Prominent Sheepman Dead.
S. L. Calloway, a prominent sheepman of Idaho, died unexpectedly about 6 o'clock Wednesday morning, May 17, from the effects of spotted fever.

About 10 days previous to his death Mr. Calloway came in from the range on the South Boise for medical treatment. He appeared to be recovering satisfactorily and only the Monday morning previous to his demise he was up and around the house jokingly asserting his intention of going down town a little later to see his friends and business associates. As late as Tuesday evening Mr. Calloway's condition was encouraging, but within a few hours alarming symptoms developed, which baffled all efforts to overcome.—Boise Statesman.

Dallas City Stove in.

Poor old steamer, Dallas City seems to be traveling under an unlucky star, and is now in the bonnyard at Portland, so badly disabled that it will probably take a month to fix her up again. Down near Linnton, this morning about 7:30, the Spencer ran into her wheel, tearing it badly, breaking the cylinder and piston and maiming her so that she was compelled to put back to Portland. The company claims that the Spencer was wholly to blame, and a suit will probably result. The Gatzert took in her passengers and brought them up. She will now remain on the run until the Dallas City is repaired.—The Dallas Chronicle.

Fruit in Klickitat.

Fruit Inspector Ingram has just returned from a trip to Western Klickitat, including the Glenwood country. He found considerable fruit injured by the late severe frosts. In other parts of the county the frosts have done much harm and the fruit crop is going to be somewhat cut down in quantity. There are now, he says, some good orchards in the Glenwood section, and more being planted. There has been an abundance of rain in Western Klickitat, and crops in the main look well.—Golden-Sentinel.

Advertising Idaho.

Col. Allan Miller, state irrigation commissioner, left Sunday evening for Bear Lake and Oneida counties, where he will meet the county officials and prominent residents with a view to securing statistics on the products of the country, and to get them interested in a plan to advertise the state. Colonel Miller will soon have visited every county in the state except Blaine, Lemhi and Custer. He will be visited later on. He reports great interest being taken by officials

everywhere in the forthcoming pamphlet on Idaho resources that is to be printed soon for distribution among tourists going through to the exposition.—Boise Capital News.

Big Trout Catch.

Mayor Charles A. Johns, ex-Mayor C. M. Sage of this city, and Cato J. Johns, the Sumpter merchant, were a notable trio of fishermen that returned Sunday evening from Olive lake. In 13 hours actual fishing time, the trio landed 893 and brought exactly 850 to Sumpter, where they divided their catch in parcels for presentation to their friends. As a result, many Baker City people had trout for breakfast yesterday morning. The catch was the largest ever recorded from the waters of Olive lake.—Baker City Democrat.

No Y. M. C. A. at Baker City.

The movement for the establishment in Baker City of a branch Y. M. C. A. has been abandoned for the present. The state secretary advises that it is the better plan to wait for organization in districts of this kind until sufficient funds have been raised for the erection of a building and Y. M. C. A. home in order to save rents and unnecessary expenses, which usually kill the enterprise almost at its inception.—Baker City Democrat.

Northern Idaho Prospering.

Congressman Burton L. French, who is in the city today to deliver the Memorial Day address, said this morning that North Idaho was in a very prosperous condition and that the country was profiting by a large immigration. He stated that all of the towns in the Panhandle were enjoying a good, substantial growth. The fruit crop, he said, had been severely damaged by the late frosts and that not over half a crop would be gathered.—Boise Capital News.

S. H. Hays, who went to Chicago to close up the deal for the sale of the bonds of the Canyon Canal Co., has returned. The transaction was completed and the contract for the construction of the canal will soon be in shape and the contract signed. The contract has been given to the Faris-Keel Construction company.—Boise Statesman.
