

AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE

Bought 800 Horses.
J. H. Chamberlain, of the firm of Warman, Black & Chamberlain, of Indianapolis, has just completed the purchase of about 800 head of horses which will be shipped on July 20. The shipment will comprise about 40 carloads, and of these 25 or 30 will be sent out of the Lewiston stock yards. Mr. Chamberlain has been in this field buying for the past two weeks and the purchases were made in the Astoria and reservation sections. The horses purchased represent the better grades of range stock. From W. J. Clemans, of Astoria, Mr. Chamberlain secured about 500 head which will comprise a part of the Lewiston shipment. "We handle thousands of horses every year," said Mr. Chamberlain yesterday, "and sell by the carload on the Indianapolis market. I have been buying in Montana for five years and have handled from that state alone 25,000 head.—Lewiston Tribune.

Union Church at Harpster.
Rev. Johnson, of the Congregational church at Spokane, was at Harpster yesterday and organized a union church at that place. About 75 people were present at the meeting and arrangements were made to buy the building now being used for the school house.

A contract has been let to A. Semper, of Lewiston, to erect a new school building one story high, size 48x46, and to cost \$5000. The new school building will contain two large rooms, large hall and cloak rooms.—Lewiston Tribune.

New Factory for Caldwell.
Caldwell is soon to have one of the finest sash and door factories and planing mills in the state. The factory when completed will cost \$10,000 and will be constructed of pressed stone, the main building being 40x100 and the office and storehouse 30x70. The company which is a local one comprising the Cooper Lumber company and other shrewd business men of the city have secured the site between the power house and the Pacific hotel and will begin operations for the plant in a few days.—Caldwell News.

Baker County Cattle Deal.
One of the largest purchases of cattle made in this vicinity for some

time is that just closed by which the Baker City Packing company take over all the fat cows and 3-year-old steers of the Hindman band at Durkee, and that of Odell and Fernald, at Rye valley, a total number of 800 head. The cattle brought \$20 and \$30 per head.

F. A. Phillips of the Baker City Packing company, was the buyer and the cattle are destined to the Puget sound market.—Baker City Democrat.

Baker county's recorder, was short in his accounts with the county some \$450, which amount was made good by his brother yesterday, who filed his bonds and assumed the duties of the office left vacant by Henry.
