GENERAL NEWS.

A call to prayer for the restoration of peace between Russia and Japan has been issued by General Booth of the Salvation Army. It appoints the week from June 10 to June 17 for prayer.

At Turner, S. C. Burrell McLane, a white man, was shot and killed in a row with Dave Heigh, colored. A son of Heigh, was shot by McLane and killed, and a son of McLane was fatally shot.

The Copenhagen correspondent of the London Daily Telegraph, says: "It is believed here that Norway intends to establish a republic, and that important events may be expected within a few days."

At Eau Claire, Wis., the 18-month-old son of John Smith was attacked by a black Minorca rooster, which drove one of his spurs into the back of the child's head. The child died the next day.

Immediately following the astounding announcement by the New York Central that it will soon put on a permanent passenger train that will run between Chicago and New York in 18 hours, the Pennsylvania Central covers the two towns in 17 hours flat.

The appointment of General Trepoff, chief of police of St. Petersburg, to the virtual dictatorship of the empire, is foundation for the confident prophecy of a reign of terror in Russia that will make all previous disturbances raised by the revolutionists look like 15 cents or less.

The late violent storm in Michigan took the form of a cyclone at a point near Urban. Three children of Edward Philpotts, a small son of John Smith, Mrs. Wagner, Mrs. William Hutchinson and William Doesser were all fatally injured. Elsie Appleman was blown into the canal and drowned.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Fernie, B. C., has voted \$60,000 for a new water system and \$40,000 for a sewer system.

Arsim Gargana, an Italian, aged 64, was run down and killed at Crow's Nest, B. C., while drunk.

Six rural telephone lines will be built out of Goldendale this summer. There will be 309 'phones from the beginning, on the six lines.

The Methodists of the south church will hold an eight-day campmeeting at Wilbur, Wash., beginning June 17, conducted by Rev. Rollin O. Triplett.

An extensive network of telephone lines in Whitman county, Wash., has been consolidated under one incorporated management with a capital of \$15,000.

Frank D. Rhodes, of Portland, Or., will get \$3000 cash bequeathed him by the death of Lyman F. Rhodes, a Boston leather merchant who left over \$800,000.

Record breaking rains in eastern Montana caused many washouts and greatly impeded and delayed travel over the Northern Pacific, Burlington and Great Northern.

On the steamer Afghanistan, which was rammed and sunk in the English channel, was 600 barrels of cement and 50 tons of potash salts consigned to Portland, Or.

The waitresses of Spokane, who have a strong union, organized a strike for higher wages; for an increase from \$5.75 per week to \$10, and compromised on \$9.50.

The Washington I. O. O. F. grand lodge elected George W. Stocker, of Spokane, patriarch; R. W. Star, of Waterville, high priest; W. H. Cassian, of Buckley, senior warden; L. F. Hart, of Tacoma, scribe.

HONOR OF BALLERAY

THE CIRCUIT COURT BAR EULOGIZES DEAD LAWYER.

Halley, Slater and McCourt Tell the Story of His Devotion to His Profession and His Unparalleled Professional Honor and Great Ability and Learning—Resolutions Embodying These Sentiments Were Passed and Ordered Recorded.

Last evening the memory of the late Judge John J. Balleray was fittingly honored by the members of the Pendleton bar at a special session of the circuit court, attended by most of the local attorneys, and quite a number of the friends of the deceased.

The session met at 8 o'clock with Circuit Judge Ellis upon the bench. A memorial address was delivered by Judge James A. Fee, and resolutions of respect for the dead attorney were read. Upon motion a copy of Judge Fee's address was ordered placed on file, and the resolutions spread upon the record of the court.

Following the above brief addresses were made by T. G. Halley, R. J. Slater and John McCourt. All of these were of a reminiscent nature, and showed the high regard in which Judge Balleray was held by those who knew him best and were in positions to know his real character and the extent of his ability. It was the statement of all that Judge Balleray was a man of the highest professional honor and that for legal learning he was unsurpassed by any man in the state.

Following the conclusion of John McCourt's address, A. D. Stillman arose and moved that an adjournment be taken in honor of Judge Balleray's memory, and that the court meet again at 9:30 Wednesday. There being no objection, the court granted the motion and the adjournment was taken.

FOR LAWYERS' DAY.

State Bar Association Preparing to Observe July 19 at the Lewis and Clark Fair.

July 19, will be "Lawyers' Day" at the Lewis and Clark fair and the Oregon Bar association is making elaborate preparations to fittingly observe the day and greet visiting brethren who may be present from different parts of the nation on that day.

T. G. Halley, of this city, has been named as special committeeman from Umatilla county to work with a general committee of the state association in preparing a program and making ready to greet the lawyers on that day. The general committee with which Mr Halley will act, is as follows: W. W. Cotton, Wallace McCamant, H. G. Platt, A. F. Fiegel and John B. Cleland, all of Portland.

The matter of organizing a Pacific Coast Bar association will be discussed on "Lawyers' Day." In hopes of bringing about an organization which will answer the purpose of the American Bar association, in the states of the northwest. Mr. Halley will perhaps visit Portland soon to confer with the general committee.
