Beets Increase Land Values.

E. H. Dewey gave some very interesting information with respect to the sugar beet plant that is to be erected at Nampa, and the effect the prospective industry has had on the value of farm lands in that vicinity, to the Boise Statesman recently. He said the site for the plant was within the corporate limits. The building would be 400 feet long and 200 feet in width. At its highest point it would reach 90 feet above the ground, while its average height would be 80 feet. Two million four hundred thousand brick would be needed for its construction. For the generation of steam for power and other purposes four boilers would be installed of 250 horse power each. It was the anticipation of the company that the plant would be kept in operation about six months each year, employing about 300 hands, while it was running.

Land values, Mr. Dewey said, had increased enormously. To illustrate, he stated that he recently made Robert Noble an offer of \$65 an acre for the 600-acre ranch that he sold him a year ago for \$40 an acre. The offer was refused. Mr. Dewey endeavored to secure this land for persons who had asked him to make purchases for them. He had made efforts to purchase other lands but so far without success, being asked in some cases over \$100 an acre for land that had not yet been broken.

Nez Percés Will Celebrate.

At a meeting held at Spalding by the representatives of the different factions of the Nez Percé tribe, it was unanimously agreed to hold a joint celebration at Spalding, beginning July 4. With the advanced education of the younger element of the tribe and the encroachment of the whites, the Indians are fast realizing the passing of the old time customs and traditions and having eliminated all factional feeling will unite with the other tribes that will be here, make this the grandest celebration and war parade in the history of the northwest Indians.

The celebration of the election of Chief Waters as successor to the late Chief Joseph will play an important part in the festivities. It is being planned to have daily excursions run from Spokane during the camp. The

meeting voted Spalding the permanent place in the future for their annual celebrations, as the inconveniences and extra expense have proved very unsatisfactory to both the Indians and whites in holding the camp at any other place.—Lewiston Tribune.

N. P. Engineer Resigns.

Engineer E. C. Pollard, who has been in charge of the Northern Pacific work in the Clearwater section for the past year, has resigned, his resignation to take effect July 1, and will hereafter be identified with the O. R. & N. company in the construction work on the Snake river and on the coast. Mr. Pollard has spent much of the past year in Lewiston, and is well acquainted with the grades and conditions in the Lewiston and the Clearwater country. The routes that are now being surveyed he has very carefully inspected, and he is recognized as one of the most able engineers in the country. When seen yesterday Mr. Pollard refused to discuss his change to the Harriman lines, but it was definitely learned that the change will be made July 1, and that he will immediately go into the service under Chief Engineer, Roschke, of the O. R. & N. company.—Lewiston Tribune.

Sun Dance at Pocatello.

The Indians are having a "Sun Dance" down in the Bottoms and many Pocatello people are going down to witness it. The dance commenced on Saturday evening and lasts continuously until Tuesday evening. This dance is given on the advice of the medicine man and this particular kind of a dance has not been given for several years. An enclosure has been built in which the dancers are arranged in a circle and dance to the sound of tom-toms and various noises. The dancers are all males, bearded with colors of all kinds and bedecked with feathers. The dancers go through the dance until absolutely down and out when the medicine man administers medicines that are calculated to expel the disease that the dancer is affected with. This treatment the Indian claims to be particularly effective in cases of tuberculosis. The dance is also a species of sun-worshipping.—Pocatello Tribune.
