GENERAL NEWS.

The City of Mexico will issue no more gambling licenses after August 1, when all the present licenses expire. This is a result of a crusade for better morals which has been carried on for over a year past.

Lim Moon Chuck, a well known Chinese doctor, was found strangled to death with his queue, in his rooms at San Francisco, Monday, the deed being the work of highlanders who had threatened him some time ago.

The entire district surrounding Grass Valley, California, is now in flames and fears are entertained for the safety of the town. Hundreds of cords of wood have been burned and fences and improvements destroyed.

Within the past week 24 Russian officers have been court-martialed and ordered shot for disobeying orders and refusing to proceed to Manchuria. Almost open revolt is seen in many of the barracks where troops have been ordered to the front.

Because a drunken cowboy belonging to a Wild West show was ejected from a train near Wheeling, W. Va., Monday, his companions opened fire on the train. The fire was returned by the passengers and Joe Johnson and Mexican George, cowboys, were killed.

Two locomotive firemen were perhaps fatally injured in a collision between the Big Four flyer and a freight train at Greencastle, Ind., Monday morning. The passenger side-swiped the freight as it pulled into the siding, the passenger engine and mail car leaving the track and lodging right side up in a corn field 50 feet from the track.

John W. Priestley, an old and seemingly honorable textile manufacturer of Philadelphia, is in jail without bail at Camden, N. J., for burning property to secure insurance upon it. He is accused of having destroyed \$200,000 worth of property in the past five years for the insurance policies upon it. He also attempted to collect life insurance amounting to \$100,000 upon the life of his brother, J. H. Priestley.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Marcus Talbot has been elected general manager of the Columbia River and Northern railroad, and also of The Dalles, Portland & Astoria Navigation company's line of boats on the river.

A setter dog belonging in Portland, ran over a high cliff near Oswego, Or., Sunday night and landed on a projecting ledge 300 feet from the ground where he remains marooned in view of the public road.

Mayor William Glassman, of Ogden, and editor of the Ogden Standard, is touring the northwest with a party of 16 young women who won this prize trip on subscription contests conducted by the Standard.

Northern Pacific engineers are surveying a line down the north bank of the Columbia and it is thought highly probable that a water grade road from Wallula to Portland will be built there within a few years.

Because the law prohibited the marriage of first cousins, Miss Bessie Stanley and Harry Lough, of Eugene, hired a boat and went to sea and were married off Cape Blanco, Monday at noon, the skipper of the boat performing the ceremony.

The body of Mrs. Minnie Mitchell, who, with H. F. Gibson, was drowned in Lake Washington, Seattle, Sunday, was found by a fisherman Monday evening. Gibson's body has not been found yet. The theory of elopement is now entirely destroyed. Both were married and left home Sunday morning and their upturned boat was found late Sunday evening on the lake.

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FAIR IS COMPLETE

COMPREHENSIVE VIEW OF
WESTERN WORLD.

Nature Has Been Laid in Preparing the Fair Grounds—Buildings Are Conveniently Arranged and Yet Not Crowded—Forestry and Government Buildings Alone Worth the Cost of the Exposition From an Educational Point of View.

The Lewis and Clark fair is now practically complete and visitors may see the most compact, neatest, cleanest, most entertaining and well arranged exposition ever held in the world.

The natural setting is splendid. Nature has sloped off the verdant stretches, facing the lake and crowned the site of the fair in the most varied and beautiful manner.

The arrangement of the fair is artistic and well sustained. Beginning at the very entrance, the masterful touches of an artist are seen. The grounds slope toward the grand terrace, the main buildings are arranged so they may be visited with the least possible travel and yet the groups have no crowded effect.

Close at hand is the art museum, containing 3000 pictures, catalogued and arranged for inspection. Here one may spend weeks, studying and admiring the masterpieces. The building is lighted by electricity all day, so the best possible effects may be secured in studying the great paintings. This building and its treasure, alone, is worth a trip to the fair, to every school boy and girl within reach of the city of Portland. It is the opportunity of a lifetime to many to see and admire the real paintings which they read of and concerning which they hear fascinating lectures.

The great college, workshop and laboratory of the entire exposition, however, is the government building and exhibits.

It is impossible to give even a slight idea of the education to come from an inspection of the government building. Here are no vendors nor hawkers, crying their wares; here is no cold commercialism demanding that you buy or pass on.

Everywhere in this magnificent building is an air of genuineness, of stability, of reality.

