs, 5,400,000 pounds of pork and 1500 tons of beans were imported into Canada from the United States.

An event in the world of electrical science is the expiration recently of Nikola Tesla's famous patents covering the alternating current dynamo.

A 20-story tenement covering an entire block will be built in Brooklyn, N. Y., by Mrs. Oliver H. P. Belmont and other wealthy women.

Bob Shaw, an insane negro near Owensboro, Ky., shot and killed one man and wounded seven others before he was corraled in a burning house and shot to death.

Dr. L. C. H. E. Zeigler presented a bill for \$1,000,000 against Mrs. Harriett McVicker for the care of her husband, who died. He was allowed \$10,000 by the court.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

John Gray, a logger of Drury inlet, British Columbia, was fatally injured by having a leg torn off at the thigh in a logging accident.

In the vault of the Goldfield Bank & Trust company, which failed, was found \$15, and under the counter was found a \$5 gold piece.

The Moscow Mirror, founded in 1882, by C. B. Hopkins, at present United States marshal of Washington, is moving into its new building.

Horse thieves are busy around Chehalis, Wash., four being stolen from two different parties during one night. Several others have been taken of late.

Nine miles southeast of Pasco is the new town of Two Rivers, on the Columbia. An abundance of soft water has been found there at a depth of 75 feet.

Ex-Governor Miles C. Moore, of Washington, and his son Frank, lately traveled in an automobile from Walla Walla to Lewiston, a distance of 95 miles, in one afternoon.

Luke Hollingshead, aged 45, a teacher, was thrown from a back during a runaway at Smith's Plains, near Prescott, and probably fatally hurt by his skull being fractured.

A benefit ball game was played at Natatorium Park, Spokane, which netted \$1531.35. The proceeds were divided between the widows of Fireman Mero and Policeman Stotko.

Three Sisters of Charity lately sailed from Vancouver, B. C., with the intention of spending the remainder of their lives in the leper colony of Kumantou, Japan, where live 400 lepers.

The Washington home for feeble-minded will be moved, in conformance with a law passed last winter, from Vancouver to Medical Lake. The new buildings at the latter place will cost \$50,000.

LOSS TO GAMBLERS

HALF A MILLION KEPT OUT
OF PORTLAND GAMES.

Tom Word's Campaign Against the Gambling Clubs Has Cost the Gamblers From \$500,000 to \$750,000 in the Past Ten Months—This Amount of Money Has Been Left in Legitimate Channels of Circulation in Portland.

Local gamblers estimate that between \$500,000 and \$750,000 has been lost to the profession since public gambling was stopped some 10 months ago. They base their estimates on the money expended in litigation and otherwise, and on loss of revenue since games were closed, says the Oregon Daily Journal.

Persons professing to possess inside information assert that Colonel Appleton, the Kentucky sportsman, is \$35,000 on the wrong side of the ledger as a result of his efforts to break into the game in Portland. When he came to Portland, Colonel Appleton extended the hand of good fellowship to the Portland club people and declared himself in favor of peace. The offer was rudely spurned. The colonel's local manager declares that the Kentuckian has determined to enter the game in Portland, if such a thing is possible. The sum lost was in litigation and in equipping the Warwick club.

The losses of the Portland club as a result of its effort to control gambling in Portland are variously estimated. Those who are close to the proprietors declare that they lost \$2,500 at the primaries a year ago. At the general election that followed they lost \$10,000. That amount was largely in bets that Word and Manning would be defeated.

The books of the club confiscated by Sheriff Word when he raided the place show that the daily receipts of the gambling house were \$2550. The expenses, according to the books, were \$650, leaving \$2000 profit each day.

Of course this was not all clear profit.

If the books were correct, the club has lost \$600,000 since it was closed by Sheriff Word. In actual cash lost Portland club proprietors have lost heavily since public gambling was stopped. Until the old club house was leased as apartments, it is said, the expense was heavy.

The losses to the Blaziers according to conservative estimates, are \$5,000 a month. Erickson's and Fritz' earnings were not as large, according to the estimates, but the bar receipts swelled the total to an equal amount.

Losses resulting from the abolition of money slot machines are estimated from \$2000 a month upward.

The losses suffered by those who formerly conducted games of chance—such as proprietors of cigar stores—is about \$1000 a month.

The Orpheum people lost \$50,000, it is believed, and are said to be willing to lose more in the hope of eventually conducting a gambling house in Portland.

FAIR BENEFITS THE RICH.

E. Hofer of Salem, Hosts the Lewis and Clark Management.

E. Hofer, of the Salem Journal, who is now maintaining Portland headquarters, writes of the Lewis and Clark fair admission prices, as follows:

The tenting concession is under the control of G. Y. Harry, one of the members of the state board. The rates for tents have been made low, \$7.50 for two weeks and \$2.50 a week thereafter for a tenting space for a family.

It is fitted up with all sanitary appliances, and Mr. Harry has looked after all comforts and conveniences, such as water, lighting the grounds, keeping them clean. If the state board does not win out in its con-

tention for its rights on the grounds, they will all be cared for on the G. Y. Harry camp grounds.

The commutation ticket arrangements at the Lewis and Clark fair are not exactly a boon to the man of large family or one who is possessed of moderate means. You get 137 admission tickets for \$20, 50 tickets for \$12.50. Your photo goes on the same, and they are good only for yourself. Single tickets are 50 cents.

At St. Louis the commutation ticket admitted a man and his family. He had to have his picture on the ticket and be present to identify his family. But that is not as I understand the Portland arrangement.

The 137 admissions will cost a little less than 15 cents, the 50 admission 25 cents.

The wealthy Portlander or visitor will go into the fair for 12 1-2 to 15 cents. The moderately well-to-do or poor man with a family will pay 50 cents. If the great mass of the people could use a commutation family ticket, it would be a great saving and increase the attendance and receipts of the fair.

Of course, the managers want to do that very thing, but are taking a queer way to get at it. In fact, it amounts to a cinch for the rich man as usual.
