GENERAL NEWS.

By a street car accident at DeWitt, a suburb of Lansing, Mich., one man was killed and 10 persons seriously injured.

In the seaport cities of China the boycott of American goods and products is already weakening very perceptibly.

Mexican health authorities state there are just four cases of yellow fever in the republic, and that all are at Vera Cruz.

By a falling wall at Pittsburg, Pa., 15 Italian laborers were injured, 13 of them dangerously so, though none were killed outright.

At St. Cloud, Minn., a violent storm broke down thousands of shade trees, broke many thousands of window panes and damaged greatly many of the lighter built structures in the city.

Mayor Dunne, of Chicago, was arrested and fined at Evanston for exceeding the automobile speed limit.

His friend, John Boyleston, paid a fine at the same time for the same offense. It cost each \$10.

James Creelman states upon the best obtainable authority that the 551 days since the Russo-Jap war broke out have cost each belligerent approximately \$1,000,000 per day—a total of \$1,002,000,000 to date.

A trolley car running 40 miles per hour from Fox Point to Milwaukee, Wis., went over an embankment. One unknown man was killed and between 20 and 30 persons were injured, of whom two afterward died in hospitals.

The rebellion among the native tribes of German East Africa has reached formidable proportions. Fifteen thousand German troops are in the service, and the war has cost Germany \$52,500,000, with almost nothing to show for it.

Each town and city in the state of Rhode Island elects a state senator, no matter what its population. Providence, with a population of 200,000, has only one representative in the senate, while other towns of only 600 inhabitants have one each.

R. M. Beebe, of Los Angeles, flew into a violent rage because his sister and half-sister would not go to the theater with him. He shot and killed the latter, Miss Lottie Beebe, fired four ineffectual shots at his sister, and then fatally shot himself.

Dr. Joseph P. Cochran, M. D., missionary physician of the Episcopal church in Persia, is dead by typhoid fever at Urmia, Persia. He built in 1880 the first modern hospital in all Persia. His colleague, Rev. Benjamin Labarre, was murdered by a Moslem fanatic a year ago.

It is not generally known that Dr. Washington Gladden—who has so vigorously scored the church for its acceptance of "tainted" money—and John D. Rockefeller were country boys together in Toga county, New York attending school in adjoining districts, and were well acquainted with each other.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

F. P. Lejeune, a brakeman of the N. P., fell from his train near Missoula, Mont., and was ground in pieces.

An unknown laborer was crushed and killed by a sawlog in a Chatteroy sawmill. Not a trace of his identity could be found.

For the wheat harvested on one section near Creston, Lincoln county, Washington, the sum of \$12,985 gross is realized, or more than \$20 an acre.

Miss Ellen Johnson, a waitress, went suddenly insane at Lewiston, jumped out of a window and broke her thigh. She will be taken to the asylum as soon as sufficiently recovered.

Juel Stampfer, a Mount Rainier guide, fell into a crevasse on that mountain and sustained a compound fracture of his right thigh, and a sprained ankle. He is in a Tacoma hospital.

There are more public lands in Montana than in any other state or territory in the Union, with the exception of Alaska and Nevada, there being 56,455,455 acres of such unappropriated lands.

The prize yield of wheat this year in Whitman county was 60 acres of "fortyfold," which averaged 55 bushels per acre. Kegley maintains that the yield demonstrates the value of cultivating summer fallow.

At Ferry, Wash., Swede and Italian section hands fought. Charles Johnson, Antone Anderson and Peter Erickson, all Swedes, were more or less badly stabbed, Anderson fatally. Three Italians are under arrest.

A trunk containing \$10,000 worth of jewelry belonging to a Chicago wholesale house, has been stolen en route from Tacoma to Portland over the N. P. No trace. S. H. Hess, the traveling man for the house, was a passenger on the same train, and held the check for the trunk.

The Wenatchee valley is harvesting its bumper crop of all kinds of fruits. Especially is the quantity and quality of the melon and peach crops extra.

At Colfax, Wash., James B. Anderson laughed heartily at a joke a neighbor told him. While laughing he suddenly fell forward fainting, and was dead when picked up.

Prof. Thomas Howe, with assistants, is gathering seeds of Oregon pine, cedar, hemlock and other evergreens for the German government. They will be used in reforestation work. Mr. Howe states as a fact not generally known, that the German government has been raising trees from Oregon seed for 30 years, and that it gives them preference over free seeds grown in any other part of the world in this approximate latitude.

HUNGRY FOR PHOTOS

EASTERN PUBLICATIONS
"STEAL" MOORHOUSE PICTURES

Copyrighted Photographs Are Used by Many Cheaper Magazines Without Credit or Authority—Human Life, of Boston, Is the Latest Journalistic "Pirate"—Example Will Be Made of Some of the Picture-Hungry Publications.

So keen is the demand for Western photographs and western stories among the various publications of the east, that many of them appropriate copyrighted pictures and steal all kinds of copyrighted articles and sketches from the west.

