GENERAL NEWS.

Graft is alleged in the letting of a contract by Public Printer Palmer for 72 typesetting machines for use in the government printing offices at Washington.

The steamer Montana has arrived at Comox, B. C., from Kamchatka, laden with sable furs to the value of \$250,000. The cargo will be unloaded at San Francisco.

The receiver for the defunct City Trust Safe Deposit company at Philadelphia, promises that all depositors will be paid dollar for dollar. The deposits amounted to \$1,470,347.

Spain has a national debt of \$1,300,000,000, or \$100 per capita, at an annual interest of \$4 on the \$100. Yet the government has laid out a prodigious naval increase program.

A mail pouch hung on a crane at Belen, N. M., awaiting the arrival of a train. A robber cut the bottom of the pouch and escaped with a portion of the contents, among which was \$2000 in cash.

Michael Flood, a noted baseball player, was shot four times and killed at Las Vegas, N. M., by Robert McSherry, a bartender. The latter claims self-defense. There was an old feud between the men.

The story of the massacre of all the inhabitants of a native village on the coast of Kamchatka, by pirates and the theft of everything valuable in the place, is now authoritatively denied by Russian officials.

Roosevelt has called a meeting of all the consulting engineers of the Panama canal for September 1, in Washington. The French, German and English honorary members of the board are expected to be present.

Captain Griffith, of the British freight steamer Tamer, from Hamburg to Seattle, went insane from delirium tremens, and to save the ship and their lives, the crew overcame him and put him in irons. The crew put J. C. Hughes in command.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Tekoa, Wash., will spend \$8000 this summer on additions to its school buildings, and for a heating plant in the central school building.

A 12-acre field of Canadian hybrid wheat, near Troy, Idaho, is said to be a uniform height of six feet and still growing, being only in blossom at this time.

A Congregational educational association has bid in the unused academy property at Weiser, Idaho, and will convert it into a denominational school.

W. A. La Follette, who lives on Snake river, at Wawawai, near Pullman, this year raised 10,000 boxes of cherries. He has 250 acres in orchard.

Billings, Mont., is to have a beet sugar factory, and adjacent to it will be 20 acres of ground for switches, warehouses and an experimental garden.

All the city officials of Spokane agree that the police force of that place should be increased one-third, but the change is too expensive to be made this year.

The Idaho state fair commission is having 25,000 copies of the last biennial report of the state immigration commissioners printed for distribution in the east as an advertisement of the state.

Mrs. M. M. Smith died at Bonners' Ferry, Idaho, June 23. She crossed the plains in 1849, and settled at Weston, Or. She was 89 years old when she died. Mr. and Mrs. James Casey left with the remains June 24, for Weston. Mrs. Casey is a daughter of the deceased.

CHIEF NO SHIRT'S VISIT IN CHICAGO

DRIED HIS LAUNDRY IN A PALATIAL PARLOR.

While Visiting the Author, Charles N. Crowdon, the Umatilla Chief, Spent His Time Admiring the Comic Section of Chicago Papers—Spent Three Days Seeing the Sights of Chicago While Umapine Was Running Short of Funds in Washington, D. C.

While Umapine, sub-chief of the Umatillas, was fuming and fretting and getting short of money waiting for three days for Chief No Shirt to arrive in Washington on their recent visit to the Indian commissioner, No Shirt was lounging amid the comforts and luxuries of the palatial Chicago home of Charles N. Crowdon, the well known writer of Indian stories and who visited No Shirt on the Umatilla reservation last summer.

During Mr. Crowdon's visit here last week he told the East Oregonian of inviting Chief No Shirt to visit him in Chicago, as he went to Washington, and so when the chief stopped to call upon his friend and lingered wondering for three days among the amusements of the Windy City, Umapine, who had preceded his chief to the national capital, became alarmed at his chief's delay, primarily because he thought No Shirt was lost or had become sick along the route, and secondarily, because No Shirt carried the tribal "sack" and until he arrived Umapine could eat but once a day on account of a shortness of funds.

Standing on the tip top of the Auditorium tower, overlooking the great city of Chicago, Crowdon was pointing out the various sights of interest to No Shirt, when the chief looked down upon the crowded tenements and narrow alleys and said to Crowdon:

"White men live in them houses?"

Crowdon answered that many, many people were crowded in the tenement district.

