

AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE

Litigation Is Costly.

Five criminal cases tried in the superior court last week cost the county and state of Washington approximately \$1000. Clerk Dorsey Hill was busy today making up the cost bills in the various cases in order to file them early with the state auditor. In cases where a conviction is secured the state rebates to the county court a certain percentage of the costs.

The total cost of witnesses and jurors in the Schoneberger case was \$172.10. In addition to these expenses in this particular case is the cost of board and lodging for the 12 jurors for three days, which will bring the total cost of the trial something over \$200, extremely light compared to ordinary murder trials.

The salaries of the jurors who either tried cases or were called and later discharged totals \$441.70 and the amount paid to witnesses foots up to \$216.85. Other expenses to be added are the salaries of bailiffs at \$3 per day each, back fares and sheriff's expenses in summoning jurors and witnesses.—Walla Walla Statesman.

Will Inspect Private Schools.

Annual inspection of private schools of the state, such as the Puget Sound university, of Olympia, Whitman college, Walla Walla, and the like, will hereafter be conducted by the superintendent of public instruction under the following resolution adopted by the state board of education yesterday:

"Resolved, that it is the sense of this board that all private institutions of learning in this state that have been placed upon the accredited list, or that may hereafter be placed upon the accredited list, should be inspected at least once each year, and the superintendent of public instruction is hereby required to compel the schools contemplated by this resolution to be inspected by his deputy at least once each year, said inspector to make a report to the state board of education at its meeting next succeeding the date of his inspection, giving the facts in regard to the equipment of the school and the character, thoroughness and comprehensiveness of the work being done by it.—Walla Walla Statesman.

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Walla Walla's Invention.

Among a number of inventions which A. H. Hopton, of this city, has under way is one for an improved street sweeping contrivance. It is constructed so that it can be propelled by a gasoline motor and owing to the manner in which it is put together it can be operated with practically the same power required to propel an ordinary auto car.

Mr. Hopton has not yet had the device patented, but he has all the plans drawn and is prepared to demonstrate its practicability and usefulness. He is of the opinion that one machine would be sufficient to clean the streets of Walla Walla in less than half the time now required and at only a fraction of the cost.

He expects to try and interest the city council in his sweepers with a view to getting it on the market, and will give the city the benefit of one or two machines in the event of their acceptance, for the assistance and benefit he will derive from the experiment.—Walla Walla Union.

Sawed First Lumber in Baker.

George B. Janey, a pioneer of Oregon and the man who sawed the first lumber ever used for building purposes in Baker City, is dead. He passed away at the home of his niece, Mrs. Bud Moses, two and a half miles northwest of town Sunday, June 25, "the cause" leading up to his death was an injury received in a runaway two weeks ago.—Baker City Herald.

FAMOUS SUFFRAGE WORKER.

Story of Susan B. Anthony, Now Attending Convention in Portland.

In giving a list of the famous living women of the world, the Denver Post says of Susan B. Anthony, who is now attending the Equal Suffrage convention in Portland:

Well known at the ripe age of 85, wherever there are women with political aspirations, is Susan B. Anthony, one of the few famous women who have never married and a surviving pioneer of the fight for woman's right to vote.

It is only fair to say for this brave soul—brave, you must admit, whatever you think about equal suffrage—that she has never fought for fame, but always for her cause. And though the right to vote has been extended to women in only a few states, she has won many legal rights for her sex, such as the married woman's joint legal proprietorship in her husband's real property, in some states, though in no state has he any rights in hers.

To understand the nature of some other rights which Miss Anthony has won for women, let the reader be reminded that when, in 1853, only 52 years ago, she made her first public address before a teachers' convention, after a long and heated debate of protest by the men present, a minister of the gospel told her that while "the matter and the manner" of her address were entirely objectionable, he would rather his wife and daughter were dead than that either had just spoken in public as she had.

Today none is scandalized by a woman speaking in almost any public place; this is true in Europe as well as in America, and "Aunt Susan" and her friends are proud that she helped bring it all about. Miss Anthony has registered and voted, too, in her time, swearing in her vote, and afterward being arrested the same as any other illegal voter must be. But her battle for the suffrage is not now so strenuous as once it was, and she does not expect to see complete victory.

She has never won wealth along with her fame and the boons she has secured for her sisters. Today her modest little home in Rochester, N. Y., is about all she has to show in a material way for her life work.

TO MAKE MEN GROW.

Colorado Professor Invents a Machine to Increase Your Height.

Prof. David B. Cropp, physical instructor in the University of Colorado, is the inventor of a machine whereby any person may increase his height and chest measurements easily and quickly without physical discomfort. One's height may be increased from two to five inches.

For three years Professor Cropp and Professor Fordyce P. Cleaves of the scientific department have been experimenting secretly with remarkable results. Professor Cropp has increased his height from five feet eight inches to five feet ten and a half inches and his chest measurement from 39 1/2 inches to 41 inches. Nine other men in the university have attained results approximating the gains made by Cropp.

The machine is used in a vertical position and accomplishes cartilage expansion. The results are permanent, as most of those reported by Cropp were secured months ago. Tabulated statements of results in each case have been given out.

Idaho Sheep King Sells.

Robert Noble, of Reynolds, sheep king of Idaho, has disposed of his flock, containing about 130,000. The price has not been made public, but it is said to be in the neighborhood of \$240. Noble went to Idaho 30 years ago a poor boy and herded sheep, afterwards securing a band on shares. Besides the flock disposed of, he owns a 3000-acre farm and has large real estate holdings in Boise.
