GENERAL NEWS.

Jeremiah Fitzpatrick, a wealthy glass manufacturer of New York, has brought suit against his son James, for over \$1,000,000 in bonds, securities and realty which he claims the latter swindled him out of.

A lemon pie from one of the large bakeries in Chicago, has been analyzed, with the result that it was found to contain no lemon, butter or eggs. It was made of starch, paste and various products of coal tar.

The deepest gold mine in the world is at Bendigo, Australia. The mine in question is the New Chum railway mine, and its main shaft is sunk to the depth of 3900 feet, or only 60 feet short of three-quarters of a mile.

The latest estimate is that there are more than 10,000 millionaires in the world, of whom half live in the United States, one-fourth in England and the larger portion of the remainder in Germany, France and India.

Order of Railroad Telegraphers was formed in 1886 with 27 members. A year later at its first annual meeting it had 3000, and now, after 19 years' work, it numbers close on 40,000, or practically all the railroad telegraphers in the United States and Canada.

Miss Vesta Tilley, an English girl, who has signed a contract for a six weeks' engagement to sing in New York, is to receive \$10 for every minute she sings. Her salary amounts to \$2500 per week, and she will not spend more than 250 minutes on the stage each week.

Mary Ellen Lease, the famous lecturer and politician, formerly of Kansas, but now living in New York city, was robbed of \$500 cash and much valuable jewelry, silverware and bric-a-brac by two men, one of whom held a pistol to her head while the other operated.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Insurance companies threaten to raise the rates at North Yakima on account of the destructive fires in that place during the past year.

The De Beaumont wool clip of 45,000 pounds, has been contracted for at 20 cents per pound straight. The De Beaumont ranches are on the Snake river.

Suit has been brought against ex-United States Marshal F. G. Ramsey, of Idaho, for \$488, alleged shortage in the funds of the office. He was marshal from 1899 to 1902.

Governor Mead will appoint as the two last members of the state board of railroad commissioners Judge S. J. Chadwick, of Whitman, and John S. McMillan, of Roche Harbor.

There is a great shortage of laborers and sub-contractors for railroad building in Alaska, and there is a prospect of at least temporary abandonment of work on that account.

The heirs of the Robert Wingate estate in Tacoma, will test the new probate law in this state. Under the old law the fee would be 60 cents, but by the new, the fee being based upon the valuation of the estate, which is more than \$50,000, the charges for filing are \$125.

Six saloonkeepers arrested at Twin Falls, Idaho, for not paying a license of \$2000 a year each are fighting the ordinance. The trustees of the town say that they are ready for the battle, and will continue to arrest the liquor dealers every day until the saloonkeepers are either closed or the proprietors take out licenses.

Governor Toole, of Montana, has pardoned Eric Michaelson, who was sentenced to the penitentiary on a charge of safe blowing. It has been quite conclusively proven that Michaelson was railroaded into the penitentiary by unscrupulous railroad officers and detectives who were determined to convict somebody.

PORTLAND POLITICS

E. HOFER REVIEWS MUNICIPAL CAMPAIGN.

Dr. Harry Lane Appeals to All the Better Class of Citizens. But Williams Has a "Clutch" on the Sporting Element—Williams a Favorite With Saloonmen and Gamblers—Outcome is Doubtful.

Following is a graphic resume of Portland politics, written by Editor E. Hofer of the Salem Journal, who is maintaining Portland headquarters and furnishing hot criticisms on many things in the metropolis.

Dr. Harry Lane is putting up a snappy fight for the majority of Portland. Whether you like him or not, his speeches are racy. He seems to think it makes a slight difference whether one row of bricks or two or three go into a sewer wall. He throws down the gauntlet to the dive-keeper and the walking delegate and for the prostitute who leads a fuzzy blanketed poodle by a string.

He asks the support of the women and that is always good politics. In talking with those who cater to the sporting element I learn that they blame Tom Word, the democratic sheriff, for whatever there is of a closed town. They say Blazier, who keeps some of the largest places of amusement, spent \$10,000 to elect Word and his house was one of the first closed up. These men say Williams is their friend and the champion of an open town.

Joseph Fones, a policeman, says there has been great improvement under Williams. The policemen do not get drunk and gamble as they used to do. A saloonman on Washington street says he is forced to close at midnight, while the big concert saloons and gambling houses are allowed to run all night. He has lost \$2000 the past year and curses the Williams administration.

Jerry Lusich, the Greek oyster house man, who has been in Portland for 20 years, says the town is dead because the sporting element are under the ban of Tom Word and that Williams is all right.

A bunch of sports who follow the race track, arrived from 'Frisco on the boat Thursday morning, and told me Portland was the best town on the coast after the Bay City for their profession. I figure it all up that if Williams gets any republican votes he will be elected by from 100 to 500 majority. For he certainly is solid with the sporting classes.

