Steele is Still Missing.
 "You can correct the statement that the body of Francis Steele has yet been found, or that it was found as reported last week," said Nash Wayland, who arrived direct from Thunder Mountain this morning. "I have just come out over the trail and when I passed through the Big Creek section the searching party was still out and had then made no discovery nor had they then found any further trace of Steele than the one at the cabin where he ate the provisions."
 "At this cabin three men were stopping and the cook of the day had just prepared a meal of four grouse, a pot of beans and two loaves of bread. He stepped from the cabin to the creek and was catching a mess of fish for supper while the men at work were coming in to dinner. In the interval Steele must have entered the cabin and devoured the meal in his ravenous hunger, for he had then been 14 days on the road from Salmon river and had when he left there but five days' provisions. The miners followed his trail and found his gloves and papers on the hillside above the cabin."
 "The only explanation they can make of his actions at that time is that he was demoralized from the hunger and exposure and was wandering aimlessly when he happened on the cabin. After the meal he plunged into the woods and all trace of him is lost at that point. He was then 22 miles from Roosevelt and there was no snow on the ground to help the searchers."

Church Bell With a History.
 The demolition of the old Methodist church at Wabburg, now proceeding, has brought out some rather interesting facts in connection with the old bell, which has so faithfully for many years called the people to worship.
 It is asserted that the bell was purchased over 50 years ago at Portland from the captain of an ocean vessel. Years afterward the bell was removed to a Walla Walla church. Upon the building of the new edifice at the Garden City, funds were provided for the purchase of a new bell, whereupon arrangements were made to take the old one to Wabburg.
 Rev. Marvin will endeavor to interest the people of Portland in the historic bronze, to the end that an implement that has served its purpose long and faithfully, may not be thrown ruthlessly upon the scrap pile.

Shot Through the Thigh.
 George Deschamps, a young man from the Waha region, was accidentally shot through the right thigh last Saturday by Fred Stevens. The accident happened at a camp about 15 miles above Pierce City and Mr. Deschamps was carried for seven miles over a rough trail and then placed in

a wagon and brought to Greer from which point he was brought to Lewiston yesterday and placed in the St. Joseph hospital where his wound was cleansed and dressed.
 The wound is a most severe one and will require several weeks to heal. The bullet from a 38-35 calibre Marlin rifle entered the right thigh in the back and about half way between the hip and the knee and passed through the femur, which was badly shattered. Several large splinters of bone were removed yesterday in the operation and at a late hour last night Mr. Deschamps was resting easily.
 Mr. Deschamps had arrived at the camp from Lewiston but a few minutes before receiving the shot. After greeting his friends in front of the tent he asked for a drink of water and was directed to enter the tent. As he came out he noticed Fred Stevens extracting the cartridges from the magazine of a rifle. Mr. Deschamps passed on but had taken but a few steps when in some manner one of the cartridges exploded and the ball entered the thigh as before described.—Lewiston Tribune.

Granite Handling Plant.
 The Idaho Granite company has just received a shipment of new machinery, consisting of derricks, tools, etc., with which to handle the large blocks as they are channeled out of the ledge at their large quarries located about 40 miles up the Snake river. This machinery will be sent up the river by boat on Thursday of this week, and upon arrival there will immediately be put in place for use.
 It is more than likely that the product of this quarry will enter into the construction of the new addition to the state normal college building.—Lewiston Tribune.

Drowned in the John Day.
 Last Monday evening the John Day river claimed another victim in the person of Melvin Webb, a resident of Mayville. Mr. Webb, in company with the other harvest hands at Burnt ranch, went bathing in the evening after work hours. Francis Easter was out in the river locating a shallow place for the boys who could not swim. Mr. Webb, being one of those left on the shore, slipped into the river which was deep at the bank, and met his doom. Those on shore rendered all assistance possible for men to do who cannot swim.—Mitchell News.

Indicted for Sheep Shooting.
 C. E. and Robert Edmondson, father and son, have been indicted in Wheeler county for sheep shooting. The crime for which the Edmondsons are held was committed in the mountains last summer. The sheep which were shot belonged to a stockman named Thomas Fitzgerald—Madras Pioneer.

LIVESTOCK STATISTICS.

Nearly 3,000,000 Head of Stock for May at Five Market Centers.

During the month of May the number of animals received at Chicago, Kansas City, Omaha, St. Louis and St. Joseph amounted to 2,935,910 head, an amount approximately 400,000 head greater than corresponding movements in either of the two preceding years. Of June's receipts at these markets, 584,898 head were cattle, 69,380 head calves, 1,472,214 head hogs, 780,000 head sheep and 29,418 head horses and mules. Gains were made in each one of the classes peddled by comparison with like movements in 1903 and 1904.

The number of cars required to handle inbound movement of livestock at these five markets during the year totaled 52,385, as against 46,974 cars in 1904 and 48,291 cars in 1903. For a five-month period receipts of livestock aggregated 14,365,655 head in 1905, as against 13,950,327 head in 1904 and 12,578,270 head in 1903. The cattle arriving during this period numbered 2,841,695 head—calves, 216,492 head; hogs, 7,410,162 head; sheep, 3,714,889 head; and horses and mules, 182,326 head.

At Chicago livestock receipts during May totaled 1,343,584 head, an amount appreciably in excess of that representing similar movements in either of the two preceding years. The shipments for the month, which totaled 370,649 head, were also heavier than like movements in 1904 and 1903.
 Local consumption, during May at this city amounted to 972,935 head greater than that of a similar month in either of the two preceding years. During the first five months of the current year, 1,334,148 head of cattle, 182,055 head of calves, 3,546,993 head of hogs, 1,696,849 head of sheep and 69,853 head of horses were received at Chicago, making a grand total of 6,829,898 head in contrast with a similar movement in 1904 of 6,707,532 head and in 1903 of 6,059,831 head.

Packing house products were shipped from Chicago during the first four weeks of May to the amount of 181,823,030 pounds in 1905, as against 200,645,682 pounds in 1904 and 145,490,067 pounds in 1903. For the first year to May 27, similar shipments aggregated 965,161,182 pounds, and were composed of 13,377,900 pounds of beef, 58,180,350 pounds of canned meats, 264,141,934 pounds of cured meats, 418,761,119 pounds of dressed beef, 12,250,570 pounds of hides, 125,185,068 pounds of lard, and 10,501,300 pounds of pork. The total amount of similar commodities shipped during corresponding months of 1904 amounted to 1,062,606,204 pounds, and in 1903 to 881,320,000 pounds.

The demand for increased shipping facilities on the upper Columbia has increased until two new steamers are being built. They will be put in commission in time to handle this year's wheat crop.

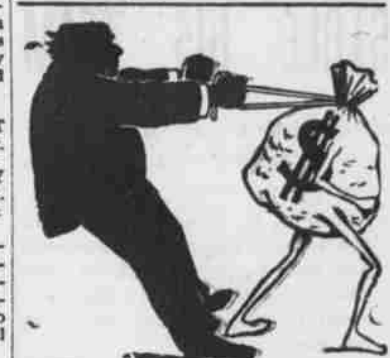
