WILL CO-OPERATE

COUNTY COURT AND CITY COUNCIL MEET TOGETHER.

Excellent Prospect of Street Improvement During Recent Season—Agree That the City Buy a Rock Crusher and the County a 12-Ton Roller—Roller Will Weigh Loaded, 32,000 Pounds, and Will Be Delivered September 1.

At last it seems certain that the long deferred program of street improvement will be taken up, and at least the business streets of the city macadamized between now and next winter.

Yesterday afternoon the street committee of the city council, Messrs. Ferguson, Renn and Wells, met with the county commissioners and assured them in behalf of the council that if the county would buy a roller the city would purchase a rock crusher, and the use of each could be exchanged. On the strength of this the commissioners voted to buy a roller, and later in the afternoon a contract for the purchase of a 12-ton steam roller for the price of \$3500, f. o. b. Pendleton, was made with L. M. Bates, of the Buffalo-Pitts company. The order calls for the delivery of the roller here by September 1. The machine, which the county has purchased, is the make that is in almost exclusive use in the northwest, and when loaded with water and coal will weigh 32,000 pounds.

The next move will be for the council to place an order for a rock crusher, and in all probability such action will be taken at the meeting tomorrow night.

ATHLETICS AT THE FAIR.

Contests in All Sports Will Take Place at Portland.

Portland, June 6.—The long program of athletic games and championship contests to be held at the Lewis and Clark exposition was inaugurated today with the holding of the individual gymnastic championships.

From now until the close of the fair there will be a constant succession of notable athletic events. They will cover practically the entire field of sport, including boxing, relay races, fencing, swimming, cricket, fly-casting, golf, football, basketball, lacrosse, wrestling and a special program of Indian athletic sports.

WILL SEE THE SUN'S ECLIPSE.

Scientific Observers Will Scatter to Distant Points.

Washington, D. C., June 6.—The first of the expeditions to be made under the auspices of the American universities and scientific institutions to observe the eclipse of the sun which

will occur August 30 next, is scheduled to sail from New York today.

Three expeditions are to be made to various parts of the world where the eclipse will be total—namely, to a point near Cortwright, Labrador; to Northeastern Spain, and to a point near Assuan, Egypt. The treasury department has made arrangements to facilitate the shipment in bond of the apparatus to be carried by the expeditions, including a large quantity of lenses, prisms, mirrors, telescopes, photographic apparatus, mechanics' tools and other necessities.

International Rifle Contest.

London, June 6.—On the famous range at Bisley crack teams representing the volunteer troops of England and the United States lined up today to contest for supremacy in rifle marksmanship. The American team is made up of representatives of the seventh regiment of the New York National Guard, while their opponents are the target experts of the Queen's Westminster volunteers, the most famous of England's rifle rangers.

Iowa Firemen's Tournament.

Council Bluffs, Ia., June 6.—The Iowa State Firemen's association began its 27th annual tournament here today. Firemen, accompanied by bands and citizens poured in an every train. The city is decorated and numerous immense arches welcome the fire fighters. The program of the tournament covers four days and includes parades, races, hook and ladder contests and numerous other interesting features.

Michigan W. C. T. U.

Grand Rapids, Mich., June 6.—Delegates from all parts of the state were present today at the opening of the annual convention of the Women's Christian Temperance Union of Michigan. The sessions will last two days and will be devoted to the discussion of officers' reports and in listening to addresses by prominent temperance leaders of this and other states.

Future Emperor Weds.

Berlin, June 6.—The wedding of Crown Prince Frederick William, who if he lives will one day be German emperor and king of Prussia, and the Duchess Cecile of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, took place today in the chapel of the Schloss with severe though rich simplicity.

Birthday of Russian Empress.

St. Petersburg, June 6.—Today was the 33d birthday of the czarina and for the first time since she left her girlhood home in Darmstadt to become the wife of the ruler of all the Russians, the anniversary was allowed to pass with almost no public recognition.

Sunday School Workers.

Canton, O., June 6.—The 46th annual convention of the state Sunday School association opened in this city today. It will be in session three days. More than 100 delegates are in attendance, every county in the state being represented by from five to 20 delegates.

HEAVY NOME BUSINESS.

Traffic Between Seattle and the North Is Immense.

Never since the excitement which followed the discovery of gold in Alaska have the business interests of Seattle been so gratified at the general aspects of the trade with Nome and other Alaskan points, says the Seattle News.

For some time back, cable and mail have borne orders from Nome for groceries, hardware, dry goods, fruits, vegetables and general merchandise. The Seattle wholesale houses have been working overtime on these orders. The result is a large accumulation of freight for the first steamer. Speaking collectively of the five steamers that will have sailed in the first four days of this month, it can be said that the cargoes are the greatest ever carried from this port at the opening of northern navigation. Steamers in port today are loaded to the gunwale and are actually refusing freight.

These steamers are the finest of the mercantile fleet and have great capacity. They are of the same type as the Victoria which will sail on Sunday. This trade expansion is due in part to the extensive mining developments in Nome, Fairbanks and other Alaskan points. In the Yukon territory there has also been steady development. The total gold output from the north, American and Canadian, is estimated at from \$17,000,000 to \$20,000,000.

The passenger traffic is large this week. The Oregon, which sails tomorrow, is already sold out. The passengers include capitalists, engineers, miners and the best class of business men.

Cashier Solner has received a Nome telegram estimating the gold output there for the season at \$2,000,000.

Others have received satisfactory reports from the north and all look for a season of great business activity there.

In southeastern Alaska the demand for goods is great. The City of Seattle which sailed recently with the heaviest grocery cargo ever sent from this port, has returned and sailed again in 24 hours, with another huge cargo.

Plumbers Meet at Atlanta.

Atlanta, Ga., June 6.—The 23d annual convention of the National Association of Master Plumbers opened at 10 o'clock this morning in the Grand Opera House. More than six hundred delegates, representing almost every state in the Union, were present. The sessions are to continue three days and will be devoted to the discussion of numerous matters of importance to the craft.

Wisconsin I. O. O. F.

Milwaukee, Wis., June 6.—The grand lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, jurisdiction of Wisconsin, opened in Milwaukee today. The Daughters of Rebekah, the women's auxiliary, is also in session. The meetings of the grand lodge are being held in Lincoln hall and will continue for three days.
