GENERAL NEWS.

More troops will be mobilized at Moscow on June 29 to quell the riots of the people.

The receipts of the Seattle government assay office during the past 10 years have been \$109,159,000.

John Parmelee, of Chicago, left \$400,000 in trust, the income from this sum to be used to buy fuel for the poor.

Johanna Hoch, the multi-wife murderer, of Chicago, who was to have hanged June 23, has been granted a stay of execution until July 20.

The Pennsylvania supreme court on June 23 issued a permanent injunction denying the intended consolidation of the cities of Allegheny and Pittsburgh.

Italy has suggested a congress of powers to settle pending international difficulties, including the peace settlement between Russia and Japan and the Moroccan trouble.

Governor Higgins, of New York, regards the crookedness of insurance Commissioner Hendricks as a plain case of stealing with no polished excuses about it.

A reprieve has been granted Mrs. Mary Rogers, under sentence to hang June 22, in Brattleboro, Vt., until December 8. Her case will now go to the supreme court of the United States.

The train dispatchers adjourned their national congress in Denver Friday after electing F. X. Meyer, of Marshall, Texas, as president and declaring for the block system of train signals for safety on all roads.

Fifty millions in first mortgage bonds issued by the Western Pacific railway directors at San Francisco, Friday was taken by the Bowling Green Trust company, of New York. The Rio Grande Western guaranteed the interest on the bonds.

William S. Grant, a well known ship contractor of Farmington, Me., formerly of Oregon, died Friday. He received \$77,000 damages from the government for being captured by Confederates in the war, while delivering government supplies.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

F. M. Jackson, a fisherman of Vancouver, B. C., was drawn into the current caused by the passage of a large steamer, and drowned, Friday.

Four men who had stolen the sloop Ommon from Vancouver, B. C., were drowned in a squall Friday while attempting to reach the American shore.

A man giving the name of Dr. Nathan was indicted Friday in Portland for unbecoming M. Donzac, out of \$75 on the Trail, by selling him a pair of bogus high grade glasses.

While boring for oil near Fresno, this week, a set of shark's teeth petrified and perfectly preserved, was found 1600 feet below the surface of the ground. The teeth are identical with many found on the surface in the same locality.

Clint Buchanan, of the Upper Snake river, who was indicted for the murder of Lew Matthews, an aged farmer living on Snake river, was acquitted at Walla Walla Friday. Matthews was murdered and robbed and Buchanan found the body shortly after the crime and on reporting it was arrested.

Mrs. A. Househoff, of Carmel Valley, California, driving a horse hitched to a buggy with eight children accompanying her, became frightened on a high bluff Friday, and backed the horse and buggy over a precipice 200 feet high, killing the horse, breaking her spinal column and critically injuring every one of the eight children.

PIONEER NODINE WORE AN OX

REMARKABLE EXPERIENCE OF UNION COUNTY MAN.

Oxen Died on the Road and Left Him Stranded in the Sierras Four Days From Sacramento—He Carried One End of the Ox Yoke Into Sutter Creek, His Faithful Wife Walking and Helping Push the Wagon Up The Steep Hills.

Perhaps one of the most interesting pioneers seen at Union on Pioneer's day, Thursday, June 21, was Fred Nodine, a pioneer cattleman and farmer of Union county.

Mr. Nodine's experiences would read like a romance of the most thrilling type, and yet he takes all of his most wonderful history as a mere matter of fact not worthy of record.

Mr. Nodine came from Missouri to California in 1849 during the gold excitement and in crossing the plains with a train of emigrants, his oxen died, one by one, until at last, in crossing the Sierra mountains into the Sacramento valley, he was reduced to one yoke and one of them became sick and he was forced to stop and wait for it to get better in order to make the remainder of the trip.

The other members of the train were in almost as bad condition, and not one of them could spare him an extra oxen to work, so he was forced to stop, while the party went on into Sacramento, where there was a chance to rest and secure food.

Nodine stopped in a lonely mountain pass four days' travel from Sutter creek, and with his wife and boys waited for the oxen to get well enough to travel. He had secured sufficient food from his friends who went ahead to last him for several days, and so was in no danger of suffering from lack of provisions, and he hoped to be overtaken by some other train following his own into the new El Dorado.

On the second day after he stopped in the mountains the sick oxen died, and as winter was closing in he feared to wait longer for a train to overtake him, and so without a murmur, he threw away everything except the bare necessities to lighten his load, yoked up the one remaining oxen, and picking up the other end of the yoke himself, walked and helped draw his wagon into Sacramento, his faithful wife walking and helping push the wagon up the steep hills.

He reached Sacramento and made a stake there, came to Oregon in the early sixties and became the first and most extensive cattleman in Grand Ronde valley. He took up and purchased as swamp land several thousand acres of the tule land in the vicinity of Hot Lake, where he equipped one of the largest and most unique cattle ranches in Oregon, beside draining off large quantities of the tule land and converting it into excellent wheat land. By unfortunate litigation and the force of circumstances he has lost every foot of this land, and is now a poor man, living in a small cottage in Union, while he was once worth \$100,000 in cattle, horses and real estate.

In the midst of the large tract of land acquired by Nodine is a small rocky knoll, standing out alone, as if it had slid down the hillside from the south. This lone knoll now belongs to the Hot Lake tract of land, but Nodine requests that its summit be his last resting place.

Years ago he made the request that he be buried on top of this projection, where his ashes might overlook the empire he had reclaimed from the wilderness and if he still so desires he will be buried there.

Increase in Portland Mail.
