GENERAL NEWS.

On the New York cotton exchange Theodore H. Price on July 3 cleared \$1,000,000 by cotton advancing 100 points, the equivalent of \$5 per bale.

William Gardner, of Cincinnati, while temporarily insane, shot and killed his wife, William Applegate, Carry Smith and Policeman Worth, and then suicided.

Henry Heine and his 14-year-old daughter were asphyxiated by gas in San Francisco. Mrs. Heine became a raving maniac immediately after the bodies were discovered.

Mayor Tom Johnson, of Cleveland, is an avowed candidate for the democratic nomination for president in 1908, on a government ownership of public utilities platform.

While running at less than a mile a minute, an automobile driven by Paul Sartori, in New York, crashed through a fence, killing a boy named Malloran. Sartori was not injured.

All the eastern railroads entering Denver are experiencing the worst tie-up since they were built, on account of excessive rains in eastern Colorado and western Nebraska and Kansas.

The Peary north pole expedition is hung up for lack of \$50,000 with which to buy provisions. Peary is confident the money will be forthcoming, but is not able to tell from whence.

The Colorado supreme court has sustained the corporation flat tax, which was contested by the American Smelting & Refining company. This decision will increase the state's revenue about \$500,000 annually.

Philip E. Neville, of Phoenix, Ariz., has for 17 years been a hermit with a "queer, ugly streak" that made him shunned and feared. It lately transpired that he bears the title of Baron of Latimer, and he lately received \$9000, the first installment of a large fortune to which he has fallen heir.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

An 18-room hotel is being built at Gardena, near Touchet, to cost \$2500. At Grand Forks, Idaho, Jesse Jacques took cramps while in bathing, and drowned.

At Wallace, Idaho, a falling rock broke the neck of Arthur Campbell, a miner, killing him.

The Foresters of America will build a temple at Spokane. The order has recently purchased a site costing \$11,000.

Several stockraisers around Waverly, Wash., have lost animals which were poisoned by grain put out for squirrels.

The mills of the Great Northern Mill company at Anacortes, were destroyed by fire. Loss, \$40,000, only partially insured.

The wool clip of J. D. C. Theissen has been warehoused at Lewiston for a raise in prices. There is 100,000 pounds in the clip.

Contracts have been let for 11 miles additional grading for the Spokane & Inland electric road. This will take the road into Waverly.

Dorothy, the 13-year-old daughter of E. E. Teape, of Sandpoint, Idaho, was drowned at that place while playing with other children on a raft on July 4.

Jesse H. Rose has contracted to build an electric road from North Yakima through the valleys of Naches, Abatanum, and Moxee by January, 1907.

An opium joint burned at Lewiston, destroying a large quantity of opium, and the personal effects of a dozen or more Chinamen. There were several narrow escapes.

PENDLETON MAN IS AN INVENTOR

F. M. OLIVER PATENTING
A HOSPITAL STRETCHER.

One of the Most Useful Devices of the Sick Room Came to His Mind in a Dream—A Complete Stretcher Will Be Placed in St. Anthony's Hospital—No Other Similar Invention on the Market—Mr. Oliver Invented a Successful Automatic Car Coupler Twenty Years Ago.

Perhaps the greatest boon ever invented for the sick room and hospital is just being patented by a Pendleton man.

F. M. Oliver, the well known Pendleton grocer who has just retired from the business has been working on his invention for the past six months and has now applied for a patent for it and will at once construct one for use in St. Anthony's hospital.

The invention is called the hospital stretcher or lifter and is designed to lift sick and injured persons by a pulley arrangement attached to a light frame, which is slipped under the person, wherever lying, from which position the patient can be raised easily and without jar or pain.

The frame consists of two jaws, to which slats are fastened, the jaws working on a joint so they can be opened to pass over the body, and then by being closed the frame is fixed under the body and the jaws locked, when the body in the frame is gently lifted by means of the pulley, when the entire frame of the lifter, being on casters, may be wheeled from room to room or the patient held in it while the bed is being changed.

The main frame of the lifter is seven feet long and six feet high so it can be placed over any bedstead, lengthwise, and the frame used to place patients in bed, change beds, or take them from one bed or room to another.

The frame will be made from small gas pipe of sufficient strength, however, to bear the weight of the heaviest man, and the entire lifter when complete will not weigh more than 60 pounds.

