GENERAL NEWS.

A shell exploded on the British battleship *Magnificent*, off Gibraltar, killing four men.

It is reported that 300 men have lost their lives by a colliery explosion followed by fire, in Russia.

The hop crop of Yuba and Sutter counties, California, is expected to be 50 per cent under last year in amount of yield.

Colonel Von Wassman, formerly governor of German East Africa, accidentally shot himself in the head and was killed.

In a quarrel at Kansas City, over a small bill, Howard Vrooman stabbed and seriously hurt Harry J. and J. F. Stoops, brothers.

Susan Atwater Gillette is dead at Kenosha, Wis., aged 105. She was a daughter of John Atwater, who was an aide of General Washington.

Several burglars were detected in the New York residence of E. H. Hariman, which has been vacated for the summer. One was captured. The others escaped without booty.

A new system of making the medical examinations of the pension department will abolish 200 places of making examinations, and the force of examiners who do the work.

Thirteen men were executed in the Colorado penitentiary during the 15 years that all legal executions in the state have taken place therein. No woman has during that time suffered the death penalty.

At Cripple Creek, Colo., McMahon was killed at the bottom of the 500-foot shaft by a missed shot. After the explosion A. Olson leaned over the shaft, fell and was killed. The bodies were taken out at the same time.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Wardner, Idaho, is building a \$15,000 school house to replace the one burned last fall.

Dr. John W. Givens, formerly in charge of the Blackfoot asylum, will be superintendent of the new northern Idaho asylum at Orofino.

J. D. Orien refused at Missoula, Mont., to give up his money to two footpads and was shot while resisting. The bullet went through his abdomen and into his spine. He will die.

The civic improvement committee of the Tacoma Boosters' club is offering eight prizes ranging from \$1 to \$10 for the most neatly arranged grounds cared for by amateurs during this year.

The Cumberland Presbyterian church of Eureka, Or., is preparing to unite with the First Presbyterian church. As soon as the final arrangements are completed a large place of worship will be built near the central part of the city.

The last Idaho legislature authorized the issuance of \$400,000 state bonds. It is since found that \$410,000 reaches the constitutional limit, so the issuance is being held to the latter amount. Donald McCoy & Co., of Chicago, take the entire amount.

The North Pacific Coast Jobbers and Manufacturers association, in session at Portland, elected L. A. Lewis, of Portland, president; W. A. Mears, of Portland, secretary in general, and J. H. Jennings and J. S. Whitehouse, local secretaries at Seattle and Tacoma.

During the past 17 years the state of Washington has realized \$731,208.59 from liquor licenses, the same being one-tenth the amount charged by the cities and towns of the state. However, many delinquencies are reported from different parts of the state, many towns not having cashed in.

THE NEW BOUNDARY

COMMISSION FOR THREE COUNTIES MEETS TODAY.

Line Between Umatilla, Union and Wallawa Will Be Located on Section Lines—Distance Along the Present Boundary Line is About 64 Miles—When New Line is Located it Will Be Nearly 100 Miles in Length—Neither County Will Lose or Gain by New Location.

Turn to the map of Oregon and note the zigzag line following the summit of the Blue mountains between Umatilla, Union and Wallawa counties, and you will at once realize what a difficult and complicated task is before the county boundary commission appointed by those three counties, and which is now in session in La Grande.

County Surveyor J. W. Kimbrell of Umatilla county, left last evening to meet with the other members of the commission at La Grande, when the commission will organize and proceed to locate a definite and fixed line between these counties.

The distance along the summit of the Blue mountains from the Grant county line to the Washington state line, between Union and Umatilla counties is 64 miles, or equal to the distance across 14 townships. This boundary between the two counties does not follow a straight line entirely across an entire section at any place, as located at present, owing to the meandering course of the summit of the mountains.

When the boundary commission finishes its work and the line is established on section lines the entire distance, it is estimated that it will be nearly 100 miles in length. It will be even more zigzag than at present, owing to the fact that it will be governed largely by local conditions found in the mountains as well as by the exact summit. It will be the object of the commission to make an exact division of territory so that neither county will gain or lose by the location of the line, but the line will be made to take wide circuits where canyons run far back into the mountains, at the summit and where settlers are found.

