GENERAL NEWS.

The Missouri supreme court upholds every detail of the new state law prohibiting race track betting.

The Chinese government did not ask to be represented in the coming peace negotiations between Japan and Russia.

Ada Rehan, the American actress, is ill in London with appendicitis. There are hopes of saving her life with an operation.

Cuba has enacted a law giving special concessions to American rice growers, and the rice industry of the southern states is expected to be much stimulated thereby.

Attorney General Miller, of Missouri, holds that the state militia can be legally ordered out to enforce the anti-gambling law when the local authorities cannot or will not.

June 1 there were 9702 persons employed on the Panama canal in all departments. In the department of government and sanitation were 2065; in actual construction, 7673.

Eugene McNeil and O. T. Canfield, of Branchville, N. J., caught a five-pound bass in which were found a New Jersey one-cent piece dated 1776, and a key made of silver alloy, of an antique pattern.

At Danbury, Conn., a wooden building about 100 years old was torn down. Secreted in the space behind a discarded and bricked-up fireplace were found 300 \$5 gold pieces all dated between 1830 and 1834 inclusive.

The latest figures disclose that the Chicago brokerage firm of Knight, Donnelly & Co., which failed a few days since, has liabilities amounting to \$3,900,000. Among the incidents of the failure is the defalcation of a trusted clerk for \$30,000.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Six young people were graduated June 28 from St. John's academy (Catholic) at Oregon City.

Samuel Begovich, Butte, Mont., dish washer, has fallen heir to \$30,000 cash, willed him by an uncle who lately died in Brazil.

George M. Kuhn, defaulting postmaster at West Seattle, attempted suicide with morphine to avoid arrest. Physicians pumped him out.

John Thompson and Frank Reed, each 17 years old, have been arrested at Drain charged with holding up and robbing a drunken man at Roseburg.

An eastern chemist named James Alexander will erect at Aberdeen, Wash., a \$65,000 plant for the manufacture of the by-products of fir, spruce and cedar.

J. L. Post pleaded guilty to committing a burglary at Mount Tabor, near Portland, and was sentenced to a seven-year term. It is his third term in the Oregon penitentiary.

The Shook brothers, B. B. Beekman and Mrs. D. E. Ralston, are holding up the entire Klamath lake federal irrigation project by refusing to sign away their lands on the agreed terms.

Captain C. F. Hartman, of the signal corps, and Lieutenant J. C. Wilson, of the third infantry, will be court-martialed at Vancouver. The first is charged with violating the canteen law and the latter with duplicating pay accounts.

Melvin C. Lewis, of Oelwein, Iowa, shot himself through the head at Corvallis, the day he arrived to visit with his brother Ambrose, whom he had not seen in many years. Death was instantaneous. No possible motive appears reasonable to his relatives and friends that has as yet been suggested.

FAIR ATTENDANCE

OVER 310,000 SINCE

THE OPENING DAY.

Greatest Attendance in Proportion to Population of the Exposition City, of Any Fair Ever Held—Within a Radius of 500 Miles of Portland 1,500,000 People Reside and the Daily Average Attendance Since the Lewis and Clark Fair Opened Has Been 14,127.

Portland, June 30.—That the Lewis and Clark exposition will prove to be a notable success from the point of attendance is practically a foregone conclusion, though it has been open less than a month. It has had a larger attendance for the first three weeks, in proportion to the population of Portland and its vicinity, than any other exposition ever held in the United States. Figures compiled by John A. Wakefield, the director of concessions and admissions, who has been connected with half a dozen expositions, shows that the Portland fair has enjoyed an attendance up to date 200 per cent greater than any other exposition, considering the population within a radius of 500 miles.

Approximately 1,500,000 people live within 500 miles of Portland. Since the opening day, June 1, the daily attendance at the fair has averaged 14,127. The city of Portland has about 140,000 inhabitants. Chicago, at the time of the Columbian exposition, including its immediate suburbs, contained practically as many people as dwell within Portland's 500-mile radius. Yet for the first month of the Chicago fair the daily attendance ran from 18,524 to 30,329, excepting one special day when 62,000 people were present.

For the first 22 days of the Portland fair, ending with June 22, the admission aggregated 310,795. Of these, 160,798 were paid admissions, averaging 7309 paid admissions daily. As the fair goes on, the pass admissions will be decreased and the paid admissions will increase. Many workmen have been employed about the grounds during the first few weeks, putting the finishing touches on the exhibit booths here and there, shaping up the latter landscape work and completing some of the buildings on the trail, the concessions for which were granted late. This has made the free admission aggregate considerably greater than it will be during the remainder of the exposition period. On the other hand, it is the experience of all expositions that the crowds do not begin to come until the second month, and as a rule the largest attendance is in September and October.

The paid admissions for the first 22 days at Portland were equal to the aggregate for the entire first month at the Omaha exposition, notwithstanding the fact that within one night's ride of Omaha there were 14,000,000 people. With less than one-seventh as many inhabitants in the corresponding territory, Portland feels that she has surpassed the most sanguine expectations.

The Lewis and Clark exposition will run until October 15. A daily average no larger than that of the first three weeks would give nearly a million paid admissions, which many experienced exposition men declared before the opening of the fair would be as large an attendance as reasonably could be expected from an exposition so far from the great centers of population. But it is the history of all expositions that the first month's attendance is the smallest of all, and Director Wakefield counts upon a paid attendance far exceeding one million. Hotel bookings in Portland indicate a far larger attendance for July and August, while it is not to be doubted that September and the closing days of the fair in October will bring the largest crowds of all.

OILING WALLA WALLA STREETS.

Experiment of Oiling 10 Blocks Will Cost \$1450.

The experiment of oiling a number of streets in Walla Walla was begun this morning under the direction of the street committee and Frank Rees of Los Angeles, says the Walla Walla Statesman. The sprinkling of oil fluid was witnessed by a large crowd of interested spectators this morning, when the work was begun on Boyer avenue. Up to noon five applications of the oil had been made.

Last night a steam pipe from one of the W. & C. R. locomotives was attached to one of the large tanks and the oil was heated until it was as thin as water. This morning two sprinkling wagons were used in taking the oil from the tanks and spreading it on the avenue. The avenue was well covered with the oil which soon began sinking into the ground, changing the light color of the soil to a dark one similar to asphalt when it is first laid on the streets.

The avenue was closed to traffic from Palouse as far east as the Odd Fellows' home.

The experiment will be watched with a great deal of interest as it proves to be what is claimed for it by Mr. Rees it will be the means of solving the question of keeping down the dust throughout the city during the summer months.

Palouse will be treated in a similar manner as soon as Boyer avenue is completed and Chase avenue is also to be given a light coating of oil.

The cost of the oil and putting it on the streets will be \$1450.

Successful Glass Season.
