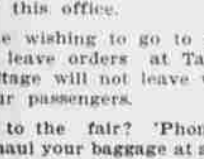

WHERE MASONS REGISTER.

Unique Building Erected by the Craft at the Fair.

At no other exposition has the Masonic order ever erected a structure exclusively for the use of its members. The building at the exposition grounds is used as a headquarters for all visiting Masons and by the women of the Eastern Star, says the Oregon Daily Journal. The lower floor is in two parts, the one on the left for the Eastern Star, and that on the right for the Masons, and both reception parlors are elegantly furnished. On the upper floor are rest rooms, and beds for those members of either order who may become ill or exhausted.

Mrs. Margaret Lutke, of Portland, is the hostess for the month of July for the Eastern Stars and C. F. Wiegand is the host for the Masons. The trustees are John S. Cleland, M. S. Woodcock and J. M. Hodson.

From the remotest corners of the earth Masons have come to this rest house and inscribed their names on the register. These are some of the names and localities given there: Robert Hope, Dalkeith, Scotland; C. L. Simkins, Wishaw, Scotland; R. J. Willis, Alaska; Joseph McClelland, City of Mexico, and Frank Fay Eddy, Nova Scotia.

When the cruisers Chicago and Boston were in the harbor officers and men visited the building and for the nonce forgot their rank and became, in truth, brother Masons.

FOUND BONES OF MAMMOTH.

Monster Remains Discovered Near Swan Falls, Idaho.

While prospecting along the Snake river a few miles above Swan Falls dam, Earlewine brothers of this city, discovered the bones of a mammoth animal, presumably one of the prehistoric mastodons, says the Boise Statesman. A large number of the bones were secured and brought to this city, but they were not in a condition to be preserved, crumbling and breaking badly when exposed to the air.

The bones were found on a steep hillside not far from the river on the Owyhee county side, in a section but infrequently visited. They were situated perhaps 350 feet from the base of the hill and about 100 feet from the summit. They lay in the midst of some white volcanic ashes, the lava from some volcano of ancient date overflowing the entire country roundabout.

As the two men were going up the hill in their search for signs of the precious metals, one of them happened to notice a bone sticking out of the ash bed. Thinking that it was of very large size, he began an investigation which did not cease until he and his brother had uncovered a large number of bones of enormous size.

What is apparently the bone from one of the feet, from the hock to the hoof, was preserved in good condition by Mr. Earlewine. It measured about nine inches in length and is almost as thick through as it is long.

One of the hip bones was taken to the office of Chief of Police Horn, being so large as to take up almost the entire space in one of the window retreats. The socket at the hip measures six and a half inches in diameter and the cavity is three inches deep.

SEE BENEFITS OF UNION.

Harney County Wool Men Will Organize Association.

There is a movement on foot to organize the wool growers of this county into an association, says the Burns Times-Herald. At Shaniko this year, with an association and the sealed-bid system, wool producers received as high as 26 cents. In this county with the exception of one clip of 50,000 pounds, which has not yet been sold, the highest price received was 20 cents.

The first sheep were brought to what is now Harney county in 1882. At that time the principal industry of the country was stockraising, and there was a strong prejudice against sheep. But time has nearly, if not quite eliminated this ill feeling, and today the production of wool is one of the leading industries of the county.