On the other hand, Dan Vollmer, a Salem man who holds a chair in one of the big barber shops, says there is the same talk and feeling in the air was when Word and Manning and Chamberlain were elected. He says the race will be close and Lane may win. He says the independent voters who get no graft out of politics are all for Lane.

Now, there you have all I have heard on the subject at Portland, circulating not in the Arlington or Commercial clubs, but among the mudsill element of society, down among the common substratum of society, where people are more apt to have real feelings and express honest thoughts.

THE SHORTEST LINE.

A One-Mile Railroad With a Hundred-Mile Name.

One of the shortest railroad lines in the United States, and a road which has one of the longest names, is the New York Central, Hudson River & Fort Orange railroad, which is one mile long.

The road is located in New York state, and is an independent proposition, never having been absorbed by any of the big railroad syndicates of the East.

The last issue of the official railroad report, recently received, shows that the rolling stock of the company consists of one locomotive.

A western man is secretary of the corporation. Colton Woodworth, formerly of Atchison, occupied the position of secretary. C. C. Woodworth is the other officer of the company. He answers to the titles of president, treasurer and general manager. His home is in Castleton, New York. This railroad is believed to be the smallest in the country conducted by a separate corporation.

AGAINST DRUG PEDDLERS.

New Law Will Put Many Fakers Out of Business.

Itinerant vendors, or peddlers of patent medicines, drugs, etc., are not kindly or amicably disposed toward section 3 of the law which was passed by the last legislature, delegating additional powers to the state board of pharmacy, and the present indications are that they will rebel to the extent of making a test of the objectionable section, in the courts.

This section of the act provides that before any itinerant or traveling vendor, or hawk, or any drug, nostrum, ointment or application of any kind for the treatment of disease or injury, offers his wares for sale in this state, he shall take out a yearly license with the board of pharmacy by paying to the treasurer the sum of \$200.

AN IMPRESSIVE SERMON.

Veteran of the Civil War Speaks on Memorial Sunday.

A Memorial sermon was preached yesterday morning at the Thompson Street church by Rev. Tallman. The church was well filled for the occasion by members of the G. A. R. and their relatives and friends. The speaker is himself a veteran of the civil war, and is now in his 77th year. Consequently his discourse was of more than usual impressiveness, and was listened to with great attention by his hearers.

MONTANA'S WOOL CLIP.

Many Sheepmen Are Saying "Four Pounds for a Dollar."

Montana's wool clip for this season will aggregate slightly more than 42,000,000 pounds, and of this amount more than 25,000,000 pounds have been contracted for on the sheep's backs at prices averaging about 21 cents a pound. It is estimated that there are 7,000,000 sheep in Montana and the average clip will be about six pounds.

Thus Montana sheepmen will realize close to \$8,000,000 for wool alone, and as the price for mutton is above the usual figure, the year will be one of the most prosperous in the history of the state so far as sheepmen are concerned.

Never before in the history of the state has there been such activity on the part of buyers for Eastern houses. Indeed, the buying of wool on the animals' backs will have the effect of

cutting away with the wool markets this year.

In ordinary years the wool is carted to the principal centers—Great Falls, Billings, Big Timber and Dillon—to be examined and bid upon by the Eastern representatives. These sales generally begin on July 4, but it is predicted that ere that date approaches this season upward of 90 per cent of the clip will have been contracted.

As usual, Boston and Philadelphia houses have secured the bulk of the clips although St. Louis, Chicago and New York firms are beginning to send agents into the field, their houses having been advised of the unusual proceedings, with the result that automobiles, livery teams and horses are being made use of by the buyers in their almost unseemly scramble to get wool.

At least two clips have been sold at better than 24 cents a pound, one Fergus county clip bringing 25 cents. A popular cry among the ranchers in Northern Montana is "Four pounds for a dollar," and not a few are holding off for this figure.

British Museum Dome.

The reading room of the British museum is crowned by a spacious dome, which is about thirty feet wider than that of St. Paul's cathedral. It is 140 feet in diameter and, with its 60,000 superficial feet of glass, springs more than 100 feet in height. Neither St. Peter's at Rome nor Santa Maria at Florence is a match to it. It is larger by forty-five feet than the dome of the capitol at Washington, by thirty-five feet than that of Darmstadt cathedral, by thirty-three feet than that of St. Sophia, Constantinople, and spreads sixteen feet further than the conical roof of the tomb of Mohammed Adil Shah at Bijapur.

State Librarian Appointed.

Salem, May 27.—In accordance with the provisions of an act passed by the last legislature the supreme court held consultation yesterday afternoon and elected James B. Putnam state librarian to succeed himself. His salary, as is also fixed by law, is \$1,250 per annum and is to be paid monthly and in the same manner as the other state officers are paid.
