Half the business section of Covelo, Cal., was burned. Loss, \$37,000, carrying very slight insurance.

The elevator of the Missouri Grain company, burned at Moberly, Mo., with an immense quantity of grain. Loss, \$200,000.

Bishop Isaac Joyce lies at this Minneapolis home dangerously ill with paralysis and cerebral hemorrhage. He has been ill since July 3.

Earthquake shocks in the copper region of Lake Superior have created such alarm among the miners that they refuse to go into the mines since.

The Northern Pacific management is hiring telegraphers in San Francisco as a measure of precaution against an expected strike of operators all over the system.

Collins, the new chief of police of Chicago, has started out to suppress gambling in that city. The first raid made was on four stylish clubs, where about 100 arrests were made.

The private park of the mikado of Japan was laid out 300 years ago, and the first foreigners of any country that ever set foot therein were Secretary Taft, Miss Alice Roosevelt and other members of that party.

All attempts to enforce the anti-poll selling law at St. Louis by the state authorities under direction of Governor Folk, have thus far failed utterly on account of the stand-in the gamblers have with the city and county officials.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Of the 49 clerks in the Spokane postoffice, but one was born in the state of Washington.

Four hundred Jap coolies have arrived at Tacoma to be distributed as laborers along the Northern Pacific railway system.

A big fight is on at Grangeville, Idaho, over a proposition to bond the place for \$32,000 for the purchase of the waterworks by the city.

An accident to a cage threw Con Crowley and Ed York to the bottom of a 700-foot shaft in the Minnie Healey mine at Butte, and both were killed.

Canadian revenue officials have seized 2500 sheep belonging to John McLaren, of Havre, Mont. McLaren claims they strayed across the border. The officials claim they were being smuggled across.

The badly decomposed body of a man has been found on Huckleberry mountain near St. Joe, Idaho. It is supposed to be the remains of Fred Tyler, who disappeared last fall, and who was probably murdered.

The Lewiston, Idaho, district this year produced 900,000 pounds of wool, which has sold at an average price of 18 cents. The last of the clip was sold July 26—64,000 pounds for 19 cents, bought by E. H. Clarke.

O. W. Briggs and Earl G. Davis, recently from Paw Paw, Ill., have purchased the Morning Register, of Eugene, from W. G. and W. F. Gilstrap. W. F. Gilstrap will continue as business manager. The paper will remain republican in politics.

The body of an unknown man was found in the Tualatin river, near Hillsboro, with two axes and two plowshares wired together and the wires drawn about the dead man's neck. While positive identification is not possible, it is thought to be the body of a farmer named Bower. In that event it was probably suicide.

TIN FROM ALASKA

GROUP OF TIN MINES

SOLD FOR \$5,000,000.

San Francisco People Sell Valuable Property in York District to English Capitalists—Believed That the Mines Will Be Great Producers—United States Uses \$24,000,000 Worth of Tin Each Year.

Much interest has been aroused in mining circles throughout this country and England by the news that valuable tin mines have been discovered in Alaska; not only discovered, but successfully put upon the market by their American owners and bought by an English company for the sum of \$5,000,000.

In token of the consummation of this sale, Charles A. Mau, a San Francisco attorney, has just executed before the British consul in San Francisco the necessary bond for the amount named. The mines so disposed of were the joint property of Mr. Mau, Julius W. Raphael, J. P. Flood, of Alaska, and several others.

The location of the valuable deposits, made doubly valuable in the threatened exhaustion of the tin mines in Cornwall, is described as scattered on the streams flowing into Lopp-Lagoon, a part of Bering strait, in the York region of Alaska. Those of the claims that are particularly rich in both tin and gold deposits are located in groups of eight, or a total of 2040 acres altogether, along the Oakland, Tin, Diomede, Midas, Red Fox, Washington, Nebraska and Mamma creeks. Each group, 13 in all, is known by a separate name, as follows: Arlington, Myrtle, Wonder, Buchanan, Lincoln, Garfield, Bryan, Rhode Island, Nebraska, Nob Hill, Cleveland, Washington and Humboldt.

For many years nobody regarded the York region of Alaska as a likely field for mining operations. Its only practical use, until some time after the discovery of gold at Nome, was that made of it as a government reservation for reindeer. This was at Cape Prince of Wales, where there was also a mission. The rush to Nome naturally resulted in an overflow into the York region, but no immediate success rewarded these efforts and it was not until 1903 that this region began to receive the systematic attention it merited.

That tin was in the York region, however, was known as long ago as 1900, when prospectors in search of the more precious metal found the riffs in their sluice boxes filled up with a heavy black gravel and became so disgusted with its prevalence that they abandoned their claims.

Other prospectors of greater experience soon followed their too easily discouraged brethren, and these later comers pounced upon the tin deposits with enthusiastic appreciation of their worth.

Last year Raphael and Mau shipped about a hundred bags of the tin ore from their Alaska claims to Hamburg, Germany, and expect to hear favorably from the assaying test which will soon be made in the smelters of that city. A smelter in San Francisco is one of the prephases made in connection with the future development of these deposits, and it is believed that once the new mines are being adequately worked the United States will become an exporter, instead of an importer of tin. This will be no inconsiderable change, when it is remembered that now we use 43 per cent of the world's total output, or about \$24,000,000 worth annually.

TELEPHONE IMPROVEMENTS.

One Hundred New Instruments Will Be Put in at Echo.

Land Entries Held Up.

Mountain Home, July 25.—Twenty-nine applications for homestead entries on Fall creek, in the northern part of Elmore county, Idaho, have been held up by the officials of the United States land office for investigation, these being entries of men who claimed "squatter's rights" to the land in question, which was only yesterday thrown open to public entry by outsiders. Two townships, 2 north and 8 and 9 east, have been thrown open for entry, and 1430 acres are tied up in the entries which have been suspended.
