GENERAL NEWS.

John Hicks, of Wisconsin, will be minister to Chile, succeeding Henry L. Wilson, who has been transferred to Belgium.

It is claimed that laborers are deserting the Panama canal work in droves because the system of paying off is unsatisfactory.

Army worms in inconceivable numbers are devastating crops near South Bend, Ind. The farmers have combined for their destruction.

William S. Withers is dead at Wakefield, N. Y., aged 70. He was leader of the Ford theater orchestra in Washington the night Lincoln was shot, and witnessed the assassination.

The Hartford, Conn., bank opened its doors for business 113 years ago the 12th of the present month, and they have never closed, even for a temporary suspension, since.

The litigation over a church property at Seward, Neb., between Father Murphy and Bishop Bonacum will probably be ended by consent, and the dispute referred directly to the pope.

One million sixty-nine thousand acres of the Utah reservation in Utah, will be opened to settlement August 1. This is practically 45 per cent of the area of the entire reservation.

The train dispatcher at Mount Vernon, Ind., got his orders crossed and the result was a wreck in which four persons were killed and eight injured, one fatally. The smash was on the Louisville & Nashville, near Upton.

The New York city board of health has bought 1200 acres of land in the Catskill mountains, upon which to build a municipal hospital for the treatment of consumptives. There are 25,000 consumptives in New York city.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Clatsop county court has appointed five forest rangers as a precaution against fire. They go on duty at once.

The state will at once take steps to perfect a title to 5000 acres of recently discovered swamp land in Klamath county.

J. Chamberlain, an Indianapolis man, will soon ship from Spalding, Idaho, 700 head of horses to the eastern markets.

City Marshal Patrick McGovern, of Coeur d'Alene, has been arrested charged with killing and throwing dogs into the Spokane river.

There are in Clackamas county 8184 children of school age. The county employs 199 teachers, paying the men \$49.72 and the women \$40.60.

Robert G. Smith, of Grant's Pass, known to the members of the last legislature as "Josephine" Smith, is after the democratic nomination for congress in the first district.

Gustaf Swenson, of Portland, asks the exclusive privilege of selling liquors at retail in that city, agreeing to pay therefor as much revenue as all the retailers now pay in.

William Dew has been made superintendent of the Fort Lapwai, Indian school, Idaho, at a salary of \$1000. He succeeds F. G. Mattison, who resigned the service to go into business.

George B. Woods, of the Pacific University at Forest Grove, has been called to the head of the English department of the Academy at Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill.

LOST A FORTUNE

JOHN McMAHAN HAS AWAY HIS WAGES FOR 16 YEARS.

Story of an Expert and Industrious Laborer Who Has Gambled Away Over \$12,000 in Unatilla and Other Eastern Oregon Counties—Believes He Will Yet Make a Winning Which Will Reimburse His Losses.

John McMahon, a traction engineer, sack sewer, sheep shearer and an all round useful and skillful man who has worked in sheepshearing time and during harvests in Unatilla county for the past 16 years, has arrived from California and will drive a team on a combined harvester in this county for the next 60 days.

The story of McMahon is interesting and shows the evil effects of gambling when pursued with persistence. According to McMahon's own statements he has worked for 16 seasons in Unatilla county, making as much as \$7 per day during the sheep-shearing season, which lasts for 40 days in Unatilla and as many more days in other places each year, and he has always worked at jobs in harvest which have paid him from \$4 to \$5 per day, for 60 and 70 days each year, and yet, according to his own confession, he always leaves here dead broke, usually on board a brake beam or in a box car.

And the reason for this is gambling. He is an inveterate gambler; one who believes in luck, and that although he loses continually, yet some unexpected day his luck will take a turn and he will break a fare or roulette game and go away with a stake that will keep him the remainder of his days.

This is the one eternal hope that buoys him up and causes him to risk his last cent in the games. He does not know when his turn will come and so he is always risking and always losing.

To the East Oregonian McMahon grew reminiscent today and made a calculation of the wages he has earned and gambled away in this city and county in the last 16 years.

It was enough to buy him a wheat farm.

He estimated that he has worked 100 days each year at sheepshearing in the past 16 years, and his average wages have been \$6 per day for that entire time, although on many days he has made \$10. This would make him \$600 per year from sheepshearing for 16 years, or a total of \$9600.

