GENERAL NEWS.

The new Peihan railway, built from Shanghai into the interior of China, will be opened to travel and traffic November next.

Governor La Follette has signed the new Wisconsin railroad commission bill, but regrets that its provisions are not more radical.

The American manufacturers of Portland cement, in convention at Atlantic City, have advanced the price of the product 5 per cent.

Twenty-five million gallons of water were pumped out of the New York subway after the break was stopped sufficiently to allow of operations.

The Lake Shore railroad has run a combined express, mail and passenger train from Chicago to Buffalo, 526 miles, in 453 minutes, beating the best previous record 17 minutes.

Mrs. H. G. Bond and Dr. E. Clements had apartments adjoining in Berkeley Inn, Oakland, Cal. Jointly they lost \$10,000 worth of jewels and jewelry in one daylight theft recently.

Supreme Justice Warren B. Hooker, of New York, will soon tender his resignation—under fire. He is accused of selling his influence with the postoffice department at Washington.

Theodore P. Delyannis, the premier of Greece, wounded by an assassin who stabbed him in the stomach, died of his wounds. The murderer, whose name is Gherakaris, is a professional gambler, who sought revenge for Delyannis' efforts to abolish gambling in Athens. Delyannis had succeeded in closing every gambling place in the city.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

A theater that will seat 1000 persons, will be built at Moscow, Idaho, this summer.

Fifteen nurses were graduated from the Good Samaritan hospital, Portland, June 13.

Five hundred delegates and members of the A. F. and A. M. are attending the Washington grand lodge at Bellingham.

Governor Chamberlain will by invitation attend and address the Dominion at New Westminster, B. C., during September.

Alvin W. Baird, of Portland, is one of two Pacific coast graduates from Cornell university this spring. He received the degree of doctor of medicine.

At Butte, Mont., after 19 rounds of vigorous but clean fighting, Young Corbett knocked out Maurice Thompson, of Butte. Thompson "went flewty" while Corbett was hardly winded.

Dr. Mary Latham is being tried at Spokane on the charge of burning a store building at Mead, which she had once owned, but which Jennie Johnson had gotten possession of through litigation.

The following increases in postmaster's salaries are announced: Oregon—Hillboro, \$1400 to \$1500; Hood River, \$1700 to \$1800; Moro, \$1200 to \$1300. Washington—North Yakima, \$2500 to \$2600.

At Judith, Mont., a ferry boat capsized and drowned two men who were passengers. When the boat was righted the body of Charles Murray, who had been missing two weeks, was found in the wheel, or rather in the wheel house.

Robert Wade, a Douglas county farmer, was helping his hired man drive fence posts. The latter was using a sledge and by an acknowledged self-evident accident, the implement slipped and striking Wade on the head, killed him.

SMUGGLED A HOME

STORY OF A TRANSACTION FROM LIFE IN OREGON.

Joe Standley, Scout, Pioneer and Indian Fighter, Helped a Friend Smuggle 40 Acres of Grand Ronde Valley Land and Came Back 40 Years After to Make it His Own Home—After Securing Title He Sold it for a "Stake" and Went to Texas as Mysteriously as He Came.

Joe Standley was a crippled, gruff old Indian fighter and scout who came to the Grand Ronde valley in 1864. In a running fight with the Snake river Indians on Big creek, Baker county, in 1866, his horse fell with him and tore his ribs loose from his back bone, making him a horrible lifelong cripple.

In 1865 he helped another pioneer smuggle 40 acres of beautiful meadow land on the Grand Ronde river, little thinking that it would be a success to him in his old days. He left Oregon mysteriously in 1870.

The man who secured the land improved it with several hundred acres more, builded well, founded a good home and enjoyed life for 40 years without molestation, when a short time ago, Joe Standley rolled back into Grand Ronde valley from Texas, with a wife and eight children, an eight-mule team, a yoke of cows and about seven dogs.

Joe at once went to the La Grande land office to see if this tract of smuggled land had been filed upon, he having carried the remembrance of the smuggling in all his wanderings and upon finding the tract still vacant, filed a homestead upon it and moved over into the old pioneer's old field and began building him a house.

