OREGON WOOL CLIP

TOTAL OUTPUT FOR 1905

WAS 16,000,000 POUNDS.

Prevailing Average Prices for Spring Sales, 20 Cents Per Pound—Over 350 Carloads of Sheep Sent From Shaniko Alone—100 Per Cent Increase in Many Flocks.

The total wool clip in Oregon this year is estimated at from 15,000,000 to 16,000,000 pounds, and about one-third of it is delivered through Shaniko to the eastern market. At the annual sale just held at Shaniko warehouses, a number of new eastern buyers attended, and the wool brought extraordinary high prices, the figures averaging about 20 cents per pound.

"There were over 4,000,000 pounds sold, and about 250,000 pounds of wool remain in the hands of the growers," said Charles J. Gray, traveling agent for the Northwestern, to the Oregon Daily Journal. "From sheep and wool combined more than \$1,000,000 has been disbursed through Shaniko this year. The spring sale of sheep to the eastern market yielded about \$250,000, and the sale of wool \$500,000."

He says 350 carloads of sheep were shipped from Shaniko this spring. The increase of sheep this year was unusually heavy owing to a very favorable lambing season. Many growers say they have had 100 per cent increase of their herds. The sheep are killed to Omaha, Kansas City, St. Joseph and other points, but many are stopped en route and grazed in Wyoming or Colorado and then forwarded to the packers as fat stock.

Wool is delivered to the warehouses at Shaniko in bales about 4 by 8 feet, weighing 350 to 500 pounds. "In the grease," this means the wool is in the condition it was when removed from the backs of the sheep—heavy with sand, grease and dirt. There are scouring plants at Pendleton and The Dalles, but little of the wool was sent for scouring this season. Much of it has in former years been bought by mills at Passaic, N. J., but they got little of this year's crop. Most of it was taken by Boston houses. The freight rate from Shaniko to New England points is \$1.88 for wool in the grease, and \$2.25 for scoured.

When scoured in Oregon the weight of the wool is reduced 50 to 75 per cent, and it is more profitable to scour it here and ship the clean wool. But the eastern houses were anxious to have the wool on hand at the mills immediately. The quality of eastern and central Oregon wools is gradually improving. One lot this year at Shaniko brought a fraction over 26 cents. Willamette valley wools are quoted at 27 cents.

"Broadly speaking, the wool growing industry in Oregon is doomed to decrease because of the natural encroachment of settlers," said Mr. Gray. "The cattle men are bitterly opposed to sheep, and they help to discourage the industry."

"The taking up of land and cultivating the soil where sheep formerly ranged is limiting the grazing ground. The result will be the breeding of finer strains of sheep and raising of higher-priced wools."

LEWIS' DUTIES ENLARGED.

State Engineer Is Made Hydrographer for the Government.

A special from Salem to the Oregon Daily Journal says in regard to the new position of State Engineer John H. Lewis:

State Engineer John H. Lewis will be appointed United States hydrographer for Oregon, thus being given charge of the government hydro-

graphic work conducted in co-operation with the state of Oregon.

This means that all state work will be done with the United States appropriation will be state work. Consequently, the reports of the hydrographic work done by the state engineer will be published in the government reports.

The same will be true of topographic work, for State Engineer Lewis will appoint a government topographer to direct the work of the field parties employed by the state. The state engineer will serve as United States hydrographer without pay, and the United States topographer will serve the state without pay.

The arrangement is of great importance to the state, for it not only secures the publication of the state reports by the government, but gives the state work the same standing as that of the government. There will be complete harmony between state and United States surveys.

The information that this desirable arrangement has been made was received today, when Engineer Lewis also received notice that the government has set aside \$2500 for topographic and \$2500 for hydrographic work in this state.

The state appropriation of these sums was made conditional upon the United States appropriating money for the purpose mentioned, and the appropriations therefore became available today.

Mr. Lewis expects to begin topographic work in Malheur county, along the Malheur, Snake and Owyhee rivers, where considerable irrigation work is already under way.

Three surveying parties will be put in the field, with about 20 men employed, of whom four to six will be skilled surveyors and the others unskilled workmen. So far as possible the men employed will be residents of Oregon and of the locality in which the work is being performed.

PORTLAND MARKET DULL.

Cattle Decline 25 Cents and Receipts Are Light.

Portland, July 8.—The weakness in the cattle market is most pronounced and various quotations are ruling.

The market is dull even at the decline of 25c reported yesterday. Hogs and sheep are very firm, the receipts in the former being especially light. During the day 23 calves arrived.

Hogs—Best eastern Oregon, \$6.25; blockers and China fats, \$5.50@5.75; stockers and feeders, \$4.25@4.50.

Cattle—Best eastern Oregon steers, \$3.25; light and medium steers, \$3; best cows and heifers, \$2.25; old and light cows, \$1.75; stockers and feeders, \$1.75; bulls, \$1.50.

Sheep—Best fancy sheep, \$3@3.25; ewes, \$2.75@3.00; spring lambs, 4@4.1-2c.

Calves—Good veal, 150 to 200 pounds, 4.1-2c; rough and heavy, 3.1-2c.

SOCIALISTIC TREND.

Spokane Judge Declares for Municipal Ownership.

A sweeping prediction of general municipal ownership was made this morning by Judge Edward Whitson, of the United States circuit court, in his annual address as president of the Washington State Bar association, says a Spokane dispatch. Judge Whitson said:

"There is a growing sentiment in favor of ownership and control of all public utilities, including government ownership of railroads. That this sentiment is socialistic in its tendency, if not socialism in a modified form is quite clear. That the agitation will continue until all public utilities in use in the cities shall have passed under the control of the municipalities to be operated as public concerns cannot be doubted."
