### JOHN HAY.

John Hay, the last connecting link between the official life of Abraham Lincoln and the present day, is dead. When Hay was a young man of 23, just out of Brown college, from which he graduated in 1858, he became the intimate friend, confidant and assistant secretary to the great martyr, Lincoln, and from that day until his death last night, in Newbury, New Hampshire, has been almost continuously in public life as a trusted and brilliant servant of the American people.

As secretary to American legations abroad, as president of the great sanitary congress, as editor of the Tribune, as army officer, secretary of state and in every other place he has filled he has been the same steadfast, thorough, outspoken, ideal American citizen, never swerving from his fixed pathway for prejudice or political favor.

But the glory of John Hay, the diplomat and public servant, is overshadowed in the glory of John Hay, the poet and author. "Jim Bludsoe" will live longer than the name of any American secretary of state. "Pike County Ballads" will be still fresh and verdant in the memories of men when the Hay-Pauncefote treaties have perished and are forgotten.

### A PLEA FOR MOTHERS.

The East Oregonian regrets that the National Woman's Suffrage convention now in session in Portland cannot be held in Oregon just preceding the state election next June.

The Woman's Suffrage amendment to the constitution will be up for a vote at that time and the coming of such a representative body of women to the state just before the election would stimulate the citizens of Oregon to give woman her just rights.

It is pitiable and ridiculous, the long-enduring prejudice nursed and kept alive by mankind against the mothers, wives and daughters. It is pitiable because of woman's untiring efforts to secure her rights from the very sons to whom she gave life and ridiculous because man has set himself above his wife and mother, as some exalted intellectual image, whose exclusive privilege it is to make (and abuse) the laws.

"What is man that thou art mindful of him?" Why, he is no bigger than woman, mentally or physically, and not half so good or conscientious.

And yet he is a political monopolist, a social plutocrat, demanding obedience and servitude from woman, yet denying her a place on the social plane beside him. It is disgusting to think that a thug, a reprobate, a scoundrel, a gambler, a debauched charlatan and all other specimens of humanity classed as men, may vote for officials to make and enforce

laws, and yet the pure mothers, self-sacrificing wives, whose efforts are ever toward a higher ideal, are not permitted to participate in elections to say what laws shall be made or how vigorously such laws shall be enforced.

Candidly and frankly, is it not disgusting, shameful, to think of these things? And why is it so? Because intelligent men, strong, virile men, take a stand with the lowest classes, in a political way, against the mothers.

The vote for the suffrage amendment in Oregon should be so overwhelming next June as to be a perpetual rebuke to the man who should dare question the good sense and ability of his mother or wife again, in this great state.
