GENERAL NEWS.

There are in the United States 17,613,000 acres of spring wheat, an increase of 2.8 per cent over last year.

Six gasoline motor cars will be put into use on the branch lines of the Harriman system during the present season.

At Morris Park, N. Y., Louis Chevrolet has made a new mile record with an automobile, covering that distance in 52.15 seconds.

At San Jose, Cal., Mrs. Fred Hamilton, an aeronaut, fell 80 feet from her balloon. Her spine was badly hurt and recovery is very doubtful.

In the island of Samar, ladronism or common brigandage, is rampant. The civil authorities are over the fence and out, and martial law is probable.

Mrs. Harry Toler, a widely known and universally liked society woman of New York, has tired of the monotony and aimlessness of fashionable life, and gone into the retail coal trade.

Months ago M. Witte, president of the committee of ministers, said to the Associated Press correspondent "there will be no internal crisis in Russia now or while the war lasts. The crisis will come when the war ends."

Mrs. James Brown Potter, the actress, is bankrupt. Her affairs crossed the danger line when she mortgaged her home for \$50,000 to put into the Savoy theater and to present "Da Barry," both of which were losing propositions.

The new Butte county, California, irrigation ditch is opened and full of water. It is 14 miles long, 30 feet on the bottom, and carries 500 cubic feet of water a second, and will irrigate 8,000 acres. It will transform an exclusively wheat district into widely diversified farming.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Arnold Kohler, a 50-year-old bachelor, suicided at a sheep camp near Ellensburg, Wash., by shooting himself in the head with a heavy pistol.

Condon, a 2-year-old English shire stallion sold at Pullman, Wash., for \$3000. He is the highest priced home-bred ever produced in the northwest.

Yacolt, a Washington village, has been almost wiped out by a fire supposed to be of incendiary origin. Loss about \$10,000, with an insurance of about one-third that amount.

C. E. Hymer was leaning over a shaft of a coal mine at Red Lodge, Mont., when a pulley wheel fell from above, struck him on the head and broke his neck, killing him instantly.

Porter Van Allen, aged 15 years, was dangerously hurt by his horse stepping into a badger hole. The animal fell and rolled over the boy, who is now paralyzed and has internal injuries. His death is considered certain.

Spokane county is in debt \$545,412.25, which is \$35,673.34 in excess of its legal limit, and yet some of the irrepressible boomers are doing their best to bond the county for \$30,000 to assist the state in building an armory.

A referendum vote of the socialists of Washington has by a heavy majority acquitted Dr. Herman F. Titus of ballot box stuffing. The occasion alleged was the selection of candidates by the party.

The Washington state guard and the Duke of Connaught rifles of British Columbia, will have a rifle and revolver tournament beginning July 29 at Vancouver, B. C. Rifle shooting will be at 500, 500, 600, 800, 900 and 1000 yards.

SELFISH PORTLAND

IGNORED THE STATE ON DAY OF FAIR OPENING.

Portland People Rode in Carriages in the Procession While State Dignitaries, Prominent Citizens, Public Men and Mayors of Cities Stood on the Sidewalks—Portland Should Have Given the "Glad Hand" on That Day, But She Failed.

The East Oregonian is not the only paper in the state that made objection to Portland's hogish actions on the opening of the Lewis and Clark fair. The following from the Baker City Maverick, the new paper owned by Bush Livermore and James Connella, is a fair sample of state sentiment on Portland's actions on that occasion:

You may talk about pork and things porcine until the day of your demise, and unless you comment completely on what happened in Portland last week, you will fail to tell the half. The Portland hog has long been a famous institution. It ranks well up and has the Seattle Spirit faded to a hoarse whisper.

Personifying profound pride, Portland always compels the balance of the state to roost high in the rear of the hall. The limit was reached last week, however, when the vice presidential party arrived in the hog wallow to open the fair. There was a parade of Portland hogs. Keys to the whole, blooming pig pen were handed by the main subject to Mr. Fairbanks and his distinguished party of senators and congressmen. It was a porcine holiday for fair, and the swill-trough fairly overflowed.

Along the sidewalks, watching the parade of Portland merchants, Portland city officials, Portland county jumpers, Portland brokers, Portland real estate boomers and Portland swine in general, were a few score of prominent men from various parts of Oregon—mayors of cities, presidents of big empire building institutions, members of the legislature, ex-congressmen, ex-governors—big and good men who take their feed like white men, not from a trough. They were spectators merely by sufferance—not by invitation of the hogs. They had gone to Portland to witness the fair opening under the mistaken impression that the event was to have been an Oregon function.

They expected, also, to get in line and extend to Vice-President Fairbanks, the personal representative of Theodore Roosevelt, president of these United States, a fitting welcome to the grand old Webfoot, state. Did they? Well, they did the best they could.

