Brisk Demand for Heavy Stuff at Good Prices.

The Chicago Livestock World says of the horse market for the past week: Auction opened with a very fair class of stock, which included quite a number of the express type, which sold up to \$187.50 for first-class offerings, while the general run went at a range of \$149@175. The American Ice Co. bought liberally this morning of pretty good quality heavy-weight stock at around \$170@200.

High-class mess horses are good property just now, and should be marketed as the demand is about at high tide. Prices range from \$200 up for choice grades. Medium drivers cleaned up pretty well last week, but demand showed weaker today. Demand for common drivers for southern shipment dropped flat, and, in fact, common grades of all classes are poor sellers.

## LOSS TO AMERICA

EUROPE TAKES AWAY ENORMOUS BUSINESS.

President Hagenbarth, of the National Livestock Association, Confers With President Roosevelt on the Subject and a Bill Asking for Reciprocity With European Countries Will Be Presented to Next Session of Congress.

Coming direct from Washington, where he has been in conference with President Roosevelt in reference to livestock interests, President J. P. Hagenbarth, of the National Livestock Association, stopped in Denver to visit with Secretary James H. Gwin, en route to his home at Salt Lake City. "The purpose of my visit to Washington," said Mr. Hagenbarth, "was to interest the president in the work of reopening the foreign markets to the American livestock growers. I wanted, if possible, to convince the authorities at Washington that there were as vital matters as rate troubles that should be legislated on."

President Hagenbarth said that he had received assurances from President Roosevelt, officials of the department of agriculture and other government officials that they would do all they could to help the livestock interests. Mr. Hagenbarth said that his statement to the president was in part as follows:

"We have lost more than \$100,000,000 annually for the last three or four years in export markets for meats alone through commercial misunderstandings that have resulted in tariff retaliation against meat from this country. Germany's discrimination has been the most severe, although the loss of the French market has cost livestock interests \$40,000,000 annually.

"Reciprocity is the solution of the problem—reciprocity, preferably, and if we cannot get that, retaliation should be the method."

"President Roosevelt agreed with me," said Mr. Hagenbarth, "and said that both reciprocity and retaliation could be adopted by the United States."

The president and Mr. Hagenbarth agreed that the matter was one that should go before the congress. President Roosevelt requested Mr. Hagenbarth to prepare a brief on the matter, which he will do.

A conference between President Hagenbarth and Secretary Gwin will be held during the summer at which they will prepare a bill covering the wishes of the association for presentation to congress.

### PUGET SOUND EXPORTS.

Amount for Five Months Double That of 1904.

Exports from the Puget Sound customs district for the first five months of 1905, the period ending with May 21, exceed \$23,000,000, being more than double those for the same period of 1904. For the first 11 months of the fiscal year 1905 they exceed \$28,700,000 as compared with \$25,729,580 for the whole of the preceding year.

For the month of May just closed they exceed \$6,000,000, a sum greater by nearly \$2,000,000 than the highest record for any previous months in the history of the district. The exact figures for the month of May are not yet available, but it is announced that the sum will exceed \$6,000,000. The largest preceding month was the month of April, 1905, when the exports reached \$4,702,616.

The exports from the district by months for the present calendar year have been: January, \$3,620,513; February, \$3,726,993; March, \$3,670,364; April, \$4,702,616; May, \$6,000,000.

The exports from the district by fiscal years since 1901 have been: 1901, \$10,687,523; 1902, \$23,788,821; 1903, \$22,499,833; 1904, \$22,739,580; 1905, (11 months), \$27,800,000.
