

AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE

Controversy Over Route.

It has been learned that there is now a controversy between the Northern Pacific and O. R. & N. engineers relative to the location of the partnership road between Hesperia and Lewiston.

The plans of the O. R. & N. engineers are to construct the road on the old survey on the north bank of the river and on the same grade established several years ago and on which much expensive work has already been done. The Northern Pacific engineers are favorable to building the road on the south bank of the Snake river, setting forth as an argument that eight-tenths of the grain tributary to the river is grown on the south bank and a better service will be afforded the country by the construction of the road on the north bank would leave the grain forage of the south bank open to river transportation or to railroad lines that might be extended from Pomeroy or other inland points.

It is also said that the O. R. & N. company expect to turn the Lewiston-Riparian line into the merger company to be formed, with the expense of the work already performed on the grade to be added to the actual cost of constructing the line. The question is an interesting one among the engineers, but in the meantime the O. R. & N. is making rapid preparations to commence construction from this point on the north bank.—Lewiston Tribune.

Williams Wishes to Hang.

The long looked for mandate in the Williams case has been set down from the superior court, in which that court declares that the judgment of the lower court in declaring Norman Williams guilty of the murder of Alma Seabolt, has been upheld. It now remains for Judge Bradshaw to re-sentence Williams, which we understand he intends to do in a few days. The date of sentence cannot be placed at a longer period of time than 60 days from the time of re-sentencing, nor less than 30. Williams has been advised of the receipt of the mandate and declares that the sooner the date of the execution is set, the better it will suit him.—The Dalles Chronicle.

Wheeler County Sheep Notes.

W. R. Potter sold his sheep at Heppner during the week. The band consisted of two and three-year-old wethers and the price paid was \$2.40 per head, with the provision that the price be \$2.55 if the sheep weigh 100 pounds or over when delivered on the 30th.

A remarkable fine band of yearling ewes were driven through town Tuesday morning, en route to the Heppner market for delivery. They are said to be one of the finest bands

of young ewes ever driven from this section of Oregon, and brought the top price of the season. They were raised by J. F. Spray, and sold for \$2.37 1/2 a head after shearing.—Spray Courier.

Rained Black Bugs.

Mr. Edwards, who resides near the sugar factory, brought a large bottle which upon first appearance looked like black sand, but upon close inspection proved to be millions of little black bugs which with the naked eye looked like gnats, but under a microscope proved to be large fat plump, but active bugs. Mr. Edwards says his sons gathered them on several occasions after the frequent showers we have been having the past few days, and they are of the opinion that they rained down.—La Grande Observer.

Wool Is Going Up.

Wool is going up, and the chances are that it will keep on going up. It was thought the top notch had been reached some weeks ago when 16 1/2 and 17 cents was paid for some large clips yet to be made. Yesterday Miles Lee paid the highest price of the season, 19 1/2 cents, for Wright's clip, and it is reported that he wool market is still on the rise in Baker county.—Baker City Democrat.

The Baker county circuit court, Hon. Samuel White on the bench, will open the June term at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning. Yesterday Clerk A. B. Combs completed the docket. There are 59 cases on the equity docket, 83 cases on the law docket, and 12 old criminal cases on the criminal docket. No new criminal cases have yet been entered.—Baker City Democrat.
