GENERAL NEWS.

The June expense bill of the city of Seattle, is estimated at \$96,000.60. It is not expected to have clear sailing, either with the auditing committee or in the general council.

Frank J. Marshall, of Brooklyn, N. Y., is now the acknowledged champion of the game of chess in America, and on June 12 will begin to play in the international tournament at Ostend, Belgium.

By the ditching of an engine at Pevamo, Mich., a construction train was wrecked. Dead: W. C. Everett, engineer; Albert Cart, fireman; C. W. Crangow and J. E. Graham, of the construction gang.

The Mexican Light and Power company, a Canadian concern, has purchased all the light and power plants in the City of Mexico. The total expenditure of the company when work is completed, will be \$40,000,000.

Peter Curry, who was out under heavy bonds pending an appeal from a conviction of cattle stealing, shot and killed himself in a Cowitz county logging camp yesterday. Curry was convicted two weeks ago with Albert Wilson.

Peter Henry Chevantier, who is said to have made a fortune in the manufacture of the toy balloon, which has amused the children for a couple of generations, is reduced to poverty, which has compelled him to join the street cleaning gang of Westfield, N. J.

Charles A. Bailey, of Berkeley, Cal., climbed 1500 feet up El Capitan in the Yosemite valley, from its base, undertaking to see how far he could climb. At the height mentioned he lost his balance and falling to regain it, slid and tumbled to the bottom. Every bone in his body was broken, and death must have ensued long before he reached the bottom.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Two and one-third inches of rain fell at North Yakima June 3, 4 and 5.

Between 400 and 500 boxes of strawberries are being shipped daily from North Yakima.

Senator Piles has appointed Edward Lyons, of Snohomish, Wash., as cadet to West Point.

A cancelling device with a capacity of 40,000 letters per hour, has been added to the Spokane postoffice equipment.

At Eugene, the state university baseball team defeated a team from Waseda university, Japan, by a score of 3 to 0.

A delegation of members of the Massachusetts legislature is en route to the Lewis and Clark fair in a Pullman car specially chartered.

Over two inches of rain fell at Glendive in the 36 hours ending June 6. This broke all records for any point in the state of Montana.

UMATILLA CEMENT

RAW MATERIAL EXISTS FOR ITS MANUFACTURE.

W. E. Loucks Analyzes Deposits of Alkali Rock East of Town and Pronounces it Suitable for Cement—The Greatest Obstacle to Manufacture Here Is the Cost of Burning—Deemed That Great Possibilities Are in Sight.

Will cement one day become one of the products of Umatilla county? This is one of the questions that have arisen since the visit of W. E. Loucks, day before yesterday. According to the advance agent of the National Good Roads association, the raw material for cement making exists in abundant quantities, and the only question to be considered is whether or not the finished product can be made here as cheaply as it can be shipped here from England.

Monday afternoon a party consisting of Judge Hartman, Thomas Thompson, T. P. Gilliland, B. F. Renn and W. S. Welles, drove Mr. Loucks over several miles of the roads east of town and as they passed the bank of alkali rock on the other side of the river, the attention of the visitor was attracted to the peculiar formation, and on investigation he declared it to be of the same nature as cement is derived from. Some samples of the alkali rock were brought to town by Mr. Loucks, and with the aid of a mortar in Koeppen's drug store, was crushed to a powder. Also, the substance was then tested with acid to test the alkalinity, and it is said to have been found to be properly constituted for cement.

According to Judge Hartman, the rock occurs in almost unlimited quantities over the county, and should it be found profitable to use for cement making there will be an ample supply. However, the greatest obstacle is not in securing the raw material, but in the expense of burning it in a furnace, through which process it must go before it can become cement.

Practically all of the cement now used in the northwest is said to come from Portland, England, and it is brought over as ballast by the wheat ships that sail between the Columbia river and English ports. Consequently, it is brought at almost no expense, and the cost here is really but little more than the price in England. However, it may be found that it may be mined and burned as cheaply here as in that country, in which case it would seem to be a profitable industry. At least the matter is regarded by those interested as worth some further investigation, and there is a possibility that it may be found worth taking up, in which case a large amount of land that is now regarded as absolutely worthless and a detriment to the country, may become of considerable value.

