#### GENERAL NEWS.

Miss Thompson, an Englishwoman, won the international woman's golf tournament.

At Durban, Natal, South Africa, 130 Chinese coolies were drowned by the bursting of a reservoir.

Ex-Congressman John M. Mitchell of New York, is dead at Tuxedo Park by cancer of the intestines.

A cablegram announces that the transport Sherman has arrived at Manila from San Francisco with small-pox aboard.

The Whitby division of Yorkshire, England, for 20 years a conservative stronghold, has elected Buxton, a Liberal, to parliament.

Robert Wilkinson Furnas of Brownsville, Neb., governor of Nebraska from 1873 to 1875, died June 1 of diabetes in a Lincoln hospital.

C. W. Kendrick, U. S. consul at Ciudad, Mexico, is dead by consumption, aged 52. He was a reporter and magazine writer from New Orleans.

The German government has decided to increase the size of its new battleships from 13,200 to 16,900 tons, to equal American and British ships.

M. K. Vanderpool and wife of Whitley county, Ky., are aged 63 and 60, respectively. They are the parents of 25 children, of whom 21 are living.

The Japanese official report states that 113 men were killed and 424 wounded in the battle of the Sea of Japan. These figures are under the original estimates.

Herbert C. Andrews of Los Angeles, is dead at Chicago of chirolosia of the liver. Though a young man, he was distinguished as the greatest American authority on heraldry and genealogy.

Lieutenant General Chaffee, Brigadier General Franklin Bell and William Crozier have been selected to represent the United States at the French army maneuvers in September.

#### NORTHWEST NEWS.

Dr. J. W. Givens, superintendent of the Blackfoot insane asylum has been removed, and Dr. C. A. Hoover of Montpelier, appointed to succeed him.

The Fitzgerald sawmill, situated on Long's Prairie, near Port Angeles, Wash., was burned. The fire was of unknown origin. Partial insurance only.

Never before in the history of Yellowstone park has the tourist travel been so great at this time of the year, so promises to be so great during the remainder of the season.

Oliver Atkins disappeared near Albridge, Mont., in December last. His body was found June 1 in a small lake. Apparently he had broken through the ice six months ago, and drowned.

At Butte, Mrs. Clementine DeRosier, temporarily deranged, blew out her brains with a heavy revolver. She was 35 years of age, and wife of the purchasing agent of the Montana Ore Purchasing smelter.

Under the annual readjustment of postmasters' salaries, the following increases were announced for Washington: Aberdeen, \$2300 to \$2400; Arlington and Cle-Elum, \$1200 to \$1400; Ballard and Colfax, \$2200 to \$2300; Centralia, \$1900 to \$2000; Elms, \$1300 to \$1400.

## MEETS ON MONDAY

JUNE TERM OF COURT PROMISES TO BE LONG.

First Grand Jury in This County for a Number of Years Will Be Drawn—Mr. Phelps Urges the Early Presentation of Evidence Before the Jury—The Preston Homicide Case is the Most Important Before This Session.

On Monday the June term of circuit court for this county will commence at 10 a. m., and from all indications it will be an unusually long and interesting session.

One of the first things done after court convenes will be the selection of a grand jury to investigate such matters as shall come before it. The method of selecting the jury is to draw the names of the jurors from a box, the first seven taken constituting the grand jury. They will then go into session and may continue their business as long as the term of court lasts. In presenting matters before the grand jury the procedure followed is to lay them before either the foreman of the jury, or before the district attorney.

The coming grand jury will be the first one for this county for a number of years, and in all probability there will not be another one called for some time to come. District Attorney Phelps called attention to this fact this morning, and urged those who have business for the jury to see that it is duly presented before that body.

Of the criminal cases that will come before the jury for indictment that of Grover Martin for the killing of D. M. Preston near Milton a short time ago, is really the only one of importance, though there are a few minor cases now pending.

#### BIG INCREASE IN DEPOSITS.

Commercial National Bank Makes a Statement Which is Very Complimentary.

The Commercial National Bank of Pendleton publishes in today's issue a statement of its condition as rendered to the comptroller of the currency on the 29th day of May. The growth of this institution as reflected in its statements speaks well for the management and its policies; the bank will be a year old the 22d of June and its present statement reports total resources of \$165,255.33; deposits, \$195,785.33; cash reserve of \$59,119.56; or 65 per cent of its deposit liability on hand.

The bank has a well organized savings department allowing interest on deposits at 4 per cent compound semi-annually, payable on demand in whole or in part, such portion remaining six months receiving interest at the above rate.

#### DISGUSTING SALOON FIGHT.

Four Men Attack One in the New Place Opened on Court Street.

A miserable and disgraceful fight occurred in the Log Cabin saloon, just opened on Court street, a few nights ago, in which four men were attempting to beat one man.

George Maple was behind the bar and witnessed the affair without attempting to stop it until bystanders were attracted by the noise from within the place and took a part in stopping the row. One man was held on the floor while another man attempted to kick him and another was trying to strike him with the top of a cuspidor.

When bystanders entered and took part in the matter the fight was stopped.

#### UMATILLA ALWAYS WINS OUT.

H. C. Willis Tells How It Has Always Been and Always Will Be.

H. C. Willis, the optimistic editor of the Echo News, came up from Echo this morning to make arrangements for the Eagles' picnic at Echo on June 21, and also to be present at the sale of the rabbit cannery this forenoon. Speaking of the crop outlook in his section, he said:

"I have been here for 21 years, and each season we have had frosts, droughts and other calamities enough to ruin the country; but always in the end we have had good harvests, and the country has come out smiling just as it will this year, in spite of the adverse conditions during the past winter."

#### Creamery Business Flourishing.

The Commercial Creamery yesterday had its banner day since plant was placed in operation two months ago, says the Lewiston Tribune. The churning yesterday amounted to 845 pounds and that of Tuesday 622 pounds. Aside from the butter making the company is manufacturing large quantities of ice cream that is being shipped into all parts of the Clearwater country and as far north as Pullman.

Bruce Wallace, formerly of this city, and now in the drug business at Athena, came down on the evening train yesterday and left this morning for Boise, Idaho, where he will be married on Monday to Miss Margaret Russell.

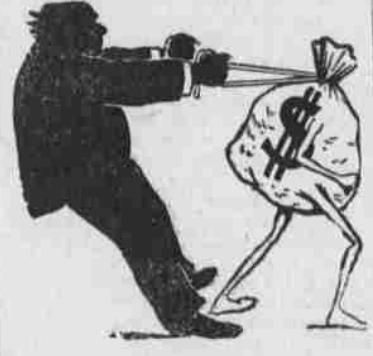