Major Leet Moorhouse, whose Indian photographs have a world wide notoriety, is constantly harassed by eastern publications which use, without authority or credit, his most valuable copyrighted photographs and he will perhaps be forced to make an example of some of the cheaper publications if such journalistic piracy does not stop soon.

The last magazine to use the photograph of his Umatilla twins, without credit or authority, was Human Life, a monthly publication of Boston, which devoted considerable space to the production of the photograph of the twins, with a descriptive sketch prepared by the artist, to accompany the picture.

None of the more reputable publications use the photographs without permission, but many of the cheaper sensational publications make a constant practice of appropriating his most valued copyrighted pictures.

Thousands of the photographs have been carried east during the past year by tourists, and as some of his latest and best have not been published in the east, the temptation to use them is very strong and many of the irresponsible publications take undue liberties with the noted Umatilla artist's work.

Since the photographs are sent free to so many magazines and newspapers, Major Moorhouse feels that it is an injustice for publications to use them without permission, where permission could often be secured by the asking. All the better class of magazines order and pay well for all the photographs they use and are glad to get them, so great is the interest in western subjects.

FREEWATER BOY LOST.

Young Son of Mark Bade Disappears From Picnic Grounds.

Walla Walla, Aug. 22.—Mark Bade, 7-year-old son of Mark Bade, a farmer residing near Freewater, disappeared while in Walla Walla yesterday and despite the efforts of the police and a score of friends of Mr. Bade, the missing boy has not yet been located, although it is believed that the boy is somewhere in Walla Walla or vicinity.

Mr. Bade and his son arrived in Walla Walla Sunday to attend a picnic given by the German Lutheran church on Mill creek. Young Mark was enjoying himself immensely until he had some trouble with several boys about his own age.

He was missed soon afterward and a search was commenced for him. The police were notified and several officers scoured the business district and contiguous streets without results. The hunt was kept up until 12 o'clock last night and resumed again this morning. A boy answering young Bade's description was seen in the Green Park addition last evening, but he disappeared soon afterward.

CONFERENCE ENDS.

Methodists Conclude an Interesting Session at Baker City.

The M. E. conference for the Eastern Oregon and southern Idaho district which has been in session at Baker City for the past week, closed yesterday evening.

As the conference district does not extend west of La Grande, the names of the ministers supplied to the small churches do not interest this district. Rev. I. P. Roach was assigned to the First M. E. church at Boise, and Rev. Carl L. Bent to the Second church at that place. Rev. W. W. Van Dusen was re-elected presiding elder of the Boise district for the sixth year, the limit of the term for which a man can be elected to this position.

Rev. J. D. Gilliam was re-elected pastor and presiding elder at La Grande. Rev. E. M. Hill is pastor at Baker City. Rev. J. C. Walker goes to Union. Rev. D. S. Smith to Elgin and Rev. J. M. Johnson to John Day.

Property Values Increased.

The field work of making up the assessment roll of Josephine county has been completed for 1905. While no totals have been made, Assessor Fallin is confident the roll will foot up more than \$4,000,000. For 1904 the roll was \$2,034,095. Farm lands were rated according to their value and timber land entered as such is assessed at \$7 an acre. Railroad land is assessed double what it was last year—\$3 and \$5 an acre. The county intended to have had all timber land, railroad and private, cruised this summer and given valuations according to its worth.

BROKERS GET RICH

SALARY-SELLING IN PORTLAND IS A GROWING EVIL.

Mayor Lane Makes a Private Investigation and Finds Alarming Conditions Among City Employees—Over \$12,000 Passed Through Brokers' Hands During July—Heavy Discounts Exact From Employees Whose Wages Are Sold for Months in Advance.

Portland, Aug. 22.—Mayor Lane has made a thorough investigation into the practice of warrant discounting so prevalent among municipal employees, and has found that in five of the largest departments of the city, warrants amounting to \$12,543 passed through the hands of brokers in July. The amounts are divided as follows: Water department, \$1672; police, \$3163; fire, \$5377; engineering, \$957; street cleaning, \$1372.

The magnitude of the practice has proved a surprise to the mayor, and more than ever he is determined to discourage employees from giving away from 5 to 10 per cent of their salary each month to brokers for no other reason than to get the money before they earn it. In the fire department nearly one-half of the employees discounted salary warrants in July, while the police, street cleaning and water departments, nearly one-third resorted to the practice.

It has been learned that a large number of employees on the books of brokers have sold their salaries for several months in advance, and have signed blank transfers for their warrants and placed them in the hands of the money lenders who may present them from month to month, draw the salary, take out the payment agreed on, and return the rest to the employee after discounting for interest on the sum borrowed at 5 per cent a month and 5 per cent brokerage.

At the next meeting of the city executive board a list of the salary-discounting employees will be handed to the committee at the heads of the several departments who will notify the men that they must cease selling their wages before they earn them, and that they must appear in person at the city auditor's office and receipt for their warrants. The mayor and his executive board are proceeding on the ground that the employees have no legal right to dispose of their salaries before they earn them.
