GENERAL NEWS.

The amount of the forgeries discovered in the Clinton, Mo., bank, will reach \$100,000.

The formal announcement of the appointment of John Barrett to be minister to Colombia, has just been made in Washington.

George Bartholomew, of Prussia, is under arrest in Chicago charged with having forged papers aggregating \$24,000 in his native land.

Mrs. James Kirwin, a famous female dancer of New York city, died of apoplexy while dancing at a church ball, in that city, Tuesday morning.

John Jacob Astor, and J. B. Morgan have resigned as directors of the Equitable Life Insurance company, declining to be mixed up in the settlement in any way.

While Speaker Cannon's train was waiting at the depot at Burlington, Iowa, Tuesday, the congressman ran a foot race with a young lady on the depot platform, losing to her by a few feet.

West Virginia brewers have lost a fight against the state tax commission and will be compelled to pay the state over \$1,000,000 in back taxes on licenses which they thought were not constitutional.

Bloody skirmishes are taking place between Armenian and Mohammedans in the Armenian frontier. All the streams are flooded and hostile forces cannot reach the villages or the results would be more terrible.

Mayor Weaver, of Philadelphia, has removed Fire Chief Wilkins and a dozen policemen and has secured conviction of the fire inspector, his clerk and an election clerk all of whom were sentenced to pay a fine of \$500 and serve three months in prison.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Twelve criminal cases are to be tried in the present term of circuit court at The Dalles.

The first balloon ascension of the Lewis and Clark fair will take place July 1, and the first trial of an airship will perhaps take place on July 4.

Mayor Zook, of Ballard, Wash., raided the gambling dens of that city Tuesday and arrested the proprietors and gamblers and will continue to raid the dens as long as they run.

The labor unions of Aberdeen, Wash., have declined to march in the Fourth of July parade with the state militia. They declare the militia is maintained principally for the purpose of fighting labor.

The neighbors of J. A. Chrisman, of Grant county, who is serving a 12-year sentence for killing William Johnson in Galena, two years ago, are protesting against his pardon, which is being sought by his relatives.

Larry Kelly, king of smugglers, was arrested in Tacoma Tuesday, with 125 half-pound cans of opium in his sloop, and will be given the limit of the law, as he has defied the inspectors and detectives for years.

It is hinted that the charge of criminal assault brought against Robert F. Cochrane, of Sparta, Baker county, is a blackmailing scheme and the case is attracting great interest while on trial in Baker City this week.

Two bids were made for the convict labor of the Oregon penitentiary, one for 41 cents per day and one for 50 cents per day. Both bids, however, were rejected because of irregularities in the specifications, and new bids will be advertised for.

HOMESEEKERS ARE NOT BUYING

REAL ESTATE IS NOT
ATTRACTING EASTERNERS.

Prices in Eastern Oregon are Higher Than Many People Expected and They Are Surprised That 50-Bushel Wheat Land Cannot Be Bought at From \$10 to \$25 Per Acre—Real Estate Men Do Not Expect Much Business With Easterners Until They Become Acquainted With Conditions.

Judging from indications so far, Umatilla county is not going to gain much from the "horde" of home-seekers that has been widely predicted will come to the northwest this summer, drawn by the attractions of the Lewis and Clark fair. According to the local real estate dealers, there have been many inquiries about Umatilla land and quite a few have stopped off to view the country and ascertain the exact conditions. But they are unanimous in saying that practically no sales have been made nor will be.

In speaking of the easterners and those from the middle west yesterday evening, E. T. Wade declared those of that class to be the last that he cares to meet, for the fact that nothing can be done with them. According to Mr. Wade, the arrivals from the east are all filled with the idea that good wheat land is to be had in abundance at prices ranging from \$10 to \$25 per acre and when Umatilla county prices are mentioned the man from the east is filled with amazement.

He has come out expecting to buy land that will raise 40 or 50 bushels of wheat per acre and either buy it for a song, or as many believe they can do, rent land for the first few years. A large portion of the new comers are filled with the idea that there is any amount of land that may be easily rented and when told by dealers that such is not the case, are inclined to be skeptical of his statement.

Nor are the new arrivals going to find the cheap land they are looking for even in the smaller counties of eastern Oregon, for even in Gilliam and Morrow counties where land has heretofore been cheap, prices are no longer such. With the advent of the Condon-Arlington railroad land in Gilliam county has greatly appreciated in value as a result and no longer is \$20 and \$30 land rare.

