THE FAIR OPENING

SPLENDOR OF LEWIS

AND CLARK EXPOSITION.

President Will Touch Golden Key in the White House and the Intricate Machinery Will Be Set in Motion—Vast Collection of Products and Wonders of the World's Industries and Arts.

Portland, Ore., May 29.—The Lewis and Clark exposition will open next Thursday morning at 8 o'clock. At noon the president's signal, flashed from Washington, will set in motion the chimes in the towers of the United States government building, and the pealed strains of "America" will declare to the world that the Western World's fair is formally opened.

The fair might have been opened last week and been more nearly ready than other fairs have usually been on the opening days; and when the gates are thrown open on Thursday, there will be a sense of completeness about the enterprise which will gladden the hearts of the Oregonians who have stood by the project with money and good cheer and who have very great hopes for its success.

The exposition takes its name from two hardy explorers, Captains Meriwether Lewis and William Clark who, with a little band of followers, pierced the wilderness 100 years ago and discovered an overland route to the Pacific ocean, thereby adding by right of discovery and exploration a territory of 307,000 square miles to the holdings of the United States on the American continent.

While smaller than the expositions held at Chicago and St. Louis, this exposition is by great odds the biggest thing ever attempted in the Pacific Northwest. Its world's aspect is secured by participation by many foreign countries, while state participation is extensive, and the United States government has a display and buildings which represent an expenditure of \$300,000. The fair has cost \$5,000,000 so far, and its exhibit palaces contain displays worth five times as much.

The Trail is the exposition's amusement street. The gaudy, picturesque theaters and similar structures crowd one another on each side of a wide avenue.

The arrangement of the exhibit buildings, close together yet not crowded, is admirable, as it makes it possible to see the fair without the long weary miles of walking that will be remembered so vividly by the visitors to earlier expositions.

The main exhibit buildings cluster at the crest of a gentle slope which leads from the lake shore. Gravel walks intersect grass plots which separate the buildings, and on the hillside the vivid green of the grass contrasts delightfully with the pink and red and yellow of the flower beds which lie like polka dots on the bosom of the slope.

The tall towers of the main government building are reflected pleasingly in the placid lake, while in the near distance lies the silvery Willamette, and half a hundred miles farther four snow-capped mountains—Hood, Rainier, St. Helens and Adams—pierce the sky. To the left—the east—the foothills of the Cascades, clothed in shrubbery, with an occasional tall fir tree, reach down to the water's edge. In the western part of the grounds, there are experimental gardens in a canyon which separates the grounds proper from the foothills, and on the slope leading to the canyon the natural woodland has been maintained, except that here and there a tree has been culled out in order to let a more beautiful tree flourish, and again attractive shrubbery has been planted in fitting places.

This part of the site, which is called Centennial park, is one of the most attractive features of the fair, offering a glimpse of Oregon's natural woodland glories. Gravel walks with steps of logs at every slight ascent, cross and re-cross the shady recesses of the park, and numerous rustic benches offer rest to the weary. Of the artificial features of the fair the most noteworthy and wonderful is the Forestry building, an immense structure of rough-hewn forest giants which covers half a city block, and is in itself an eloquent exponent of one of the chief wealth resources of the land which Lewis and Clark made part of Uncle Sam's domain.

Within the spacious exhibits buildings the displays are in general such as have been seen at earlier fairs. A policy of segregation adopted some time ago provides that all exhibits from oriental nations shall be housed in one building, and all European exhibits in another. Japan has more than half of the space in the Oriental building. A continuation of the segregation policy gives states the privilege of showing their displays in their own buildings instead of scattering them among the different exhibits palaces, and in every case where a state has erected a building this has been done. Every Western state is generously represented.

The exposition will be open until October 15, every day. The gates will be opened at noon on Sundays.

EUGENE HAS SIX THOUSAND.

But Census Figures Must Be Stretched to Reach the Mark.

Eugene, May 29.—Raleigh Roney has practically completed the work of taking the census of South Eugene precinct, No. 1, and Fairmount, South No. 1 contains about 1600 people, while there are just about 500 people in Fairmount. This suburb has made a remarkable growth during the last three years.

Estimating from the figures at hand so far, Assessor Keeney thinks the population of the city is a trifle short of 6000. However, there may have been a number over that the census taker has failed to enumerate, and if they report to the assessor the total may reach 6000 or over.
