GENERAL NEWS.

The grand stand collapsed at a ball game at Walnut, Iowa. Many were injured. Mrs. Ed Burke so seriously she will die.

Vinson Walsh, son of the Colorado millionaire, Thomas Walsh, was killed by his automobile running into an iron bridge railing at Newport, R. I.

There are 27,000 children in the government Indian schools, and upon their education the government annually spends between \$3,000,000 and \$3,600,000.

In Belgium death sentences are never carried out because King Leopold promised his mother as she was dying that he would never sign his name to a death warrant.

Lambert Nieuhaus, confined in the jail at St. Louis, committed hari-kari the day before he was to have been hung, by stabbing himself in the abdomen with an ordinary penknife.

Dr. Fred Waale, who became famous as the conductor in the Bach festival in Bethlehem, Pa., has accepted a call to the chair of music at the University of California, at a salary of \$5000 a year.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Rich & Harris, of Prosser, Wash., have the contract for driving a 4000-foot tunnel for the Alaska Central railroad.

Jack Grubler, a Lane, Idaho, miner, lost the sight of one eye and was otherwise injured by a premature explosion of dynamite.

William Daly got a cumulative sentence for burglary at Seattle, and will serve 19 years. He has served time for burglary in California.

State Superintendent Ackerman believes there will be 2000 teachers at Portland to attend the educational congress August 28 to September 2.

A barn and the residence of B. S. Huntington and W. H. Wells burned at The Dalles. Loss, \$4000. Hard work only saved much other property.

The Japanese school at Seattle has received the \$500 cash promised it by Baron Komura, when he was in Seattle en route to the peace conference.

Five suspects are under arrest at Cottage Grove, charged with robbing a store at Grant's Pass of \$200 worth of merchandise. All are strangers and semi-hoboes.

The plant of the Oregon Handle Manufacturing company, at Newberg, Or., has burned. Origin of the fire unknown. Loss, \$12,000, with only \$2000 insurance.

A. O. Benjamin failed to raise or remove from the channel the steamer Challenger, wrecked at South Bend, Wash., in the Columbia, and forfeited his bond of \$1000.

The Leyson hotel at Medical Lake, Wash., burned. Loss on the building, \$8000; on the contents, \$1500. No insurance. It was built in 1889 by Mrs. E. B. Leyson, who owned it until the fire.

The management of the Barnum & Bailey shows give as their reason for cutting out street parades that last year they lost 27 of their best horses in different kinds of "mix-ups," and paid out \$15,000 on damage claims originating in runaways and accidents.

Robert Keefe, the star pitcher of the Tacoma baseball club, has been sold to the New York American League club. It is presumed that the price is an advance over the \$2500 recently offered by the Chicago Nationals. Keefe will remain with the Tacoma team until November.

The Fern Creek Lumber company's sawmill, at Frances, Wash., near South Bend, burned down and was a complete loss the hard-dry kiln going with the mill. The loss is estimated at \$40,000. The insurance was \$5000. The mill had just been enlarged and improved and was owned largely by C. B. Handy & Co., and J. Haber-setzer, both of Frances.

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MORMON SINGERS

OGDEN CHOR GOES TO THE IRRIGATION CONGRESS.

Will Render an Irrigation "Ode" Which won the Hearts of the Ogden Congress in 1902—Mormons Make a Specialty of Developing the Voices of All Children With the Result That Good Singers Are Numerous in All Mormon Settlements.

Saturday night, on the westbound O. R. & N. train, there passed through Pendleton one of the greatest musical organizations on the Pacific coast, if not in the entire United States.

The train bore to the Lewis and Clark fair and the National Irrigation congress at Portland, the Ogden Tabernacle choir, consisting of 200 trained voices, which will sing during the week at the auditorium at the exposition grounds, and also at the irrigation congress.

During the session of the 1903 irrigation congress, which was held at Ogden, this choir rendered a specially written irrigation "ode," which was composed and set to music for the occasion. It was the event of the entire session.

Mormon churches make a specialty of music, and a well trained choir or chorus is one of the first things acquired after a minister is selected to have charge of a church. Music is taught in all the Mormon schools, and where children have voices of extraordinary sweetness, they are taken in charge by special instructors, who prepare them for service in public choruses and choirs. In this way every individual talent is developed and made use of, with the result that a Mormon church is always an entertaining place, because of its excellent singing.