There is nothing of the kind now in use in hospitals or physicians' offices anywhere and it promises to be one of the most useful inventions of the age, in this line.

Mr. Oliver declares the idea came to him in a dream, and that although he had made a study of mechanics and had invented mechanical devices before, yet he had never thought of such an invention as this until the entire plan of it appeared to him in his dreams, when he immediately began working on it and never stopped until he completed a model, which works perfectly.

Twenty years ago, before car couplers were in general use, Mr. Oliver invented an automatic car coupler which was pronounced to be one of the most practical and simple among some 1200 such inventions then before the car companies. However, as there was no law to compel the companies to equip their cars with automatic couplers at that time, Mr. Oliver despaired of ever making a success of the coupler and did not revive it when the law was finally passed compelling such equipment.

REGISTERED WRONG.

Walla Walla Prison Officials Arrested for Perjury.

Walla Walla, July 5.—Alleged to have sworn falsely as to their legal places of residence in registering for the coming city election, warrants were issued and served Saturday afternoon upon Captain Charles B. Woods and seven guards at the penitentiary, charging them with perjury. The complaints were sworn to by Attorney John H. McDonald and attested by Attorney Oscar Cain.

The complaints were filed with Clerk Dorsey Hill and the warrants were issued and placed in the hands of Sheriff Palmer to serve. The men named in the warrants are T. F. Donoghue, C. L. King, Fred Scott, D. H. Woolery, H. Kinsman, R. R. Hazeltine, W. H. Dixon, all of them guards, and Charles B. Wood, captain and deputy warden of the state penitentiary.

VALDEZ IN A FLOOD.

Alaskan Mining Town Partly Destroyed by High Water.

Seattle, July 5.—Floods have destroyed a large section of the town of Valdez, Alaska, according to dispatch received from that place yesterday via the military cable. But meager particulars are contained in the message which came to Major Glassford of the local cable office.

The dispatch merely states that the glacier stream which flows into the bay just above the town is overflowing and has already washed away 40 cabins and torn down a mile of poles along the military telegraph line.

The snowfall in the vicinity of Valdez last winter was unusually heavy and the spring was later than usual, so when the rains began a few days ago the snow melted with unusual rapidity, swelling the streams far out of their ordinary boundaries.

People here who are familiar with the country fear that if so much damage has been done immediately adjacent to the town even greater injury has probably resulted in the interior.

BOXES MUST GO.

Mayor Lane Issues Orders to Enforce Portland's Ordinances.

Private boxes in saloons and in restaurants where liquors are sold must be removed, says the Oregon Daily Journal.

Mayor Lane's first step toward carrying out the policy outlined by him before his election has been to instruct Chief of Police Hunt to order all saloon keepers and restaurant men who are violating the box ordinance to remove the boxes at once. The mandate was issued early Monday morning and Chief Hunt detailed officers to see that it was carried into effect.

"The boxes will have to go," said the mayor, "for I intend that the ordinance shall be enforced."

At least 12 restaurants and one-fourth of the 480 saloons in the city are affected by the order. The ordinance provides that no person engaged in selling liquors in saloons or restaurants shall sell any liquors to be delivered or used in any side room, back room, upper room or other apartment, in the same or adjoining building, and shall not maintain any alcove, booth or box; nor shall they have any private or separate entrance for any particular class of customers. The ordinance further provides that it shall be unlawful for any person to maintain any saloon or restaurant that has connected with it any private box or stall unless such box or stall contains 160 square feet floor space. A penalty of not more than \$100 fine or imprisonment not to exceed 30 days may be imposed for a violation of the ordinance.

LOCAL OPTION LAW VALID.

Supreme Court Decides That the People May Regulate Sale of Liquor.

A special from Salem to the Morning Oregonian says:

The supreme court today handed down a decision sustaining the validity of the local option liquor law adopted by the people in June, 1904. The opinion, written by Chief Justice Wolverton, holds that there is nothing in the constitution which prevents the adoption of a liquor law to take effect locally upon a vote of the people of the district affected.

This decision was rendered in the suit brought by P. F. Fouts to recover from the city of Hood River the saloon license fee he had paid in advance before the local option law became effective. The city refused to pay on the ground that the local option law is unconstitutional and that there is nothing to prevent the sale of liquor under the license. The circuit court upheld the local option law and this decision is sustained.
