New Irrigation Project.

The Idaho Irrigation district has been having surveys made for a new canal that will furnish water for the farmers located within the district. They contemplate using the location made several years ago for what was then known as the Union Canal company. This leaves the river about half way between the Farmers' Progress and Anderson headwaters.

It is understood that many of the shareholders of the Farmers' Progress are in favor of that company coming into the district. It would make a large district, should that company conclude to do so. There are now over 20,000 acres of tillable land in the district. With the Farmers' Progress joining in, it would be much the largest district in the state and would be the means of furnishing cheaper water than any now furnished in the valley, unless it be the New Sweden.

There is no question but that the district proposition is much the cheapest manner of furnishing water to the farmer, and the larger the district the cheaper it can be furnished.—Idaho Falls Register.

New College for Boise.

W. W. Williams, who came here from the East a few days ago with the idea of opening a first-class business college with a perfect equipment, today purchased the good will and equipment of the Boise business college from William H. Rhoads.

Mr. Williams has arranged for the leasing of extensive quarters. He is prepared to expend a large sum of money, and is determined to open and conduct a business and shorthand school that will have no superior on the Pacific coast. A faculty of high attainments will be secured and an institution will be built up that will meet with the hearty endorsement of Boise people. It will draw students from all parts of the Northwest and will be so managed as to enjoy a growth along with the rapid expansion of the city.—Boise Capital News.

Lost in Thunder Mountain.

News comes to us, says the Thunder Mountain News, that a man by the name of Crowl is missing in the Big Creek country. He was coming in from Goff with a couple of pack animals loaded with provisions and out

of Warren another man fell in company with him. When they reached Logan Crowl purchased some meat at a butcher shop and they went to his claims in that vicinity. A day or so later his companion returned the meat to the shop and stated that they did not want it. This man took Crowl's provisions and disposed of them and brought the stock on to Roosevelt and disposed of the animals. These men reached Logan about the 20th or 25th of last September. When Crowl left Goff he was only to be gone about 30 days and he has never been seen or heard of since the day he bought the meat in Logan. It is the opinion of everyone that this man has met with foul play and they will commence to solve this mystery when the snow leaves that section. Not only the citizens of that place are going to make a search, but we are informed that the county officers are going to take the matter up.

Earthquake in Idaho.

This valley was visited by a genuine earthquake shock between 7:30 and 8 o'clock last Sunday morning. The trend of the disturbance seemed to be from southwest to northeast and was probably most severe near the foothills, the homes of A. R. Krigbaum and William Cooper being severely shaken, members of the family who were on their feet being almost thrown from their balance. In the stores in town the shock was distinctly felt, windows rattling and bottles and other goods of that character rattling on the shelves. In Kelzur's furniture department the adjustable mirrors on the dressers awayed in their frames. The shock lasted about a minute and was followed by a rumbling sound.—Council Valley Advance.

Three Hundred Cows for Creamery.

A meeting was held here last Saturday by the subscribers of the Co-operative Creamery company, and after a number of interesting talks on the subject a report was read which showed that \$2100 had been subscribed and 300 cows signed up. A committee was appointed to secure 100 more cows, which is necessary to make the proposition a paying one, and to report at the meeting to be held on July 24, when the organization will be perfected, after which work will commence on the creamery plant.—Nyssa News.

Where Will the Jap Go.

Japan will "go west," thinks the New York Sun, into Korea and Manchuria, and not eastward across the Pacific and into the United States. That paper says that Togo's torpedoes blew out of the Pacific the "bugbear" of the Japanese immigration problem. That remains to be seen. But the Japs will doubtless "go west"—and also south. "Ex-Attache" says that while no effort is likely to be made by the Mikado's government at present to obtain redress from France for recent violations of neutrality in Indo-China, no one need feel surprised to hear that troubles have broken out in the near future in the border provinces of France's possessions in Indo-China, where the natives are all the time in a state of seething discontent, ripe for insurrection. And it is not at all likely that the high-spirited Japs will be any longer content to submit to the stigma imposed upon them by the commonwealth of Australia in applying to them the stringent and humiliating exclusion laws enacted to keep out the black and yellow races and maintaining a "white Australia." "We do not wish to quarrel with Australia," said a leading Japanese merchant at Melbourne; "should matters, however, come to the worst Japan will not shrink from the vindication of her prestige, even if assailed by the greatest power in the world." The labor element in Australia is as determined to keep out Japanese immigration as is the labor element of California and other parts of the United States. The Japanese may desire to go north as well as south, and east as well as west; and the world is learning that the determination of the Jap is no less great than are his patience and self-control. This self-control is not less than phenomenal, and is rightly said to have contributed in no small degree to the sweeping victories over the Russians on both land and sea.

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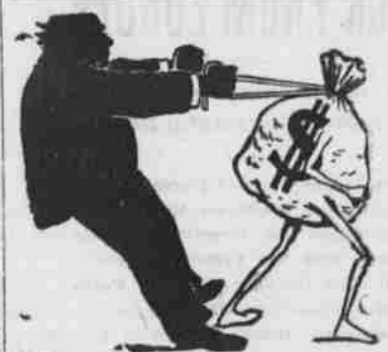
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
