MADE FORTUNE IN OREGON.

William Eccles, Hood River Lumberman, Came to Union County a Poor Man, Is Now Wealthy.

William Eccles, president of the Hood River Lumber company, vice president of the Sumpter Valley railway and stockholder in several other Oregon properties, passed down the O. R. & N. yesterday evening from Ogden to Hood River, where he goes to spend the summer in the beautiful Hood River district. He was accompanied by his family, which lives in Ogden during the winter season.

The career of William Eccles in eastern Oregon inspires poor boys to persevere and work faithfully at their chosen calling whatever it may be, so long as it is legitimate and profitable.

Eccles came to Union county a poor man in 1888, bought an old sawmill plant on Catherine creek and began grinding cut lumber, going in debt for his supplies and borrowing money to pay off his employees, at first. He continued at it until now he is worth any where from \$250,000 to \$300,000 and is making more money easily and rapidly.

He is now building a 17-mile railroad from Hood River toward Mount Hood to reach a timber belt and to tap the rich Hood River valley, and owns an elegant home in Ogden and one in Hood River, and is a large stockholder in the Oregon Lumber company at Baker City.

Mr. Eccles saved the first lumber ever shipped to the Mormon colony into Sonora, Mexico, in 1889, from Telocaset, Or., and established lumber shipping points at Telocaset, Pleasant Valley, Union and North Powder in eastern Oregon. He is one of the leading sawmill men of the state and has made a success of his business by close application and hard work.

STOLE SALEM ROSES.

Aesthetic Citizen, Who Filled a Basket With Beautiful Flowers, Is in Jail.

A patriotic gentleman, an advocate of the rose display at Portland, and an appreciator of Salem's beautiful flowers, languishes in the county jail at this writing, all on account of his love of the aesthetic, and his failure to realize the difference as to ownership of property, says the Salem Journal.

He belongs to the honored, though somewhat numerous family of Smith, the prefix being J. F. This morning Mr. Smith got busy at a very early hour, beginning his labors on State street.

He was around with a big pair of shears and a large basket, and, commencing near the Salem hotel, proceeded to clean up State street of its roses. His intention was to take them to Portland on an early train.

Some early riser, fortunately, saw him, and telephoned Sheriff Culver, who caught him in the act, his basket filled with roses enough to make a pretty good display. thoughts, first our town of Pendleton, and lastly, our county as distinguished from the rest of eastern Oregon.

Pendleton, with its 6000 people, is the commercial and railroad center of a vast field of permanent and stable resources. Since it was founded, the town has never experienced a boom, and consequently has never experienced a set-back, but its steady and gradual growth has been fully warranted and justified by the demands of time and trade.

Partial Review of Advance.

In the past five years it has increased 25 per cent in population, and in the past two years its numerous brick buildings have aggregated over half a million dollars, and its residence district accordingly. Traveling men without exception tell us that it is the best town of its size between Portland and Chicago, and in trade and business activity, in the whole state of Oregon, second only to Portland.

As to our county and its relation to the rest of eastern Oregon, I would say that it is not the largest, but it produces the most wheat, the most wool, sends the most livestock to market, and has the best schools. Excepting the city of Portland only, of the whole state, Umatilla county is the only territory whose markets enjoy the advantage of two transcontinental railway systems and a river highway.

But after all, facts and figures are tiresome, and words of commendation seem vain and boastful, and that you may be convinced, you are extended the heartiest welcome to visit Pendleton and vicinity, that you may prove to your own complete satisfaction, that of all the counties east of the Cascades, Umatilla is the most diversified, the richest and the most populous.

AFTERMATH OF ELECTION.

Prohibition Carries in Portland Precincts—Frank Baker Lost \$4000 on Williams.

The aftermath of the city election in Portland brings out many incidents which make interesting reading. Out of seven precincts voting on prohibition under the local option law, four carried for prohibition, all these being on the east side. The total prohibition vote in Portland, notwithstanding the strong church and prohibition element was but 245, all the prohibitionists having gone to Lane's support in a frantic and final effort to oust the Williams regime.

It is said that Frank Baker, chairman of the republican state central committee, lost \$4000 on Williams, he having placed considerable money at three to one odds on Williams. Captain E. W. Spencer, of the river boat Spencer, is said to be the heaviest winner, he having bet heavily on Dr. Lane.

Although the vote of Monday was said to be light, yet it is about 1000 less than the rousing vote given President Roosevelt last fall, when 16,114 votes were polled, the heaviest in the city's record.

Kentucky Women's Clubs.

Cynthiana, Ky., June 7.—Representative women of the Blue Grass state arrived on every train today to attend the annual convention of the Kentucky Federation of Women's clubs. The initial session of the entertainment program will be a large reception this evening at "Monticello," the country home of Mrs. Elizabeth McGibben. The business sessions of the convention will begin tomorrow, Mrs. W. S. Perkins of Covington presiding, and will continue over Friday and Saturday.