The exhibits are your own property, as it were, the arts and sciences and industries underlying your own institutions and the magnificent display there is an epitome of the government and its complicated and intricate machinery.

The postal department, the war, navy and agricultural departments, the life saving service, the fisheries industry, Alaska, Porto Rico, the Philippines—all their wonders are there in charge of competent experts to explain every detail.

Here among the wonderful arts which make the government what it is, the studious and observant person may spend days and weeks and then have but a faint idea of the magnitude of the government.

There is hospitality and cordial greeting for visitors everywhere. No man can reproach the fair management for not having done its full duty to make the fair enjoyable. The officials, guards, attendants and all persons in charge seem to understand thoroughly well that this is an educational event and no pains are spared to explain the wonders of the Oregon country and its great exposition to the tourists.

As to prices and accommodations, it is true as has been often repeated by visitors returning. If you are in search of high prices you will find them; but if you desire clean, neat, moderate rooms and plain, wholesome, clean meals at moderate prices, you can find them in abundance. One happy thought seems to have pervaded the entire construction of the fair, and that was to provide plenty of free seats, plenty of free drinking water and plenty of shade and in every part of the grounds merry picnic parties are found lounging and lunching in the shady parks with everywhere the nodding, blushing roses.

It is a pleasure and a profit to westerners to be able to see at one sweeping glance such a comprehensive and splendid view of the western world, spread at their feet.

ELKS' LODGE OPENS.

Address of Welcome by Governor Higgins of New York.

Buffalo, N. Y., July 11.—The session of the Grand Lodge of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks was opened in this city today at Convention hall, with William H. Ticknor, exalted ruler of the grand lodge, in the chair, and with an immense attendance. The grand lodge was escorted from the hotel headquarters to the hall by the local lodge, and with music, and at the hall Mr. Ticknor opened the proceedings formally by presenting the visiting officers. Addresses of welcome by Governor Higgins and Mayor Knight were followed by an organ recital by Simon Fleischmann of the Pan-American organ. Grand Exalted Ruler William J. O'Brien, of Baltimore, delivered an

address on the principles of the order and the warmth of the welcome extended. "America" was sung by the Buffalo Orpheus and a chorus of 200 voices, and the initial session adjourned to reassemble this afternoon for the election of officers. Arriving trains last night and this morning brought hundreds of representatives from all parts of the country, and the hotels and other public places are fairly overrun with the antlered tribe.

HEREDITY IN ANGLERS.

Grover Cleveland's Views of Source of Expertness.

Former President Grover Cleveland claims that in order to be a successful fisherman one must have had parents—meaning that the art of fishing is hereditary. As is well known, fishing with the rod is Mr. Cleveland's favorite recreation, and in an interview he consented to submit to at the Buckingham when he came to New York the other day to attend the reception of the Bar association to Joseph Choate, he was induced to talk on the subject of his favorite sport. Mr. Cleveland said, smiling broadly the while: "But I assure you there's nothing absurd about it. In the fishing line more people than in any other field of enterprise the parental influence must be taken into consideration. The fisherman is born, not made. For a long time I was under the impression that the fisherman was made. But I discovered that he was nothing of the kind."

"The aspirant for fishing honors may buy, beg, borrow or steal the best rod that was ever turned out; may purchase the brightest and most musical reel that ever spun music as the line ran out; may invest in the best water-proof lines; may make his hat gay with the grandest artificial flies that ever were made; he may do all these things and many more, and yet be as far from the goal of his ambitions as ever. The fish simply refuse to rise and his basket remains empty."

And probably a dozen yards away a small boy sits with phlegmatic calm, armed only with a crooked hazel stick, a piece of string and a two-cent hook, and proceeds to snare the flimsy denizens of the stream with a rapidity that makes the older hand at the game with his elaborate outfit, feel like "thirty cents." You may say that the boy has found a better spot. Not a bit of it.

Change places with him, even use the same bait as his juvenile mightiness, and before you have had a ghost of a nibble the kid will have half a dozen beauties gasping upon the bank, from the very spot where you fished for hours in vain.

"When I was a boy I, too, could catch fish. My hand has not lost much of its cunning, but I am a pretty fair fisherman yet, notwithstanding."

"I have no doubt that the art of fishing is a direct survival of the ancient attribute of our prehistoric ancestors. We may be sure that the lake dwellers and all those who dwell by pond or stream were past masters in the art of catching fish with the most primitive implements. When, therefore, you find a small boy catching fish early with a bit of string and a bent pin you may be sure you have struck a direct descendant of the ancient lake dwellers."—New York Globe.
