SLEEPER FOR BAKER.

Regular Baker City Car Is Now Left There Instead of Going to Huntington.

In order that Baker City people who have made sleeper reservations on the O. R. & N. may go to bed at their usual bed time, hereafter, a bulletin has been issued from the Portland offices, to the effect that the sleeper known as the "Baker City sleeper," be cut out of train No. 6, at that point henceforth, instead of going to Huntington, as formerly.

Because of the lateness of No. 5, the westbound evening train, many times those who have reserved berths are not permitted to enjoy them until late in the morning, as the car was taken through to Huntington on No. 6, and returned on No. 5.

Now the car will be left at Baker City each day, as the eastbound passes there at noon, and Baker City people may go down to the depot and go to bed at sundown if they so desire, or if the hilarity of the night before should make such a course necessary, in order to catch up lost sleep.

It is thought that the same arrangement will be made for this city if the trains continue to be late and crowded as they have been for the past month. An effort will be made to secure such a convenience during the remainder of the Lewis and Clark fair, at least.

LET WOODCRAFT CONTRACT.

Building Committee of the Order Meets in Portland Today to Open Bids.

Contracts for the construction of the new building to be erected by the Women of Woodcraft in Portland will be let this evening, at the Albina offices of the order.

Mrs. C. C. Van Orsdall, grand guardian, accompanied by her daughter, Carol, left Saturday night for Portland, to be present as a member of the building committee today. The structure will cost between \$45,000 and \$50,000, and will be erected at once for headquarters for all the grand officers of the growing order.

At present 12 clerks and stenographers are employed in the office of the grand clerk in Albina and an average of 200 letters are received and answered every day.

400 CARS COMING

O. R. & N. PLACES ORDER FOR NEW EQUIPMENT.

Two Hundred Boxcars Will Be Added to the Service, 100 Ballast and 100 Flats—Ballast Cars Will Be of 100-Ton Capacity—First of the Order Expected to Reach Here by First of the Year.

Four hundred brand new cars will be the Christmas present which E. H. Harriman will present to the O. R. & N. this year, it is reported.

Two hundred of these will be box cars, 100 flats and 100 coal and ballast cars. Borrowing cars with which to handle an immense and constantly growing business is out of the question, for all roads are crowded to the limit and have few to lend.

So in order to meet the demand of the system, 400 new cars will be ordered, the first installment of them to reach the system about the first of the year, it is said.

The boxcars will be of the largest and latest model, carrying 40 to 50 tons, with steel frames and improved draw gear. The ballast cars will be traveling warehouses, from point of capacity, since most of them will be 100-ton steel cars, similar to those now in use on the Short Line and Union Pacific.

The order for these heavy cars means that enormous work in track improvements will be carried on by the system, as this number of ballast cars will equip five or six work trains and keep two or three steam shovels at work constantly.

The car factories are rushed to the limit of their capacity and it may be a year before the entire order for new cars is turned out from the shops, but as fast as they are completed they will be sent the system and put in service.

Within the past two years the O. R. & N. has received 30 new engines, principally for the mountain division out of La Grande, this being the largest number received by any western road in that time.

BLACKBURN UNDER ARREST.

Charged With Robbing Tent Dwellers Near Walters' Mill.

Saturday evening a man giving his name as William Blackburn, was arrested by Officer Stephens for having robbed the Jameson tent, near the Walters' mill. The capture of the tent thief, which was made by the above policeman with the assistance of Mr. Jameson and Frank Day, was a rather neat job.

During the afternoon it was reported to the police that the tent had been robbed of a watch, considerable clothing and other articles. Thereupon Officer Stephens, who is acting as marshal while Chief Coffman is at Bingham Springs, went to the place in company with the above named man. While looking around in the shrubbery near the scene they found Blackburn, and on examining him found some of the articles upon his person. He was then placed in the city jail and a complaint will be made against him before the district attorney.

CONDON ON A BOOM.

Dr. Mann Has Platted and is Selling an Addition.

Dr. and Mrs. E. A. Mann, who have been visiting here since Saturday, left today on the delayed No. 1 for Arlington, where they take the branch road to Condon.

According to Dr. Mann there will be much building done at Condon this fall, and in fact, is now under way. Before the railroad reached there lumber was much higher than at present, and as a result work was withheld until after the road was finished. Now it is on in full blast, and the noise of building is heard from morning until night. Soon after reaching Condon Dr. Mann purchased a 40-acre tract at one edge of the town, and this he is now selling as town lots, with great success.

WILL USE GYMNASIUM.

Will Be Vacated for Class Purposes From Beginning of Year.

With the new school buildings in use this fall it will not be necessary to use the gymnasium building, back of the high school, for class purposes any longer. Consequently it can again be used by the high school students for the purpose for which it was built, and according to Superintendent Traver, this will be done. While the equipment of the gymnasium is not as complete as it might be, it can be added to from time to time, and will serve to afford students a chance to take inside athletic training.

OPIMUM SMOKER ARRESTED.

Chinaman Fined and His Outfit Was Destroyed.

Another arrest for opium smoking

was made Saturday evening by Night Officer Manning, it being the first for that offense for several months. The chink is John Folk, a Chinaman, and he was found smoking opium in one of the Chinese places on Cottonwood street. According to others of the Chinese colony here Folk is considerable of a hobo, and as a result there will probably be little grief over his arrest among the others of that nationality here.

On being brought into police court this morning Folk was given a sentence of \$10 or five days in jail, and his smoking outfit was ordered destroyed.

They will return to Portland soon and go home by way of Los Angeles and the southern route. They are delighted with the west and have met many surprises on their journey. Ingham Bicknell, the son, is a graduate of Harvard university and is studying for the ministry.
