GENERAL NEWS.

Vesuvius is on a tear, a new crater having been developed and the funicular railroad is badly damaged.

It is now believed that a special session of congress will not be called until the middle or last of October, if at all.

In San Francisco harbor the steamer Arctic ran down a gasoline launch, drowning Engineer Howell and Alexander Miller.

The regular grazing regulations of the interior department do not apply this year to forest reserves set apart since May 1 of this year.

Geronimo, the famous Apache chief, who is believed to be not less than 80 years of age, recently rode in a horse race at Lawton, Okl.

Secretary John Hay is in Paris en route to America. He is quite well, but by orders from his physicians refuses to attend any social functions whatever.

Reports have reached the treasury department that Japanese fishermen are poaching in Aleutian waters, and a revenue cutter has been sent to investigate.

Twenty photographs of the canals of the planet Mars were recently taken at the Lowell university, Arizona. They are the best ever taken from any point of view.

J. G. Jenkins has just relinquished the premiership of South Australia, to become that colony's fiscal agent at London. Jenkins was born in Susquehanna county, Pennsylvania.

The scavengers of Stockholm, Sweden, went on strike, during which there was much rioting, resulting in the authorities interfering and completely disorganizing the strike movement.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

An abundance of water, but at a depth of 500 feet, has been struck on the Rathdrum prairie, Idaho. It will be raised by steam and gasoline power.

W. R. Smith, of Elmira, has brought suit for \$300 damages to his reputation by J. E. Montgomery circulating the story that he, Smith, stole his oats.

The Mountain Gem, heavily laden, ran (upstream) from Lewiston to Eureka, a distance of 60 miles, in 10 hours—the best upstream time ever made on the Snake river.

Herman Swartz, a saloon swamper, suicided by shooting himself through the head in Spokane. Fifteen years ago he was in the liquor business in Spokane for himself, and was well-to-do.

Pullman, Wash., is clamoring for a larger and more efficient electric lighting plant. It is now lighted by the state's plant at the agricultural college, and it is not large enough to meet the needs of Pullman, which is growing.

A log raft 700 feet long, drawing 25 feet and containing 8,000,000 feet of lumber, is to be towed from Seattle to San Francisco. The shipping men are afraid it may break up en route and cover the sea with dangerous floating timbers.

The home of James Ferrier, a well-to-do stockman living 12 miles from Ritzville, Wash., was burned with all its contents, by being in some unexplained way set on fire by the 5-year-old daughter who was left alone in the house. No insurance.

An O. R. & N. conductor who is especially well known to old residents of Tekoa, was Victor E. Ford. He left there in the '90s, and is now proprietor of a large shoe establishment in Pueblo, Mexico. He is prosperous, and has accumulated a fortune of \$50,000.

IS DECORATION DAY

GENERALLY OBSERVED
IN THE UNITED STATES.

With Speeches, Prayer and Strewing of Flowers, the Citizens, Accompanied by Military and Quasi-Military Organizations, Gather at Widely Separated Points to Do Honor to the Nation's Dead—Union and Confederate ex-Soldiers Co-operate in Many Places.

Boston, Mass., May 29.—There was a general observance of Decoration Day throughout New England today. In every city and town where a Grand Army post is located, the veterans marched to the cemeteries and held memorial exercises, followed by the decorations of the graves of departed comrades. In many places, too, union services were held in the churches.

The day generally marked the opening of the golfing, yachting, canoeing and horse racing season. Rowing races took place on the Charles river in this city and a number of other sporting and athletic contests were pulled off.

Nation Honors Its Dead Soldiers. Washington, D. C., May 29.—The observance of Memorial Day in the national capital today was along the lines of similar observances of the past. Business was everywhere suspended and public and private buildings displayed flags. At all of the ceremonies in Washington and vicinity the Grand Army veterans and the members of other patriotic societies held appropriate exercises and joined in the decoration of the soldiers' graves.

At the Arlington national cemetery there was dedicated with appropriate ceremonies a monument to General Daniel Macaulay, of the Eleventh Indiana regiment. General John C. Black, former commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, delivered the oration of the day.

Cincinnati, O., May 29.—Decorations Day was observed here by a general suspension of business, by a parade of G. A. R. posts and Spanish war veterans, children of the public schools, and various civic organizations. The principal exercises of the day were held at Spring Grove cemetery.