CROWD AT WALLA WALLA.

Woodmen Exercises and Ball Game the Attractions.

Next Sunday promises to be a great day at Walla Walla, and it is expected that an unusually large crowd will go over for the Woodmen exercises and the ball game, the latter occurring at 2 o'clock, being immediately after the unveiling ceremonies.

The members of the uniform rank will go from here in a body, and will be in their uniforms and present at the ceremonies in the afternoon. It has been announced that all Woodmen who attend the services at the cemetery will be given a rebate of \$1.50 upon their expenses.

The ball game between the Pendleton and Walla Walla teams will be one of the hardest of the season, as both sides are making every effort to win. Just what the Pendleton lineup will be is not yet fully known, but it will be far the strongest of any game this season.

ALFALEA CROP LIGHT.

Cold and Rainy Weather Has Held Back the First Cutting.

T. G. Smith of Echo, who is in the city attending circuit court as a juror, will begin cutting his first crop of alfalfa right away, and says it is light on account of the cool and rainy weather of the past three weeks.

Mr. Smith lives in the choice alfalfa district of the Echo country, his place being about three miles west of Echo, all susceptible to alfalfa growing in the highest degree and all under water. The alfalfa acreage is increasing in that immediate vicinity very rapidly and it will soon be one solid alfalfa field from Echo west to Butter creek.

W. S. Atchison, of the State school, left last night for Cambridge, Idaho, where he goes to reside on his homestead a few days. He has taken land in "Pendleton valley," near Cambridge, where a number of Pendleton people are located.

TRUSTEES ESCAPE.

Two Prisoners Run Away From Road Working Gangs at Salem.

Salem, June 8.—Two trustees, Edward Louisgnot and Fred Collins, told the penitentiary good-byes yesterday afternoon and are, at this writing, still enjoying the wild freedom of the woods and the absence of guards.

They were in a gang engaged in road building, and were in charge of Guards Skipton and Byrne. The escape was made a few minutes before 5 o'clock, as the guards were rounding the gang up for its return to the pen.

The escapes were cutting brush, and when the guard turned his back for a moment, they skipped. The underbrush at that point is very heavy, and, once in it, they had disappeared as thoroughly as a frog in a pond.

A posse was organized as soon as the gang could be returned to the pen and a vigorous pursuit was made, but though the posse claims to have got

within hearing distance, nothing was seen of the fugitives.

Led All the Guests.

In the days of King George III. of England the Persian ambassador to his court demanded, but was denied, precedence over all other foreign representatives. He refused to go to court, causing it to be reported abroad that he was ill. He met the prince regent at the house of the Lady Salisbury of the time. "I am very sorry to offend your royal highness by not going to court," he said. "Now, sir, my sovereign, he tell me I go first; your people say I must go last. Now, this very bad for me when I go back to Persia." So saying, he made a significant pass toward his head, expressing decapitation. The prince tried to appease him. "But, sir, you still angry with me. You have not invited me to your party tomorrow night." The prince explained that it was only a children's party, but the ambassador might come if he chose. He did choose, for he went and, being the only ambassador there, led all the guests, thus scoring heavily for Persia, which made him comfortable about the neck again.

Restoring Faded Ink.

Faded ink on old documents, papers, parchments, etc., may be restored so as to render the writing perfectly legible. The process consists in moistening the paper with water and then passing over the lines a brush which has been wetted with a solution of sulphide of ammonia. The writing will immediately appear quite dark in color, and this color in the case of parchment will be preserved. On paper, however, the color will gradually fade again, but on a fresh application of the sulphide of ammonia it will reappear. Writing executed in ordinary ink which has been rendered illegible by age may be restored by carefully moistening it with an infusion of galls or a solution of ferrocyanide of potassium slightly acidulated with hydrochloric acid. Care must be taken to apply the liquid so as to prevent the ink from spreading.
