GENERAL NEWS.

Granger is the name of a new town that is being laid out 11 miles west of Sunnyside, Wash., on the line of a branch of the Northern Pacific about to be built.

Charles J. Bonaparte will succeed Paul Morton as secretary of the navy. Bonaparte is a grand nephew of Napoleon Bonaparte, first consul of France and is 34 years of age.

New York teamsters will not be ordered out on sympathetic strike with their Chicago brethren, but will be assessed 5 cents per day each for the support of the strike. This assessment will provide \$1000 per day.

Mrs. L. J. Gulick, the widow of an artist, was waiting for a train at Oulton station the other day, when she suddenly fell dead, says the London Mail. She had walked a mile to the station and was apparently in her usual health. About 10 years ago her husband fell dead on the same spot, under exactly similar circumstances.

At McArthur, O., Mrs. Emma Flynn saw a man whom she supposed as being a tramp, looking at her through a window at night when she was alone, and shot at him. The face disappeared. The next morning the dead body of her brother-in-law, J. M. Specht, was found not far away. Specht was a wealthy and influential farmer and miller.

A new rotary engine, which the inventor thinks will revolutionize the construction of steam engines, has just been patented by A. F. Ford, a merchant of Colfax, Wash.

The body of a man who was killed by a train at the Fifteenth street bridge in Tacoma, was identified as that of Thomas Daly, a puglist who has lately lived in Seattle.

Until such officer does arrive, care is being taken by the officers here to see that the young woman does no more risky stunts as she did the other night. They regard it as a wonder that she was not hurt in her descent from the second story of the court house, as it is a long drop, and a stone sidewalk is directly under the window. However, by means of the two long, double blankets tied together, the trick was done.

On being retaken last evening Miss Darling stated she had attended the dance after her escape, and then with a male companion secured a room at a Main street lodging house. During the afternoon she came out and took a ride into the country and returned in time for the train in the evening. However, her plans were then interrupted by the appearance of Deputy Blakeley.

ACADEMY PRIZES AWARDED.

Miss Pearl Porter Takes Whitman Scholarship and Second Prize for Greek.

Three prizes were awarded to the graduating class of Pendleton academy on Wednesday evening—a first prize of \$20 for the best Greek scholar, given by Rev. Robert McKenzie, pastor of Rutgers Presbyterian church in New York city, which was awarded to Elmer Yates, a second prize of \$10 given by Principal W. H. Bleakney, of the academy, and awarded to Miss Pearl Porter, and a third valuable prize being a free scholarship in Whitman college, given by that institution to the graduate from Pendleton academy having the highest grade at the close of their school course, which was also won by Miss Pearl Porter. Miss Porter will attend Whitman next year on this scholarship.

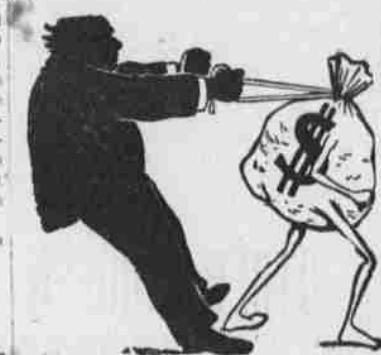