They stood on the sidewalks and shouted. Farther than that they could not go. They were barred from the parade by the chief marshal of the hogs. They were not permitted to enter the vice presidential presence by solid ranks of hogs. They took their own chances in finding a place to stand while Mr. Fairbanks made a speech. They were barred from the vice presidential banquet. They were forbidden permission to pay their money and sit the trail. Particularly were they permitted to pay their money.

It was by all odds the most notable day in the entire unwritten history of Portland hogdom. It was simply great.

Not a mayor of any city in Oregon was invited to be present. Even United States Senator Patton was assigned to a rear carriage. The absence of Senator Mitchell could have been explained; Herman and Williamson might have sent coherent regrets. But Oregon is not Portland! On the calendar of hogdom, hereafter will be emblazoned June 1 in carmine paint. It was a red letter day, cert!—The Utlander.

FISHING PARTY RETURNED.

Caught Few Fish, But Might Have Bought Many.

The fishing party, composed of Dr. F. W. Vincent, Jack Skiles, Tom Warner and Fred Lampkin, that left here last week for the purpose of catching black bass at Lake Coeur d'Alene, returned this morning. The members of the party say they were influenced to make their trip largely by the showing made by Messrs. Garfield and Koeppe, who came back laden with bass a few weeks ago.

While those who returned this morning say they did not catch many fish, Dr. Vincent believes that they found the key to the success of the other party, as offers to fish for them for \$5 per day were made by the party by Indians who claimed to have done the same for other Pendleton men a short time before.

BOUGHT KLAMATH LAND.

Dr. Best Says It Is Regarded as a Good Investment.

Dr. J. A. Best returned last evening from Klamath Falls, where he purchased land under the Klamath reclamation project. According to the doctor, 45 per cent of the land under the project is subject to entry, and it is generally regarded as a good investment, it being now assured that the work will be carried out by the government. Most of the land is adapted to alfalfa raising, and the crop there is now said to be better than the alfalfa of this section.

Meeting of Augustana Synod. Stanton, Iowa, June 12.—The annual convention of the Augustana Swedish Lutheran Synod of America began here today and will continue in session for the next 10 days. Five hundred delegates are here from all sections of the United States and Canada. The meeting this year is one of the most important in the history of the synod, and many vital questions will come up for decision.

NINETEEN TO NAUGHT.

Pendleton's Ball Play Was a Roaring Farce Throughout.

Walla Walla, 13.—The '95 Pendleton team, sometimes called the "Indians," (they are now good ones.) The demise was the result of a balloon ascension, and the interment will be held today. No flowers. It was a violent end that came to the ball team yesterday, and one that is regretted by the fans of this city. While life had really been despaired of for some time, but few looked for such a tragedy as befell yesterday. But it is now all over, and no more games will be played this season, the one with La Grande for next Sunday being cancelled today by Manager Cooley.

In the game yesterday only 13 runs had been made off Kennedy at the end of the fifth inning, when King was placed in the box. By that time there was no team left as far as the Pendleton side was concerned, with the exception of two or three men who played ball anyway all through the game. One of these was Lieutenant, who, during the last four innings covered the entire outfield. That King could do anything going into the box at such a time was not to be expected, and it is only surprising that more runs were not made off him.

The line-up for Pendleton yesterday was one that looked good on paper, for they were nearly all good players. But the principal men had scarcely seen each other before, and the result shows the futility of such an arrangement.

1500 CUNNINGHAM BUCKS. Will Be Sold This Summer in Wyoming and Denver.

Within a few days a trainload of Charles Cunningham's fine Merino bucks will be shipped from here to Wyoming in charge of W. H. Colwell, who will dispose of them in that state. In speaking of the matter this morning, Mr. Colwell said that 1500 would be taken to Wyoming and that 500 of this number are already sold. The other 1000 head will be for sale, and as the Cunningham bucks are widely known in that section, it is expected they will be easily disposed of. The bucks will bring from \$12 to \$18 per head. Last year a trainload was sold in Wyoming by Mr. Colwell in the face of strong competition.

It is also probable that a band of bucks will be sent to Denver for sale, and arrangements for routing them are now under way.

DROVE OVER FROM CONDON.

W. H. Hawley Will Go Into Business at North Yakima.

W. H. Hawley arrived last evening from Condon, having driven overland from that place. According to him the railroad will not be in regular operation for a month or two yet, as but every other tie has been placed so far, and the bridges are but temporary structures to allow the work trains to pass over. However, the road will

be in condition in time to take off the coming wheat crop, which he states will be good this year, though it is backward compared with the wheat of this county.

Luke Hawley is now running the hotel Condon, which the brothers own, and is making plans for the erection of a fine brick hotel for which they have a good location. W. H. Hawley expects to go into business at North Yakima.

Mr. Hawley will remain here for two months or until after harvest, as he has in several hundred acres of wheat northeast of Pendleton about 16 miles.
