ALBA NEWS NOTES

SEVERAL CARLOADS OF
BEEF SOLD AND MARKETING

Cattle on the hoof—Bringing Less Than One Year Ago, Though Six Weeks Earlier in Condition—Crops Are Growing Finely—Good Hackleberry Prospects—Horses Ready for Purchasers—Dance Hall Building at Ukiah.

Alba, June 14.—Fine growing weather and showers nearly every day, causing the late crops to get a good start.

Gardens planted earlier than the first of June here are liable to get tipped by the frost.

There was a beef buyer here last week and engaged several carloads at 3-1-4 for steers and 2-1-2 for cows, which is one-fourth cent lower than at this time last year, although the condition of the cattle is six weeks ahead of last year at this time.

If no frost comes from now on the hackleberry crop will be good.

Horses are in fine condition. There are several good teams of work horses here for sale, weighing from 1400 to 1500, also a number of light horses.

Ukiah Will Celebrate.

A large dance hall is being built at Ukiah and elaborate preparations are being made for the Fourth. There are a number of turf men there training horses for the occasion and several good horses are hooked in the program to run for the purses.

Leg Was Broken.

Mager Holmes had the misfortune last Friday to break his leg in two places below the knee. He was falling a tree at the Garnet Meadows, seven miles from here. When the tree was sawn off it slipped off the stump. Dr. Fraker, of Pilot Rock, set the limb. Mr. Holmes was then taken to Pendleton to be cared for.

Pennsylvania Bankers.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., June 15.—The proceedings of this, the second day of the annual convention of the Pennsylvania Bankers' association were opened with prayer by the Rev. Henry L. Jones, D. D. During the day addresses were delivered as follows: John H. Connellam, of Philadelphia, "The Exposition of the Trust Company"; Clark Williams, of New York City, "Good Will in Banking"; Joseph F. Johnson, dean of the New York University School of Commerce, "The Influence of the Gold Supply on Price, Rate of Interest and Bank Deposits"; George M. Coffin, of New York City, "Our National Banking System."

OPERATOR TRANSFERRED
TO PORTLAND OFFICE.

James Pound expects to go to Portland about June 25 to take in the fair and will then visit his parents, who live in Elgin.

W. Frazer, an operator in the W. U. Telegraph office, will act as agent during the absence of H. J. Curtis.

J. R. Severs, who has been an operator in the office here for three years, has accepted a position in the Portland offices, and will leave in a few days.

A crew has been engaged at sinking a well near the round house for the O. R. & N. Co. They struck so much water at 20 feet that the work will be abandoned until the river goes down.

PASSING OF THE BOOKIES.

Missourians Trying to Suppress Race Track Gambling.

St. Louis, June 15.—Turfmen and race followers are anxiously waiting to see the results of the new race law which goes into effect in Missouri today. The new act repeals the breeders' law and prohibits bookmaking throughout Missouri.

Those interested in the law will not have long to wait to note its results.

In accordance with the announcement of last week the Western Jockey club begins a race meeting at the Delmar track today. It is said that purses will be paid as usual as long as the meeting lasts, and while there will be no open bookmaking, it is believed there will be an attempt to carry on betting under cover. Just what method will be resorted to is not known for sure, but it is supposed that some such subterfuge as is practiced at the New York tracks will be tried. Those who know the determined nature of Governor Foulk predict disaster for the jockey club.

MEET IN PENDLETON
SEPTEMBER 12 NEXT.

Will Examine Candidates for Pharmaceutical Certificates After Which the Law Requiring Evidence of Professional Acquirements Will Be Rigidly Enforced in This Part of the State—First Examination to Be Held in Eastern Oregon.

On September 12 a meeting of the state board of pharmacy will be held in Pendleton for the purpose of holding an examination for those of eastern Oregon who desire to become registered pharmacists. A statement to the above effect was made to the East Oregonian this morning by Zadoc J. Riggs, of Salem, secretary of the board, who is here today for the purpose of making arrangements for the coming meeting.

According to Mr. Riggs there are quite a number of drug clerks in eastern Oregon, especially in the small towns, who have never taken the examination and consequently have no right to be so employed. During the past he states that complaint has been made because no examination has been held in this portion of the state, it being claimed that Portland was too far away for the purpose. To overcome this the meeting will be held here in September, after which it is said the law will be more rigidly enforced, and those practicing without a certificate will be prosecuted. The penalty for the offence is a maximum fine of \$100.

Four meetings of the board of pharmacy are held each year, the places being designated so as to accommodate the greatest number of applicants. However, most of the meetings have been held at Portland and this is the first meeting to be held in eastern Oregon. Other members of the board aside from Mr. Riggs, are C. G. Huntly, Oregon City, chairman; Kittie W. Harbord, Salem, treasurer; John M. A. Lane, Portland, and G. C. Blakeley, The Dalles.

According to Mr. Riggs, a large percentage of those who have secured pharmacy certificates during the past years have been graduates of the pharmacy course of the O. A. C., which is a very thorough one and well trains its students for pharmaceutical work. Mr. Riggs himself is the proprietor of a pharmacy in Salem.
