NOTES OF UMATILLA

GOOD RAIN WHICH DID

FAST AMOUNT OF GOOD.

Small Child Badly Burned by Carbolic Acid, But Is Recovering—Severely Afflicted With Asthma—Will Live in Wallowa County Several Months—Mountain Gem Makes Her First Trip to Umatilla and Creates Much Excitement.

Umatilla, June 4.—A splendid rain fell Friday, which is working wonders for this part of the country.

Karl Leonard, of Pendleton, and son of S. A. Leonard, yardmaster here, has accepted a position as collector for the O. R. & N. here.

The six-months-old child of Lee Graybeal, an O. R. & N. employee, was badly burned with carbolic acid a few days ago. The baby grabbed the bottle and before anyone could prevent it, had put it to its mouth. While it did not swallow any, it spilled some on its mouth, tongue and face. It is recovering rapidly, and no bad effects will result.

Mrs. J. S. Taylor is quite sick in Portland with asthma. Mr. Taylor, who is an operator here, went down yesterday to bring her home as soon as she is able to come.

Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Curtis will leave for Wallowa county in a few days to spend a few months on their ranch.

The Mountain Gem arrived at Umatilla at 7 p. m. today. She landed on our shores and left a traveling man and several sample trunks and took on one passenger from here, Oliver Lynch. Umatilla was on the oil vial all day and was out on masses.

Every one was happy and every one hurried and even the Mountain Gem added the excitement by giving a farewell "cock-a-doodle-do." May she come again and again.

WILL ADOPT NEW ROUTE.

Neither the Waha Nor the Cuddeasac is Favorable.

Chief Engineer Pearson, of the N. P., and Chief Engineer Boschke, with their party of engineers, including Engineers Pollard and Crosby, arrived here last night and departed this morning for Neperce en route to Cuddeasac, says the Lewiston Tribune. They will reach the latter place tomorrow. The engineers while here inspected the site for the depot grounds and stated that they were pleased with the location.

It has developed as the result of the visit of the engineers that a decision has been reached to abandon both the proposed Waha route from Lewiston and the proposed route from Cuddeasac, the grade of each having been found unsatisfactory. Also, that the Big Canyon route has been abandoned. Additional information, said to be absolutely authoritative, is that a decision has been reached to survey an absolutely new line from Lewiston to Grangeville, starting the climb from Lewiston to a point on the west side of the Sweetwater canyon, which will be followed to a convenient crossing of the latter, and then skirt the base of Craig mountain to the prairie country. It is said that the surveyors made for the proposed Cuddeasac route have shown the grade to be 1-1/2 per cent, or about 200 feet a mile, and that Engineer Pollard will immediately withdraw his surveyors from that point. The proposed route up Big Canyon is said to be worse than that found out of Cuddeasac.

The visit of Chief Engineer Boschke of the O. R. & N., was the first made to this country, and he stated last night that the country fully met all the good things said about it. The drive to this point he said was a great pleasure to him. Mr. Pearson, the N. P. chief, has visited the prairie region before, and the fine appearance of the crops is no surprise to him.

Right of Way Agent Payne said tonight that the people could rest assured that as soon as the best route could be located and reported to the management the actual construction of the road would commence.

Burma's Monster Cigars.

One of the curiosities of Burma is a cigar of monstrous and alarming appearance, which every one smokes from an early age. "The Indigenous article is a monster eight inches long," writes V. C. Scott O'Connor in his book, "The Silken East." "It consists of chopped wood, tobacco, molasses and various herbs wrapped in the silver white skin of a bamboo. So wide in diameter is it that it completely fills up the mouth of any young dandy who tries to smoke it. For presentation purposes this long cheroot is often wrapped at one end in a coat of purple or gold paper. It accumulates a formidable mass of fire at the lighted end and requires some skill in the smoking. But the Burman infant acquires this skill before he can walk and while he is still at the breast. No one thinks of smoking such a cigar through. Two or three long puffs, the lips of the smoker thrust out to meet the circle of the cigar, and it is put down or passed on to some good fellow sitting by."

The Man Who Loves Words.

"Other folks, of course, have their poor pleasures," writes Richard Le Gallienne in Harper's Magazine, "but for a man who loves words no joy the world can give equals for him the happiness of having achieved a fine passage or a perfect line. When Thackeray struck his fist on the table, as the story goes, when he had finished the scene of Colonel Newcome's death and exclaimed, 'By God, this is genius!' there was no empire he would have accepted in exchange for that moment. We often hear that your true artist is never satisfied with his work, his ideal escapes him, the words seem poor and lifeless, etc., compared with the dream. Whoever started that story knew very little about the literary temperament or he would have known that the words are the dream. The dream does not exist even as a dream or only very imperfectly till it is set down in words. Yes, the words are the dream."

The Curious Limpets.

The limpets are a curious kind of shellfish. They resemble the abalones in their habits. The interior is made of the most brilliant colors, bronze and iridescent blues predominating. They are found on the west coast of Mexico and are so large that the people use them for wash basins.

They are voracious animals and prey with great voracity on clams. The process seems slow, but the limpet always gets there. He gets his cover over the unsuspecting clam and puts his big foot on its shell, generally on a weak spot. Then he whips out a long, wiry tongue and proceeds to bore a hole in his captive. When this is done the shell flies open, and the limpet is free to feast on the poor clam's carcass. He eats but a part and leaves the rest for the fishes of the sea.