It was remarked by Pendleton delegates to the Ogden convention that the general average of musical talent seemed greater among Mormon than among Gentile children. Such is not the case, however. The Mormons make a specialty of developing musical talent among all classes of children, while Gentiles do not. That is the only difference.

The only counterpart for the Mormon choirs to be found in the United States are in the Scandinavian colonies in Kansas, Nebraska and the Dakotas and the German societies of the various large cities.

The Swedish musical organizations, consisting at times of 1000 trained voices are the wonders of the musical world. The Mormon choruses are no less wonderful and are more numerous.

BIG MERCHANTMEN FOR JAPAN.

Two 13,000-Ton Passenger Ships on the Way to Nagasaki.

Advices to the state department from Consul Harris at Nagasaki, report that the Mitsui Bishi Dockyard and Engine Works of that city has contracted to build for the Toyo Kisen Kaisha (Eastern Steamship company) two sister passenger steamships of 12,000 tons each, one to be delivered in 30 months and the other in three years.

These vessels are to have a length between perpendiculars of 557 feet, a breadth of 62 feet 6 inches. They will be built to Lloyd's 100 A-1, and in accordance with the rules of the Japanese department of communications, as well as the American passenger boat regulations. They will have a speed of 19 1-2 knots.

Race Horses Arriving.

Walla Walla, Aug. 21.—Three carloads of running horses from the Portland tracks arrived at the fair grounds yesterday to be put into training for the fall race meet. This shipment will be followed in a few days by nearly a score of harness horses. Included in yesterday's arrivals are some of the best known running horses on the western circuit, and their presence here insures one of the best meets ever given by the Walla Walla association.

Lowest Water for 30 Years.

Riparia, Aug. 21.—Fruitgrowers along the Snake river are becoming alarmed at the condition of the river, which is eight inches lower than it has been for 30 years, and is still falling. This unprecedented fall has utterly demoralized river traffic, forcing the O. R. & N. company to abandon the runs of the steamers Spokane and Lewiston.

PACKERS ARE DEFIANT.

May Attack Indictments Before October 2, Date of Trial.

Chicago, Aug. 21.—Developments are expected by federal authorities in connection with the trial of the beef packers before the trial day set on October 2 by District Attorney Morrison.

It has been reported that the packers are making preparations to attack the indictments, and it is probable they will not wait until October 2. Additional subpoenas are daily being issued for witnesses to testify in the case, and many are being sent throughout the United States.

Returns have been made on subpoenas served in Texas, Rhode Island and Maryland upon Armour & Co., employes. The men who will be witnesses for the government from these states are: J. F. Caldwell, Dallas, Texas; J. B. Carr, Baltimore, Md., and D. W. Miner, Providence, R. I.

Secret service men under Captain Thomas I. Porter are still engaged in an attempt to secure evidence of the whereabouts of witnesses who have left the jurisdiction of the court.

WILL MAKE ANSWER

DEFENDANTS IN WATER SUIT ASK FOR MORE TIME.

Attorney C. F. Godwin Represented About 2000 Defendants in Filing Stipulation for Extension of Time to Answer the Complaint of the Free Water Users' Union Against People of Milton—Case Will Be Bitterly Fought and Will Be a History-Making Case in Pacific Coast Courts.

A stipulation asking for an extension of time to answer the complaint, was presented for filing in the circuit court Saturday evening by Attorney C. T. Godwin, of Milton, representing all the defendants in the big water right suit brought by the Water Users' Union on the Walla Walla river against all the settlers on the river and in the city of Milton.

Mr. Godwin, in this action represents something near 2000 people, including the 400 individuals named as defendants in the suit, besides the municipality of Milton, containing a population of about 1600 people.

It is the intention of every individual defendant in this suit to prepare to fight the suit on every point, as upon the decision in the case depends the future water right of every land owner in that entire district. In fact, every land owner on the Walla Walla and Tumulup rivers is named as defendant in the suit, as well as the city of Milton, which must also defend its right to use the waters of those streams for domestic purposes and fire protection.

Extension of time in which to answer is asked in order that the individuals named in the complaint may secure attorneys, and prepare answers offsetting the claims of the complainant water union. It promises to be the most important water suit ever heard on the Pacific coast, both from point of numbers engaged in it and also from the point of legal rights in the use of water from the streams of the state for municipal purposes and irrigation.
