JUNE TERM OF COURT PROMISES TO BE LONG.

First Grand Jury in This County for a Number of Years Will Be Drawn Jury-The Preston Homicide Case is the Most Important Before This

On Monday the June term of circuit court for this county will com-mence at 10 a. m., and from all indications it will be an unusually long

and interesting session.
One of the first things done after court convenes will be the selection of a grand jury to investigate such matters as shall come before it. The method of selecting the jury is to draw the names of the jurors from a box, the first seven taken constituting the grand jury. They will then go into session and may continue their business as long as the term of court lasts. In presenting matters before the grand jury the procedure followed is to lay them before either the foreman of the jury, or before the district attorney. draw the names of the jurers from a trict attorney.

The coming grand jury will be the first one for this county for a number of years, and in all probability there will not be another one called for some time to come. District Attorney Phelps called attention to this fact this morning, and urged those who have business for the jury to see that it is duly presented before that body.