In Sherman county, which has had a railroad for some time already those prices have been common for quite a while and they have now gone even higher. As a result the eastern farmers who formed their opinions of eastern Oregon prices several years ago are certain to be disappointed at what they find now. Thus far there has been nothing to indicate any great rush into any one of the last three named counties this year. Richard & Nowlin, of this city, have been dealing somewhat in Gilliam county lands and they state that but few newcomers have so far arrived this summer.

Another fact that tends to deter new arrivals from making purchases when they first come to eastern Oregon is the false impressions which they receive from seeing only the portion of the country along the railroad. Naturally the land seen along the line is not attractive to one from the prairies of Nebraska or Iowa, and many pass on to western Oregon without really learning the resources of this part of the state.

WENAHU RESERVE CREATED.

State Land Officials Find President's Proclamation—Settlers May Get Relief.

Salem, June 25.—The state land department is in receipt of a proclamation issued by President Roosevelt, under date of May 12, setting aside 18 townships in the northwest part of the state and in the state of Washington to be known as the Wenaha forest reserve. That portion of the reserve situated in Oregon consists of about 23,000 acres lying principally in Umatilla county, but verges into the northwestern corner of Walla Walla county.

The proclamation was received some time ago, but it had become misplaced and overlooked and was uncovered only yesterday. This reserve includes 32 sections of school land and will give the state 10,240 acres more of base upon which to select lieu land and for sale. The land officials have not as yet figured out just what amount of this school land has already been sold and how much of it is available for use as base.

This is the reserve upon which over 100 settlers along the Wenaha river, in Walla Walla county, petitioned the president to exclude their settlement from the permanent reserve, which petition was forwarded to the president by Governor Chamberlain only last week.

Although the reserve was proclaimed permanent by the president on May 12, the governor says that it is not too late for them to gain the relief sought, as the president is privileged to change the boundaries of the reserve at any time. The settlers who presented the petition are located in townships 5 and 6, north of range 42 east.

WALLACE RESIGNS

PANAMA CANAL ENGINEER
LEAVES THE JOB.

Wallace Favors Sea Level Canal Costing \$240,000,000 and the President is Supposed to Have Asked Him to Resign—Work is Progressing Satisfactorily on the Canal—One Hundred Russian Emigrants Take Jobs in the Trenches.

New York, June 25.—John F. Wallace, chief engineer of the Panama canal commission, has resigned and will not return to Panama.

Mr. Wallace favors a sea-level trench, costing \$240,000,000, exclusive of the \$50,000,000 for the purchase of the rights. He considers such a canal will be a perfect one; that it will remove all restrictions upon navigation; there will be no delays in locks, and that it is better to have instead of "shoddy" and a counter-sail a canal "all wool and a yard wide."

All the work done thus far, he says, has been useful and will not affect construction along the lines of any of the general plans that have been suggested.

There are now 10 large steam shovels in commission in the Culebra cut, the biggest, a 95-ton machine, scooping up five cubic yards at every dip. Before January 1 there will be 29 of these large shovels at work.

There are now 7500 laborers in the trench. These are in the engineering and contract departments. Of this number 1200 are Americans and the remainder aliens.

One hundred Russian emigrants, crossing the isthmus on their way to California three or four weeks ago saw what they thought was a good opening, and they all jumped into the trench, literally speaking, and grabbed shovels. They are much pleased with their job.

NO FEAR OF LIGHTNING.

Telephone Company to Install Carbon Protectors in All 'Phones

The Pacific States Telephone company purposes to install carbon protectors in connection with all 'phones in the city. The protectors are now in stock, but have not as yet been put in.

The carbon protector is a recent invention which is an additional safeguard against lightning. They are being installed in Everett at present and will be put in all over the lines owned by the Sunset company, says the Spokane Chronicle.

The telephone company is also completing plans for the installation of the new central energy system. When this service is in working order it will do away with all dry batteries in the telephones, the electricity being furnished from the central station. To make the change it will be necessary to install a complete new set of telephones and new switchboards at the central station.

The work may be started in the near future or not for a year. The whole matter is now in the hands of the engineer, and after his plans are completed the work will commence. With the new system in use the expense of operation will be materially reduced, as the necessity for dry batteries will be entirely obviated.
