BUNCOED OVER THE PHONE. Crook in Pendleton Touches a "Cousin" in Boise City for \$15.

To be smoothly buncoed out of \$15 by an alleged needy cousin in this city is the fate of E. C. Rowell, a real estate man of Boise City.

A few days ago Mr. Rowell received a long distance phone from Pendleton purporting to be from George W. Adams, a cousin of Mr. Rowell's, who resides in Iowa, but who it was alleged had reached Pendleton in an embarrassed condition and wished \$15 with which to reach Boise, where he had ordered his money sent from home.

Mr. Rowell had such a cousin and was expecting him to visit the Lewis and Clark fair this season, and while he was surprised at his cousin turning up "broke" in Pendleton, yet he was not surprised at his appearance in the west, and at once forwarded the \$15 and wished his cousin godspeed to Boise, where he would greet him.

After waiting a couple of days Mr. Rowell became convinced that he had been buncoed and about this time received a letter from Iowa warning him to beware of a man named E. L. Frederickson, who had posed as Adams in several Iowa towns, and had buncoed several of Rowell's relatives out of small sums in that way.

Mr. Rowell talked but three minutes with his alleged cousin, who meekly asked him to pay for the phone message at the Boise end of the line, but this short talk cost him \$15 and a \$1.50 phone bill.

He will be suspicious of all long distance calls for some time, especially those coming from Pendleton. The Pendleton police have been notified of Mr. Frederick's methods, but he has not been apprehended.
