Some Idaho Crop Prospects.

A. F. Hitt, state horticultural inspector and pure food commissioner, has returned from a week spent in Bingham county. To a Capital News reporter this morning, he said the outlook in Bingham for a bumper apple crop is assured, but prunes and plums have been entirely destroyed.

He said 11,000 acres of sugar beets have been planted for the three factories and the beets are looking as fine as could be desired. In connection with the beet culture, Mr. Hitt said out of the entire list of last year's beet growers only one man failed to increase his acreage.

A very large acreage about Idaho Falls, Mr. Hitt said, has been planted in potatoes. The season up there is much later than here, but all crops are growing nicely. He inspected stores at both Blackfoot and Idaho Falls, where he found a small amount of impure foods that were confiscated and destroyed.—Boise Capital News.

Lewiston's Expenses One Month.

The total amount of the claims allowed for May was \$2841.89. Of this amount \$1503.50 represented the regular stated salaries, \$348.70 for lights, \$424.22 power at the water works. The balance consisted of the expense of holding the bond election, primary meeting and the usual routine items in the various departments.

Water department: Salaries, \$443.40; power, \$422.50; incidentals, \$390.29; laying pipe, \$125.52, total, \$1379.81. Receipts—Domestic, \$1496.20; irrigation, \$3047.20; cemetery, \$8; labor and material, \$75.21; penalties, \$6.50, total receipts, \$4632.11. The electric pump was in operation 112 hours and pumped \$12,768,000 gallons of water into the high service reservoir at a cost of \$199.56, and 163 hours in the low reservoir and pumped 15,468,000 gallons at a cost of \$224.94.—Lewiston Tribune.

Drunken Man's Neck Broken.

In a drunken condition last night Victor Healdon supposedly fell from the water closet back of the Matthews saloon 10 feet to the ground and was found this morning by two companions with his neck broken. The body was taken to Crandall's undertaking parlors where Coroner Burgett will hold an inquest tomorrow morning. Healdon is a Swede laborer.—The Dalles Chronicle.

Pickpockets Sentenced.

Sentenced to the penitentiary was the fate of the two pickpockets captured last Saturday and brought before Judge Bradshaw this morning. H. L. Galvin, the man who attempted

to steal the diamond at Cello, was given three years and a half, and William Johnson two years. Galvin, who is about 30 years of age, has been living in Portland for some time and is a gambler (or thug) by "profession." Johnson seems to be about 50 years old and hails from New York. Dalles justice is too swift and sure for them. Both were greatly surprised at their sentence, thinking that as they pleaded guilty it would be lighter.—The Dalles Chronicle.

Beet Acreage Secured.

The required acreage for a sugar beet factory in the Boise valley has been secured and Manager Cutler of Salt Lake, who arrived in Nampa Saturday evening is now looking over this section to decide where the million dollar plant will be located. It rests between Nampa, Meridian and Soda as to the location.

Nampa may be successful in landing the factory, but at last accounts the matter of drainage and water was not considered so satisfactory there as at Meridian.—Boise Capital News.

Drawn Into Machinery.

A man named Olson, employed in the Big Bear Lumber company's mill, about eight miles from Troy, was caught on the trimmer shaft late Friday evening and was badly bruised by being drawn against the frame of the machine and in some way his clothes caught on a net screw about the collar on the rapidly revolving shaft which carried the saws, and in an instant he was drawn against the frame of the machine and would have been killed had not his clothing gave way. Almost all the clothing was stripped from his body.—Troy (Idaho) News.

700,000 Pounds of Wool Sold.
A telephone message from Shaniko at noon says wool sales took place at the Shaniko warehouse this morning, and will be transferred to the Moody warehouse this afternoon. About 700,000 pounds changed hands this morning, prices ranging from 21 to 24 1-2 cents. The clip from Marmaduke Maxwell's flock brought the latter price. A small lot of Lincoln wool brought 26 cents. Sales will continue tomorrow.—The Dalles Chronicle.

RAIN IS ABUNDANT

FOR ONCE, ALL OREGON IS WELL SOAKED.

Past Week Has Witnessed Showers in All Sections of the State—Fall Wheat Now Heading Out and Is Well Advanced—Green Aphids Has Appeared With the Heavy Rains—Late Fruits Promise Light Yield.

The government weather report for Oregon for the past week is as follows:

Good rains fell in all portions of the state during the past week, and, while the weather for the most part was cooler than usual, there were spells of intermittent sunshine, which, taken together with the advance of the season, caused a gradual warming up of the atmosphere, and a general improvement in the condition of all crops resulted. More sunshine and warmer weather are needed, however, before vegetation can resume a normal growth.

The condition of the grain crop is promising, with probably very few exceptions. Fall wheat, rye and barley continue to head satisfactorily. Spring wheat and oats have made rather slow growth, but the general condition of these crops is above average. The grain aphids has become quite numerous in Washington, Yamhill, Marion, Linn and portions of Douglas counties, but as yet the damage done by this pest cannot be estimated, though it is thought to have been slight.

Hops are growing slowly and the training of the vines continues. Cutting the first crop of alfalfa continues, with light yields. Gardens, grasses, potatoes, sugar beets, field onions, beans and peas are making better growth than during the preceding week. Corn is growing slowly and needs warmer weather. Pastures are excellent and stock is in fine condition.

Late apples and pears promise light yields, while other tree fruit is uneven and generally expected to be below average. Early cherries are ripening, and strawberries are plentiful.

Columbia River Valley.

Dufur, Wasco county, J. B. Havelly.—Weather cloudy most of the week, with some local showers, but the rain was not general; grain is still looking well; hay cutting in progress; all crops promising.

Moro, Sherman county, H. W. Strong.—Fore part of the week warm, with east winds; light thunder showers Tuesday and Wednesday; latter part cool and cloudy; all grain making good growth.

Ella, Morrow county, R. R. Grabel.—No serious damage in this township from the dry east winds which prevailed for six days and ceased Wednesday; a good rain Wednesday evening; crops look well, except some late sown spring grain.

Hepner, Morrow county, H. Cummings.—Good rains during week greatly benefited all crops and insur-

ed abundant yields; grain prospects best in years; fruit mostly killed by frost earlier in the season; prospects favorable for a good crop of pears and apples; cherries, prunes and peaches poor; gardens look good.

Plateau Region.
Elgin, Union county, J. L. Hindman.—Grain and grass growing nicely; fall wheat nearly ready to head; good rains keep summer fallow in good condition; fruit crop will be light.

Ontario, Malheur county, S. L. Spann.—Weather generally warm and showery; all vegetation beginning to grow rapidly; alfalfa has been held back by cold weather, but is now growing nicely.

Joseph, Wallowa county, W. H. Robins.—Weather warm; nice growing weather; all crops look fine and have made a rapid growth the last few days; stock doing nicely; sheep shearing begun.

Merrill, Klamath county, Fitch & Spencer.—Weather cool; rain and hail Friday; hail did very little damage; crops looking fine; splendid prospects for exceptionally large crop of wheat.