Then he has worked 80 days each year in harvest for the same length of time, his average wages for this work being \$3 per day, or \$240 per year for 16 years, or a total of \$3240 for that time. After harvest he has run stationary engines in sawmills and gristmills in Oregon and California each winter, working at this trade for perhaps three months each year at an average of \$30 per month, or a total of \$240 per year for the past 16 years.

The total income from his wages for the past 16 years, he estimates as follows: Sheepshearing, \$9600; harvesting, \$3240, and other labor, \$3240, or a grand total of \$16,080.

He is a single man and does not drink nor use tobacco and he estimates that he has spent \$200 per year for clothing and living expenses, leaving a sum of \$12,880 which he has spent in gambling, largely in Pendleton and other eastern Oregon towns where he has worked in that time.

It is thus seen how gamblers and tin horns are supported, although they produce nothing and have no capital to start on.

McMahon, (which, by the way, is his name for the purpose of this story only and not his true name) is only one in perhaps a hundred such hard-working men who visit Unatilla county each year, whose history is the same and whose incomes go the same way. They believe that luck will turn some day and they will get back more than they have ever paid into the games and so they go on working and earning money with which to dress tin-horns in broadcloth and decorate them in diamonds, while they, themselves, wear overalls and ride in box cars.

McMahon is now over 50 years old and some spring will fall to return from California, where he winters every year, and investigation will find him in some poor house or free hospital, too old to work and not sick enough to die, but a burden on the community, while the vampires who have taken his earnings will flaunt their broadcloth in the face of the world, while boasting to ignorant listeners about the "business" which the gambler brings to the community.

GUilty OF MURDER.

Saloon Man Who Sells Indian Whiskey Is the Criminal.

Pendleton, July 17.—(Editor East Oregonian)—Once more we are brought face to face with the stern realities of the danger there is in allowing Indians to have whiskey. Not only the danger to the public in general, but to the Indian in particular.

Yesterday morning the mangled remains of an Indian, belonging to the Unatilla reservation, was found strewn for a distance of 300 yards or more, along the O. R. & N. right of way, who had been killed while in a state of intoxication, by a passing train.

There were several different acts of lawlessness committed perhaps, which led up to what will be called an accident, resulting in the death of this Indian. We may say that the engineer of the engine which ran over the Indian was too careless and did not obey his instructions about whistling, slacking up speed at curves, crossings, etc., and that if he had obeyed his instructions to the letter, no accident would have occurred.

But, be that as it may, we know not what happened and the engineer may have done all in his power at that time to avoid an accident.

But this much we do know: The Indian was intoxicated at the time of his

death, and the fact that he was intoxicated is the primary cause of his death, and the law-violating saloon man, or whoever it was who sold the Indian whiskey that he might add the paltry sum of 50 cents or \$1.00 to his collection of blood money, is the individual whose hands are stained with the blood of that Indian; is the person upon whose head rests the crime of murder.

CITIZEN OF LAW AND ORDER.

PROF. PEEBLES SELECTED.

Teacher of Mathematics at Weston Normal Returns to Salem.

Salem, July 17.—At the meeting of the board of school directors last night Prof. G. A. Peebles of Weston Normal, was elected principal of the North school, Mr. Goode having resigned to accept a school at Mt. Tabor.

Prof. Peebles years ago taught the North school and was afterward city superintendent of schools. He has also been county school superintendent and was at one time city superintendent of schools at McMinnville. During the last five years he has been with the Weston State Normal, occupying the chair of mathematics for two years and of English literature for three years.

At present he is vice-president of the school, but has been advised by his physicians that he cannot continue his residence in the upper country and live, he having lost more than 40 pounds in weight in the last three years. For this reason he applied for the vacancy at the North school and received the unanimous vote of the board.

MONTE DENIES GUILT.

Accomplice of Tracy Says He Is Wrongfully Accused.

Salem, July 17.—Charles Monte, convicted of murder in the second degree, was taken before Circuit Judge Burnett Saturday evening to receive sentence for the crime for which a jury of 12 men had found him guilty on Wednesday.

Before pronouncing sentence, as is the custom of the court, the prisoner was asked if he had anything to say why sentence should not be pronounced upon him. Monte addressed the court and said he was innocent of the crime for which he had been convicted. He said W. J. Reilly of Portland, and James Morris, the convict, had perjured themselves when giving testimony on the witness stand to secure his conviction and that he did not think he had been given a fair trial.

"But I have no money," said the prisoner, "and I am compelled to take the sentence of the court." Judge Burnett, with an apparent feeling of sympathy, then pronounced the life sentence upon Monte.
