GENERAL NEWS.

A railroad tunnel near Vienna, Austria, collapsed, burying 17 men.

The mature timber on all the government timber reserves is to be offered for sale to the highest bidder.

Bob Fitzsimmons and Mike Schreck will fight 20 rounds at Salt Lake on July 4. They will meet at 163 pounds.

Judge O. L. Moore, of Abilene, Kan., has been appointed judge advocate general of the National Grand Army of the Republic.

Two tramps have been arrested at Topeka charged with trying to wreck a Santa Fe passenger train at Pauline, 10 miles from Topeka.

At Sulphur Springs, Texas, Mrs. Tipson, demented from domestic troubles, drowned herself and her three children in a creek.

Secretary John Hay's physicians at Bad Nauheim, Germany, announce a complete cure of his heart trouble and tendency toward nervous prostration.

The Chilean government will issue bonds to the amount of \$75,000,000, drawing 6 per cent, and with the proceeds build a system of government railways.

During the past 10 months the total collections of internal revenue amounted to \$193,481,098, a decrease from the 10 corresponding months of last year of \$616,810.

The American Trust & Savings Bank and Federal Trust & Savings Bank of Chicago, will consolidate, carrying a capital of \$3,000,000 and deposits of \$32,000,000.

A general strike of the cupola tenders, helpers and laborers in New York and New Jersey threatens. They demand \$3 minimum for tenders and \$2 minimum for helpers, and a nine-hour day.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Artesian water has been struck at Aberdeen on Gray's Harbor, at a depth of 170 feet.

John Olander, a Swede, hung himself at Clancy, Mont., because he could not stop liquor drinking.

Burglars robbed the dwelling of W. C. Ennis at Aberdeen and secured \$1000 in cash, jewelry and watches.

The epidemic of diphtheria at La Grande has almost completely subsided, there being now but one case in the town.

John Selby, a wealthy Montana woolgrower, was struck by lightning while riding the range near Miles City. Himself and horse were killed.

Two Portland boys—Victor H. Paquet and William D. Clarke—will graduate June 6 from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology at Boston.

Fred Cross, aged 8 years, was shot in the head and instantly killed at Big Timber, Mont., while looking into the muzzle of a gun supposed to be unloaded.

Amelia S. Marsh, of Hood River, is representing Oregon at the National Alliance of Unitarian and Other Christian Women, and was elected director from this state.

The penitentiary fute mill at Walla Walla, will turn out 2,000,000 grain sacks this year, at \$5.85 per hundred. There are orders in for 250,000 more than the capacity of the plant.

Twin Falls, Idaho, is trying to impose a yearly saloon license of \$2000. Six saloonkeepers refuse to pay and have been arrested and will carry the issue to the supreme court.

J. M. Powers has been chosen superintendent of the Salem city schools, to succeed L. R. Traver, who goes to Pendleton. Forty-two teachers are employed for the Salem schools this year.

WHEAT KING CONLEY

PIONEER OF OREGON SHIPS 100,000 BUSHELS A YEAR.

Was Once a Freighter From Umatilla Landing—Later Took Up Land in Lower Cove, Union County, and Now Owns 7000 Acres of Choice Wheat Land in Union County—Operates a Complete Settlement on His Own Farms.

A. B. Conley, the wheat king of Grand Ronde valley, is in the city today on a business trip and told many reminiscences of the old freight team days in which he hauled tons and tons of freight from Umatilla Landing through the village of Pendleton to the Idaho mines.

Mr. Conley is one of a half a dozen men in Oregon who ship 100,000 bushels of wheat out of the Eastern Oregon counties every year. He formerly lived on his magnificent wheat tract in the lower cove district in Grand Ronde valley, but he finally moved to La Grande where he resided a few years, and he now lives in Portland.

Conley spur on the Elgin branch of the O. R. & N., was built especially to accommodate Mr. Conley in shipping his immense crops and he has long been the heaviest wheat shipper in that valley.

Before Mr. Conley began farming in Grand Ronde valley he operated a string of freight teams across the Blue mountains and tells many interesting stories of the early days. When he located on the wheat land that has made him famous the country over, as well as making him almost a millionaire, he was hooted at by his more "wise" neighbors who would not locate that sand hill land under any circumstances.

But Mr. Conley, with the eye of a seer, bought, located, traded for and pre-empted every acre of that land that he could possibly get possession of and finally today owns about 7000 acres in the heart of the wheat belt, and operates a miniature settlement within his own farms.

He operates 10 threshing crews, a dozen headers, and as many steam and horse power outfits and really farms on the largest scale of any man in Eastern Oregon. When his harvest is on in full blast as many as 100 teams are busy hauling his crops to the Conley warehouses, on the O. R. & N. branch line and his farms are scenes of typical western activity the entire year.

"I have served my time at hard work," said Mr. Conley to the East Oregonian today, "and now I am taking it easy. I expect to enjoy the Lewis and Clark fair to the fullest degree this season. I am going to live near the grounds and will spend a great deal of my time viewing the features of the fair."

NORTH M'KAY ITEMS.

Barney Crowner is Again in a Critical Condition.

North McKay, May 24.—With frost and cold winds the gardeners are rather discouraged. Barney Crowner, whose many friends were recently encouraged at the prospect of speedy recovery, is suffering a relapse and is now in a critical condition.

The team lost on the night of May 15 by Martin Markeson, was taken from his ranch on the river bottom, onto the railroad track to Barnhart's, where the thieves stole two saddles belonging to Mr. Smith, the sheepman, rode them to Pendleton, where all trace seems to be lost.

The Hill Bros. have leased the ranch of Mr. Rath, adjoining the homestead claim of Gust Hill, for one year.

The school board is negotiating for a male teacher for district 29. David Baughman, who bought the old Hill ranch, is planning many improvements in regard to the buildings, as also in irrigation.

A fine mare belonging to Ed Dupuis was stolen from his pasture Tuesday night. The animal was traced to a point near the mouth of Birch creek, and there all trace was lost.

Harvard Men to Study Iceland. Boston, Mass., May 25.—This is the date set for the departure of the Harvard geological expedition to Iceland, headed by Professor T. A. Jaggar of Mt. Pelee fame. The explorers go first to Leith, Scotland, whence they will proceed by schooner to Reykjavik. The object of the expedition is to study the volcanic phenomena of the island, which is still covered with the same ice sheets and glacial formation under which Europe was buried ages ago.

Commencement at Tuskegee. Tuskegee, Ala., May 25.—This was commencement day at the Tuskegee Normal and Industrial Institute. Many visitors were on hand and the chapel was crowded when the exercises began this afternoon. President Booker T. Washington presented the diplomas and the Rev. C. C. Walker, D. D., LL. D., principal of Walker Normal and Industrial Institute, delivered the annual address.

Clergyman Begins 100th Year. Cambridge, Mass., May 25.—The Rev. William Howe, the oldest Baptist clergyman in the United States, observed his 99th birthday at his home here today. Many friends called to pay their respects to the veteran clergyman, and scores of telegrams and letters of congratulation were received from Baptists and others in many parts of the country.

Will Rebuild Wallowa Hotel. R. McRae, proprietor of the Wallowa hotel, was in the city this week as a witness in the McBain case. Mr. McRae suffered a heavy loss in the Wallowa fire, but has commenced work on a new and better building than the one destroyed.—Enterprise Democrat.