At places the heads of canyons in Umatilla county are two and three miles east of the general summit of the mountains, or extend into Union county territory that distance, and the same is true of other canyons running up from the east side of the mountains and extending into Umatilla county territory for several miles, although a portion of Union county.

The line will be located so as to give each county its exact amount of territory regardless of distances. It has been difficult for assessors to decide in the past as to which county much of the property along the summit of the mountains belonged in, and hereafter this difficulty will be obviated.

COMPLIMENTS PENDLETON BANK

First National Stands Third in the State Financial Standing.

In a financial statement compiled from the report of the comptroller of currency, it is shown that the First National bank of Pendleton stands third in the state of Oregon, in its ratio of surplus and undivided profits to its capital.

In speaking of this remarkable showing, the Financial Brief, published in Portland, says: "A financial paper of New York has figured out from the comptroller of the currency's report, the national banks which are entitled to this distinction and placed them in what is called the '15th annual roll of honor of the national banks of the United States.' It also determines their relative standing by states, this being determined by the ratio of surplus and undivided profits to capital, and concerning the three states in the Pacific northwest, makes interesting reading. The list is as follows in Oregon:

SHERIFF BROWN DETERMINED.

Nabbed Three Gamblers Within 10 Minutes After Game Opened.

Sheriff Brown arrested Joe Buckley and two other gamblers in Baker City Saturday night within 10 minutes after they had opened a game to test the nerve of the sheriff on the gambling question. All three of the gamblers were fined \$50 each and costs, which was paid by an assessment on other saloon men who desired to make a test case.

It had been reported in Baker that Sheriff Brown had decided to "let up" on his raids on the gamblers and Buckley and his partners agreed to open a public game if the saloon men of the city would pay their fines if arrested.

Sheriff Brown sauntered into the saloon before one deal was out and arrested the party. He says that as long as he is sheriff and the present law is on the statute books, he will enforce it without fear or favor and Judge White will impose fines on every one arrested, so the gamblers have given up all hopes of opening in Baker City.

G. A. R. ENCAMPMENT.

Veterans Leave for Oregon City Where They Will Hold Camp Fires Tomorrow.

The state encampment of the Oregon G. A. R. will be held at Oregon City tomorrow, and this morning several members of the order left for that place.

Next Friday will be "G. A. R. day" at the Lewis and Clark fair and both the Oregon state encampment and the Washington encampment which meets at Vancouver tomorrow, will go in a body to Portland, where the day will be devoted to the order. At night a camp fire will be held on the grounds and a suitable program will be rendered, including addresses and patriotic music.

Those who went down from Umatilla county this morning were J. L. Stockman and J. A. Drake, of this city, M. Baker of Athena, and Justice L. F. Wood, of Weston.

OLDEST MAN IN OREGON.

Moses Lore Aged 103 Attended Pioneers' Meeting in Portland.

Moses Lore, of Union, aged 103, supposed to be the oldest man in Oregon, passed through Pendleton this morning en route home from Portland, where he attended the Oregon pioneers' meeting last week.

He was furnished free transportation by the pioneers' society and was accompanied by his son, Joe Lore. Moses Lore is a French Canadian and came to French prairie, Oregon, in 1839, where he lived until 1862, when he moved to Catherine creek, near Union, where he has resided since. He lived among the Kootenai Indians as a trapper for five years before coming to Oregon territory. His wife, a Willamette valley Indian woman, aged 80, is now living in Indiana with a granddaughter. Mr. and Mrs. Lore separated 20 years ago.

RECORD BROKEN.

Unprecedented Turning in of Personal Property.

As a usual thing in giving assessments very few people who have notes and accounts due them turn in anything like the real value of the same to an assessor. But in the Umatilla county assessment this year there is a noteworthy exception to this rule, for in a single instance over \$100,000 in notes, accounts and cash have been turned in. One hundred thousand five hundred dollars in notes and accounts and \$10,000 in cash was given in by George A. Hartman, part of it being his own property, and the rest for his sister, Mrs. Lina Sturgis and the heirs to the Sturgis estate.

According to Assessor Strain this assessment is the largest of its kind ever given to an assessor of this county, and possibly of the state and if the practice would only be emulated by other wealthy people, the effect on the tax rate would be marvelous, and there would be less antipathy to that class.