San Juan, P. R., May 29.—Dead-day Americans and natives united today in the observance of Memorial Day. The graves of a score of American soldiers here and at Ponce and Mayaguez were decorated, and all of the graves of a number of Porto Rican soldiers.

Hagerstown, Md., May 29.—Memorial Day exercises on Antietam battlefield today were attended by several thousand persons. There was an imposing procession, patriotic addresses by speakers of note, and a salute from a battery of guns.

Louisville, Ky., May 29.—The veterans of the Spanish war joined today with the local G. A. R. posts in the decoration of the graves of 5000 Union soldiers in Cave Hill cemetery. There was a program of memorial addresses and music.

Canton, O., May 29.—Many beautiful floral offerings from widely separated portions of the country were received here today to be placed on the tomb of President McKinley. Included among the offerings was a magnificent wreath from the White House conservatory. Exercises at the cemetery were participated in by the Grand Army veterans, the organization of Spanish war veterans and the guard of the regular army stationed to guard the tomb of the martyred president.

Blue and the Gray. New York, May 29.—Today witnessed what was probably the most notable observance of Memorial Day ever held in the metropolis. The special and distinguishing features of the day's exercises were the joint participation of Confederate and Union veterans in the day's ceremonies.

The exercises in New York were centered about Grant's tomb and were participated in by thousands of veterans. The exercises were under the auspices of the members of U. S. Grant post, G. A. R., who had as their special guests 400 members of the local camp of Confederate veterans. The address of the day was delivered by Senator Blackburn of Kentucky.

Portage la Prairie, Man., May 30.—With a record breaking attendance the Manitoba Sunday School association opened its 26th annual convention here today. The gathering was formally called to order at 2 o'clock this afternoon and the initial session was devoted to welcomes and responses and the transaction of routine business. Those present numbered several hundred and came from all parts of the province.

The sessions will continue until Friday and will be made notable by addresses from several Sunday school workers of wide fame. The reports of the several officers show that the number of Sabbath schools and the membership continues to increase at a gratifying rate.

MOST PRESIDENTS

WERE MASONS.

Eighty-Seven Per Cent of the Two Houses of Congress Are Masons—John Q. Adams Was Anti-Masonic—Though His Father Was a Strong Mason.

Both President Roosevelt and Vice President Fairbanks went into masonry after they had been elected to office of vice-president. Colonel Roosevelt was elected to that office in November, 1900, and before the winter was over he had become a member of Matinecock lodge, at Oyster Bay, New York. He has been elected to receive the degrees in the Royal Arch chapter, but has never taken them, because of the pressure of public business. He might take these degrees during his summer vacations at Oyster Bay, but this would attract so much attention as to embarrass him and the chapter at that place, and so he has decided to wait until after his term as president has expired and he is once more a private citizen.

Mr. Fairbanks took the symbolic blue lodge degrees at Indianapolis, under dispensation from the grand master of Indiana, during the holiday recess last year. The three degrees being conferred in one day. He has since taken the chapter degrees, also under dispensation, and in one day. It is said to be his purpose during the present year to take the remaining degrees of the York rite, ending with that of Knight Templar, and then to take the Scottish Rite degree, up to and including the thirty-second. He will thus be shown all the mysteries of the order far ahead of the man whose place in the White House he is so anxious to fill after 1908.

Presidents as Masons.

It is rather a noteworthy fact that the majority of presidents of the United States, from Washington to Roosevelt, have been members of the Masonic fraternity. In the later years the best known of these are Garfield, Harrison and McKinley, with Roosevelt, Garfield was a Knight Templar and held his membership in all the York rite bodies in this city. He was a charter member of a Washington lodge and remained on its rolls until his death. McKinley was also a Knight Templar, but his membership was in Ohio.

Only one president was avowedly anti-Masonic. John Quincy Adams came into the presidency during the

Morgan excitement and he talked and wrote against the order with all his might for many years. His distinguished father, John Adams, however, was an enthusiastic Mason and was buried with Masonic honors. Andrew Jackson was at one time grand master of the grand lodge of Tennessee.

Masons in Congress.

An informal poll was made of the two houses of congress a few days ago by a Washington Mason, and it was discovered that more than 87 per cent of the members of the house were in the order, and more than 80 per cent of the members of the senate.

Washington's Known as a Mason.