The man who had claimed this land without question for 40 years, protested, but Joe replied: "I helped you steal this land and you have used it for 40 years and now it is my turn to use it the same length of time."

Then a compromise was made and Joe built his house down on the river bank where he had planted his beaver traps 40 years before, but where 60 bushels of oats were growing on every acre now. He moved his family into the new house and was the happiest trapper, hunter and scout that ever lived to come out of savagery and become a householder.

He held the land until he secured a title to it when he sold it for \$50 per acre, took his money and family and rolled back to Texas, where he is now living on a cotton plantation, happy as a king.

ON WORLD'S FASTEST TRAIN.

Engineer Out of Fort Wayne is a Friend of T. C. Warner, of Pendleton.

T. C. Warner, foreman of the mechanical department of the East Oregonian, has received word that Byron Holmes, a locomotive engineer on the Pennsylvania railroad between Fort Wayne, Ind., and Chicago, was assigned to one of the fast trains just started by that system.

Holmes made the run from Fort Wayne to Chicago, a distance of 143 miles, in two hours and five minutes, or an average time of 74 miles in an hour and two and a half minutes. Several single miles on the run were made in 28 seconds.

At this rate of speed a train could be run from Pendleton to Portland, a distance of 231 miles, in three hours and seven and a half minutes. The Pennsylvania has excellent roadbed, and over almost the entire distance from New York to Chicago has four tracks.

Holmes is a man about 40 years of age and will be regularly assigned to this fast run.

SOLD 50,000 POUNDS.

All Wool Now Out of the Growers' Hands in This Section.

Yesterday 50,000 pounds of wool belonging to Charles Mathews and A. H. Sunderman was sold to Charles H. Green, the price paid being 18-14 and 19 cents. According to Mr. Green the above lot was the last of the un-sold wool in this section, and consequently all of the wool is now out of the growers' hands. However, it will be some time before all of the wool has been shipped from here, as much of it has not been brought in yet.

In all, 5,000,000 pounds will be baled at the local plant this season, and approximately 3,000,000 will be scoured here.

Completing the Booth.

A letter from S. H. Forshaw, in charge of the Umatilla county exhibit at the Lewis and Clark fair says that the mantel in the booth will be completed this week and the booth put in very good shape. More exhibits are sorely needed and the people of the city and county are earnestly requested to send in anything that would be suitable for exhibit purposes, in the way of grains, grasses, fruits or vegetables. It will be forwarded to Portland immediately and placed in the booth with proper credit attached.

ARCTIC CONSUMPTION CURE.

An Expert and Extensive Trial Will Be Made of It.

Halifax, N. S., June 15.—In order to make a practical test of the theory advanced by prominent Arctic explorers and others that a sojourn in the Arctic regions will cure consumption, the steamer Havana leaves this port today for a health cruise along the coast of Greenland. The steamer is in charge of physicians and others selected by a number of prominent Washingtonians who are backing the project, and it carries as passengers a number of tuberculosis patients.

The plan is to visit certain sterile and dustless areas which lie under perpetual summer sunshine within the Arctic circle, for the cure of early cases of the disease. It is contended that the continuous day of Arctic summer, with its healthful and bracing features, far surpasses any conditions in any other part of the world for the cure of pulmonary diseases.

The Havana will cruise along the shore of Baffin's Land and central Greenland, anchoring in various sheltered fjords for the diversion and benefit of the patients. The return is scheduled for the latter part of September.

SUIT TO RESTRAIN.

Is Coupled With an Action for Damages.

A. J. Sturtevant has brought suit in the circuit court against George Carnes and George Done to restrain them from cutting the bank of the Sturtevant ditch, or taking any water therefrom.

The Sturtevant ditch is one dug about 35 years ago, by James Thompson. Since the ditch was dug the townsite of Pilot Rock was laid out on both sides of it, and now the ditch occupies one of its streets during a part of its course.

Carnes and Done own residences near the ditch, and claim a right to take water from the ditch to irrigate their lots. Some difficulty of a personal nature occurred last Sunday night, so that the complaint asks for \$500 damages in addition to the injunction.