"How do they live? Where are their farms?" asked No Shirt.

At Crowdon's elegant home the chief was given full liberty to go and come and lounge on the sofas and lie on the grass at will.

His chief delight was in sitting flat on the floor of the parlor while looking at the "Buster Brown" comic newspaper pictures with Crowdon's 6-year-old son—the old Indian and the young child enjoying with equal keen interest the seven-hued comic sheet.

One day No Shirt asked where he could wash some small articles of his wardrobe and after Crowdon directed him to the laundry in the basement, he went about his work thinking no more of the old Indian.

On returning home in the evening he found No Shirt's laundry, consisting of handkerchiefs, socks and neckties, hanging on the backs of chairs, on easels, bric-a-brac and picture frames in the front parlor, one big silk handkerchief being spread over a large bust of Shakespeare, placed in the sunlight pouring in through a west window.

No Shirt and his interpreter, William Charles, were great attractions on the streets of Chicago, people almost blocking the sidewalk at times, in gazing upon the wondering pair. Crowdon, being the representative of a large firm, of matters, took No Shirt down to the store and presented him with the best Stetson in the store and taking No Shirt's old hat, Crowdon was about to throw it away, when the chief grabbed it and carefully took about 10 \$20 bills from under the sweat band.

The Indian had found a new hiding place for his money, but he refused to put the bills under the band of the new hat because he had been forced to reveal his hiding place and would not use it again.

During all of No Shirt's leisurely visit in Chicago, Umapine and his interpreter, Billy McKay, were wiring from Washington to Pendleton friends, twice a day, inquiring if the chief had yet left for Washington.

No Shirt consented to sit for a photograph on the last day of his stay in Chicago, and going down town several hours before train time, the chief began to dress for the sitting. He had a limited ticket from Pendleton to Washington, D. C., and he was compelled to leave Chicago on a certain train in order to reach Washington within the limit.

They went down to the studio in ample time to have a dozen photographs taken before train time, but No Shirt spent two hours arraying himself for the photograph and Crowdon began to get frantic for fear the chief would miss his train. He called No Shirt's attention to the time and urged him to hurry, but the chief went on leisurely making his toilet as if he had a week left on his ticket.

Finally the gorgeous chief's head-dress and robe were properly adjusted and the photograph taken and Crowdon bundled the party into a cab and drove in a gallop to the union depot, arriving just in time to put No Shirt through the gate and onto the train as it began to move out of the station.

J. H. Alken, of La Grands, is now foreman of engine crews at Kameia, this being a new position.

Fixtures for the new block system have been distributed here and the work of putting them in place will begin soon.

The most highly prized scout in the militia's service is a Canadian, Thomas Casey Callaghan, who served as a scout for the Boer army. During the Boer war he was shot through the body and left on the field for dead. He is an accomplished "natural born" linguist.

SQUAW STABBED BY SQUAW.

Old Woman the Victim of Drunken Mary Aleck.

At 6 o'clock last evening two harmless old squaws, one of them old "Mollie," the queer-acting Indian woman who sits about street corners on Second street so often, were engaged in hanging up salmon in their tent, when "Mary Aleck" tore in red-eyed, and without further warning informed them that they were nothing but old slaves and that she was going to kill them, says The Dalles Chronicle. She flourished a big knife and striking at Mollie (who, being partially paralyzed, was unable to get out of way), cut her badly. Other Indians rushing in grabbed the assailant and took her victim in charge.

A message was sent from the cannery to Sheriff Sexton and Dr. Ferguson. The sheriff deputized an Indian police to look out for the prisoner over night and she was locked in a box car. Dr. Ferguson went out and found the old woman had been stabbed three times in the left side, one wound about 2 1/2 inches in length, being at the sixth rib, and the other two near the ninth rib, one of them reaching through the pleural cavity into the abdomen and allowing the contents to protrude.

It is not thought the injured woman can recover, and Mary is in a bad box. She was brought in by Sheriff Sexton this morning and placed in the city jail. When asked by the reporter what she did it for, she said the old woman was crazy and "no good."

As usual with Indians and Chinamen, she conveniently answers "no cunux" when questioned; but it is thought she is wiser than she cares to acknowledge. She is a good looking squaw of about 30 years of age.

The only solution seems to be the old one—too much firewater, as the assault was unprovoked.
