CONVENTION AT WALLA WALLA.

Good Roads Convention to Be Held Next Tuesday.

Walla Walla, June 8.—On Tuesday of next week Walla Walla will have as its guests one of the most distinguished gatherings of good roads people which it has yet been the pleasure of this city to entertain and arrangements are being perfected for a meeting in their honor that will go down in the history of the city as an epoch in its career.

On that occasion a special train carrying some of the foremost men in the National Good Roads association will be here. They are now traveling through the west in a special train and are holding meetings at the various points they visit to explain the scope and meaning of their organization.

The lectures are illustrated by stereopticon views gathered from all parts of the country, and the convention which will be held here next Tuesday will be of great benefit to road building.

Wellington E. Loucks, organizer of the association, whose headquarters are in St. Louis, arrived in the city yesterday and will leave on the outgoing train for Moscow, Idaho, this morning. He is a gentleman who possesses a magnetic personality and is an untiring worker in the cause he represents.

CHANGE WALLA WALLA DAY.

City Council of Garden City Will Choose Their Own Date at Portland.

Walla Walla people refuse to be dictated to by the management of the Lewis and Clark fair and last night the city council voted to fix October 1 as Walla Walla day at the fair, instead of June 27, the day fixed by the management of the fair, arbitrarily.

Accordingly Walla Walla will make preparations to celebrate October 1, as Walla Walla day and owing to the fact that all fruits and crops will have been gathered by that time, the city hopes to make an exhibit at the fair that will be creditable. At this time Walla Walla county has nothing more than a few left over exhibits from St. Louis and does not wish to celebrate her day with such a showing and will not be forced to observe an unsatisfactory day, against her wishes.

Oregon towns are observing the days set aside for them by the fair management without any objections, but evidently Walla Walla knows what she wants and knows how to get it.

The Dalles Going to Portland.

It is estimated that 1200 people will go from The Dalles to Portland on The Dalles day, which is Thursday, June 15, a special rate of \$1.50 for the round trip having been secured. Eighteen coaches will be run in two special trains from The Dalles on that day.

Baker City Day at the Fair.

June 17 has been set aside as Baker City day at the Lewis and Clark fair and a round trip rate of \$1.50 has been secured from that place to Portland. Arrangements are being made to run a special train from Baker, leaving there about 5 a. m. If the regular morning train is not on time.

PULLING MORE TONNAGE.

O. R. & N. Engines Can Handle Increased Trains Over the Mountains.

The new engines just received by the O. R. & N. for use on the freight division between La Grande and Umatilla, are rated at 10 per cent more tonnage over the Blue mountains than the compounds.

The tonnage for a compound east of Pendleton is 1100 tons, and an average of three trains per day are run eastward from Pendleton. This means that the total of 3300 tons for the three trains will be increased to 3600 tons per day, or a total gain in tonnage per year amounting to 120,450 tons, or more than 19 full trains.

This gives the reason for increasing the size of the engines, as the same number of employees will handle this increased tonnage while the income is greatly increased.
